

## MASTER AND SERVANT.

### Workmen's Compensation : Industrial Diseases.

THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION (CATARACT) (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER, 1932, DATED JULY 29, 1932, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR, AMENDING THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION (INDUSTRIAL DISEASES) (NORTHERN IRELAND) CONSOLIDATION ORDER, 1929, MADE UNDER SECTION 44 OF THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1927 (17 & 18 GEO. 5, C. 16).

In pursuance of the power conferred by section 44, sub-section 3, of the Workmen's Compensation Act (Northern Ireland), 1927, the Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland hereby makes the following Order :—

1. Paragraph (3) of the Workmen's Compensation (Industrial Diseases) (Northern Ireland) Consolidation Order, 1929, (a) is hereby amended to read as follows :—

(3) A person suffering from cataract shall not be entitled to compensation under the provisions of the said section on account of that disease for more than six months in all, or for more than four months unless he has undergone an operation for cataract.

Provided

(a) that where the judge, committee or arbitrator is satisfied on the advice of the medical referee that an operation could not for medical reasons be performed within four months from the date of disablement, compensation may be continued for such further period and subject to such conditions as the judge, committee or arbitrator may direct ; and

(b) that where the judge, committee or arbitrator is satisfied on the advice of the medical referee that, having undergone an operation, the workman is still disabled by the cataract after the expiration of six months from the date of disablement, he shall be entitled to compensation so long as he remains disabled by the cataract ;

but in either case without prejudice to the right of review conferred by section 11 of the Act.

2. The item numbered 18 in the Schedule annexed to the said Order is hereby amended to read as follows :—

Description of Disease or Injury.	Description of Process.
18. Cataract caused by exposure to rays from molten or red-hot metal.	Any process normally involving exposure to rays from molten or red-hot metal in the manufacture of iron or steel, including re-heating and rolling of iron or steel.

3. This Order may be cited as the Workmen's Compensation (Cataract) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1932.

**Registration of Institutions.**

1932. No. 110.

In pursuance of sub-section (3) of section forty of the Mental Treatment Act (Northern Ireland), 1932 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland hereby makes the following regulations :—

1. The fees payable in respect of each registered institution or house on every application for or every issue or renewal of a certificate of registration under Part III of the Act shall be paid by means of stamps impressed on the form of application or the certificate of registration, as the case may be.

2. The said fees shall be deemed to be stamp duties and be under the management of the said Ministry, and all enactments for the time being in force relating to stamp duties and to dies, plates and other implements provided for the purpose of stamp duties,
