

Importation of Elm Trees (Prohibition) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1927.

Prohibition of Importation of Elm Trees.

1. For the prevention of the introduction of pests of the elm-tree, including *Graphium ulmi* and *Micrococcus ulmi*, the landing in Northern Ireland from any European country other than Great Britain, the Irish Free State, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man of any living elm tree is hereby prohibited.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-eighth day of February, 1927.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the Importation of Elm Trees (Prohibition) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1927.

Amendment of the Destructive Insects and Pests (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922.

1. The Destructive Insects and Pests (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922, shall be amended by—

(1) the addition to the First Schedule thereto of the following :—
“ (e) all unrooted cuttings and rooted plants of chrysanthemums.”

(2) the addition to the Second Schedule thereto of the following :—

“Chrysanthemum Midge (*Diarthronomyia hypogaea*, F. Low).”

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the date thereof.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the Destructive Insects and Pests (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922, Amendment Order, 1927.

(Sale of Diseased Plants.)

Definitions.

1. In this Order :—“The Ministry” means the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland; “Inspector” means an Inspector of the Ministry. “Authorised person” means any person authorised by the Ministry.

The expression “Plant” shall include tree and shrub and the seeds, tubers, bulbs, layers, cuttings or any other parts of a plant.

Prohibition of Sale of Diseased Plants, etc.

2. No person shall sell, offer or expose for sale or cause to be sold, offered or exposed for sale for planting, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, or any plant which bears evidence of having been substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order.

Information to be given as to Diseased Plants.

3. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman or otherwise has had in his possession for sale or has sold, offered or exposed for sale, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the schedule to this Order, or any plant which bears evidence of having been substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this
