Part Year Licensing.

THE ROAD VEHICLES (PART-YEAR LICENSING) ORDER, 1932,
DATED 15TH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1932, MADE BY THE
MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND.

1932. No. 11.

The Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland in exercise of the powers conferred on the Ministry by Section 22 of the Finance Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5, c. 32), the Government of Ireland Act, 1920 (10 & 11 Geo. 5, c. 67), and all other powers in this behalf enabling the Ministry and without prejudice to the further exercise of those powers hereby orders as follows :—

1. A licence may be taken out for the period from 23rd day of March, 1932, to 30th day of June, 1932, and the duty payable on such licence shall be 27½ per cent. of the full annual rate of duty, together with the additional sum hereinafter provided :

2. A licence may be taken out for the period from the 23rd day of March, 1932, to 31st day of December, 1932, and the duty payable on such licence shall be an amount equal to three-fourths of the full annual rate of duty together with :—

- (a) a sum equal to five per cent. of that amount, and
- (b) the additional sum hereinafter provided.

3. The additional sum hereinbefore mentioned shall be :—

- (a) in the case of cycles, the sum of 2s. 6d., and
- (b) in the case of mechanically-propelled vehicles other than cycles—
 - (i) where the full annual rate of duty is less than £30, the sum of 5s.,
 - (ii) where the full annual rate of duty is £30 or over, the sum of 10s.

4. The Interpretation Act, 1921, applies for the purpose of the interpretation of this Order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament of Northern Ireland.

5. This Order may be cited as “ The Road Vehicles (Part-year Licensing) Order, 1932.”
