PUBLIC HEALTH**Public Health Notifiable Diseases (No. 2) Order
(Northern Ireland) 1976**

Made 25th November 1976

Coming into operation 29th November 1976

The Department(a) of Health and Social Services in exercise of the powers conferred on it by section 1 of the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967(b) and of all other powers in that behalf hereby makes the following Order:

Citation, commencement and interpretation

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Public Health Notifiable Diseases (No. 2) Order (Northern Ireland) 1976 and shall come into operation on 29th November 1976.

(2) In this Order “the Act” means the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967.

Additional notifiable diseases

2.—(1) Schedule 1 to the Act shall be amended by the addition thereto of Marburg disease and viral haemorrhagic fever.

(2) Accordingly the notifiable diseases to which the Act applies from the commencement of this Order are those set out in the Schedule which shall be substituted for Schedule 1 to the Act.

Revocation

3. The Public Health Notifiable Diseases Order (Northern Ireland) 1976(c) is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

The Order adds Marburg disease and viral haemorrhagic fever to the list of notifiable diseases specified by the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967. The Act imposes a duty on a medical practitioner as soon as he attends a person he believes is suffering from a notifiable disease to notify the chief administrative medical officer of the Health and Social Services Board for the area.
