#### APPLICATIONS FOR CERTAIN ORDERS UNDER PART III

##### *Interpretation*

- 5 (1) In this Schedule—
- “application” means an application under section 53(5);
  - “local authority” means [<sup>F1</sup>a non-metropolitan district council], a parish [<sup>F2</sup>. . . council or the parish meeting of a parish not having a separate parish council [<sup>F3</sup>but, in relation to Wales, means a community council];
  - “prescribed” means prescribed by regulations made by the Secretary of State.
- (2) Regulations under this Schedule shall be made by statutory instrument which shall be subject to annulment in pursuance of a resolution of either House of Parliament.
