## The Boston (Electoral Changes) Order 2013

Made - - - - \*\*\*

Coming into force in accordance with article 1(2)

Under section 58(4) of the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009(1) ("the Act") the Local Government Boundary Commission for England(2) published a report dated October 2012 stating its recommendations for changes to the electoral arrangements for the district(3) of Boston. The Commission has decided to give effect to the recommendations.

A draft of the instrument has been laid before Parliament and a period of forty days has expired and neither House has resolved that the instrument be not made.

The Commission makes the following Order in exercise of the power conferred by section 59(1) of the Act:

## **Citation and Commencement**

- 1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Boston (Electoral Changes) Order 2013.
- (2) This Order comes into force—
  - (a) for the purpose of proceedings preliminary or relating to the election of councillors, on 15th October 2014;
  - (b) for all other purposes, on the ordinary day of election of councillors in 2015.

### Interpretation

2. In this Order—

"map" means the map marked "Map referred to in the Boston (Electoral Changes) Order 2013", prints of which are available for inspection at the principal office of the Local Government Boundary Commission for England;

"ordinary day of election of councillors" has the meaning given by section 37 of the Representation of the People Act 1983(4).

#### Wards of the district of Boston and number of councillors

**3.**—(1) The existing wards of the district of Boston are abolished.

(2) The district is divided into 15 wards, each listed by name in the first column of the Schedule.

(3) Each ward comprises the area designated on the map by reference to the name of the ward.

(4) The number of councillors to be elected for each ward is the number specified in relation to that ward in the second column of the Schedule.

(5) Where a boundary is shown on the map as running along a road, railway line, footway, watercourse or similar geographic feature, it is to be treated as running along the centre line of the feature.

### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

## (This note is not part of the Order)

This Order makes changes to electoral arrangements for the district of Boston following recommendations made by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England.

The electoral changes apply in respect of local government elections to be held on and after the ordinary day of election of councillors in 2015.

Article 3 abolishes the existing wards of the district of Boston and replaces them with 15 new ones. That article, the map (as defined in article 2) and the Schedule establish the names, areas and number of councillors of the new wards.
