Legal Aid (Financial Conditions No. 3) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1976

. 17th November 1976 Made

. 20th December 1976 Coming into operation .

To be laid before Parliament

The Secretary of State(a) in pursuance of sections 2 and 3 of the Legal Aid and Advice Act (Northern Ireland) 1965(b) hereby makes the following regulations:

Citation, commencement and interpretation

- 1.—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Legal Aid (Financial Conditions No. 3) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1976 and shall come into operation on 20th December 1976.
 - (2) In these regulations—

"the Act" means the Legal Aid and Advice Act (Northern Ireland) 1965; "the Regulations of 1972" means the Legal Aid (Financial Conditions) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1972(c).

Limit of disposable capital under section 2 of the Act

2. For the purposes of section 2(1) of the Act, a person may be refused legal aid if he has a disposable capital of more than £1,400 instead of the amount prescribed by regulation 2 of the Regulations of 1972.

Amount of disposable capital above which contribution may be payable under section 3

3. For the purposes of section 3(1)(b) of the Act a person's contribution to the Legal Aid Fund may include a contribution in respect of capital not greater than the amount (if any) by which his disposable capital exceeds £300 instead of the amount prescribed by regulation 3 of the Regulations of 1972.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These regulations raise to £300 the amount of disposable capital which cannot be called upon for a contribution towards legal aid and raises the limit of the disposable capital above which a person may be refused legal aid to £1,400.

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
