

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO

The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Public Health Advice for Persons Travelling to Northern Ireland) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2020

S.R. 2020 No. 97

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Department of Health and is laid before the Northern Ireland Assembly to accompany the Health Protection (Coronavirus, Public Health Advice for Persons Travelling to Northern Ireland) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2020.
- 1.2 The Statutory Rule is made under sections 25B(1), (2)(e) and (g) and 25F(2) of the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967 (“the 1967 Act”) and is subject to negative resolution.

2. Purpose of the Regulations

- 2.1 The Statutory Rule requires operators of commercial transport services bringing passengers to Northern Ireland from outside the common travel area, to provide certain information to passengers. This will include public health information and information on the requirement to complete a passenger locator form and to self-isolate for 14 days on arrival.

3. Matters of special interest to the Northern Ireland Assembly

- 3.1 The Statutory Rule is made under the 1967 Act, in breach of the 21 day rule. This has been necessary to introduce the requirement at the same time as the other UK regions.
- 3.2 Further, the Regulations provide that the Department of Health must review the need for the measures imposed by the Regulations at least once every 21 days, with the first review being carried out by 29 June 2020.
- 3.3 The Regulations cease to have effect at the end of the period of one year beginning on the day on which they came into operation, i.e. the 8 June 2020.

4. Legislative Context

- 4.1 The 1967 Act and regulations made under it provide a legislative framework for health protection in Northern Ireland.
- 4.2 Part 1A of the 1967 Act, as inserted by the Coronavirus Act 2020 (“the 2020 Act”), provides a legal basis to protect the public from threats arising from infectious disease or contamination with coronavirus, and includes powers to impose restrictions or requirements on people, and in relation to things and premises, for use in rare circumstances where voluntary cooperation cannot be obtained. Overall, Part 1A of the 1967 Act sets out a framework for health protection which requires much of the detailed provisions to be delivered through regulations.
- 4.3 Section 25C of the 1967 Act provides a power for the Department of Health to make regulations to prevent, protect against, control or provide a public health response to

the incidence or spread of infection or contamination with coronavirus in Northern Ireland. The threat can come from outside Northern Ireland.

- 4.4 These Regulations are made under section 25B to enable a number of public health measures to be taken for the purpose of preventing danger to public health from arrivals into Northern Ireland. They will also be made under 25F(2) which allows for enforcement provisions to be included.

5. Policy background

- 5.1 The temporary modifications to the 1967 Act made by the Coronavirus Act 2020 provide regulation making powers that were previously not available in Northern Ireland.
- 5.2 The Regulations require the operators of vessels and aircraft bringing passengers into Northern Ireland from outside the common travel area to provide passengers with information. The information will be required to be provided:
- at the time of booking to travel;
 - at the time of check in; and
 - while the passenger is on board the vessel or aircraft.
- 5.3 The information will include public health information and information on the requirement to complete a passenger locator form and to self-isolate for 14 days on arrival.
- 5.4 An operator who fails to comply with the information requirement is guilty of an offence. If the booking or check in process was not managed directly by the operator, it must demonstrate that it took reasonable steps to ensure that the person managing the process would provide the required information.
- 5.5 There is provision for a fine not exceeding £10,000 upon summary conviction.

6. Consultation

- 6.1 Given the rapidly evolving global situation regarding the spread of coronavirus there has been no public consultation in relation to this Statutory Rule.
- 6.2 The UK Government has undertaken consultation with operators on behalf of all UK regions which are introducing similar regulations.

7. Equality impact

- 7.1 An Equality Impact Assessment screening was conducted and no adverse disproportionate impact was identified. Given these measures would reduce the transmission of coronavirus, there were positive benefits noted for those groups that are known to be, or suspected to be, more susceptible to the adverse effects of the virus, including older people, persons with a disability and those in ethnic minority groups.
- 7.2 No adverse impact on any of the rights within the European Convention on Human Rights was identified. The obligations under these Regulations fall on commercial operators rather than individuals.

8. Regulatory impact

- 8.1 Given the rapidly evolving global situation regarding the spread of coronavirus there has been no assessment of regulatory impacts in relation to this Statutory Rule.

9. Financial implications

- 9.1 Given the rapidly evolving global situation regarding the spread of coronavirus there has been no assessment of the financial impacts in relation to this Statutory Rule.

10. Section 24 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998

- 10.1 The Department of Health has considered section 24 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998 and is satisfied that these Regulations are not incompatible with any of the Convention rights; are not incompatible with Community law; do not discriminate against a person or class of person on the grounds of religious belief or political opinion; and do not modify an enactment in breach of section 7 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998.

11. EU implications

- 11.1 There are unlikely to be any EU implications.
- 11.2 This Statutory Rule does not relate to withdrawal from the European Union / trigger the statement requirements under the European Union (Withdrawal) Act.

12. Parity or Replicatory Measure

- 12.1 The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Public Health Advice for Persons Travelling to England) Regulations 2020 come into force on 8 June 2020. It is anticipated that The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Public Health Advice for Persons Travelling to Wales) Regulations 2020 will come into force on 8 June 2020 and The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Public Health Advice for Persons Travelling to Scotland) Regulations 2020 will come into force on 8 June 2020.

13. Additional information

- 13.1 Not applicable
