DISEASES OF ANIMALS**Diseases of Animals (Scheduled Substances Exemption) Order
(Northern Ireland) 1977***Made* 14th December 1977*Coming into operation* 1st February 1978

The Department(a) of Agriculture, in exercise of the powers conferred on it by section 32A(1) of the Diseases of Animals Act (Northern Ireland) 1958(b), (as added by section 3(1) of the Diseases of Animals (Amendment) Act (Northern Ireland) 1966(c)), and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, hereby makes the following order:—

Citation and commencement

1. This order may be cited as the Diseases of Animals (Scheduled Substances Exemption) Order (Northern Ireland) 1977 and shall come into operation on 1st February 1978.

Interpretation

2. In this order—

“The Act” means the Diseases of Animals Act (Northern Ireland) 1958.

Exemption

3. The prohibition in section 32A(1)(a) of the Act shall not apply to any person carrying on a business which comprises or includes the manufacture of animal feeding stuffs for sale, in respect of his possession of any of the following substances for the purpose of incorporating them in animal feeding stuffs for sale or supply under a veterinary prescription:—

(i) arsanic acid;

(ii) 4 hydroxy-3 nitrophenyl arsonic acid

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

This Order provides an exemption from the prohibition imposed by section 32A(1)(a) of the Diseases of Animals Act (Northern Ireland) 1958. This exemption will permit commercial animal feeding stuffs manufacturers to have in their possession the two arsenical feed additives specified in the Order for the purpose of incorporation in animal feeding stuffs for sale or supply under a veterinary prescription.
