METALLIFEROUS MINES AND QUARRIES. First Aid Box or Cupboard.

ORDER, DATED 29TH MAY, 1924, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF COMMERCE FOR NORTHERN IRELAND UNDER THE MINING INDUSTRY ACT, 1920 (10 & 11 Geo. 5. c. 50), FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACTS, 1901 TO 1920, AND SECTION 26 (1) OF THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1923 (13 & 14 Geo. 5. Ch. 33), PRESCRIBING THE EQUIPMENT FOR FIRST-AID AT QUARRIES AND PITBANKS OF METALLIFEROUS MINES.

1924. No. 47.

In pursuance of Sub-section (1) of Section 26 of the Workmen's Compensation Act (Northern Ireland), 1923 (hereinafter called "the said Sub-section"), and under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920, as that Act applies in Northern Ireland, the Ministry of Commerce for Northern Ireland hereby prescribes that at every Quarry and every—Pitbank of a mine under the Metalliferous Mines Regulation Acts, 1872 and 1875 (35-6 V. c. 77 and 38-9 V. c. 39) being a Quarry or Pitbank to which the said Sub-section applies, the first-aid box or cupboard required by the said Sub-section to be provided and maintained shall comply with the following standard:—

Each standard first-aid box or cupboard shall be distinctively marked with a white cross on a red ground and shall contain at least:—

- (i) A copy of the First-aid leaflet (Form N.I. 923) issued by the Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland;
- (ii) A sufficient number (not less than two dozen) of small sterilised dressings for injured fingers;
- (iii) A sufficient number (not less than one dozen) of medium size sterilised dressings for injured hands or feet;
- (iv) A sufficient number (not less than one dozen) of large sterilised dressings for other injured parts;
- (v) A sufficient number of sterilised burn dressings (small and large);
- (vi) A sufficient supply of sterlised cotton wool in $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. packets;
- (vii) A two per cent. alcoholic solution of iodine;
- (viii) A bottle of sal volatile, having the dose and mode of administration indicated on the label;
- (ix) Eye drops, prepared as described in the First-aid leaflet (Form N.I. 923);
 - (x) A supply of suitable splints and cotton wool or other material for padding;
- (xi) A supply of adhesive plaster;
- (xii) A tourniquet;
- (xiii) One dozen roller bandages;
- (xiv) Half a dozen triangular bandages;
- (xv) Safety pins.

Provided that items (x) to (xv) inclusive need not be included in the first-aid box or cupboard (a) where they are included in the equipment of an ambulance room at the Quarry or Pitbank or (b) if at least one box containing such items, and placed and maintained in accordance with the requirements of the said Sub-section, is separately provided.
