(Consolidation) Regulations, 1928," which were made by the Secretary of State on the fourteenth day of December, 1928, as applied to Northern Ireland by the Dangerous Drugs Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1929, shall henceforth have effect as if the following Article were substituted for Article 15 thereof:—

"15. The Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland may, subject to such conditions as he may prescribe, exempt any hospital or other public institution, or any nursing home registered under the Midwives and Nursing Homes Act (Northern Ireland), 1929, from any provision of these Regulations."

These Regulations may be cited as the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) (Amendment) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1935.

THE BLACK SCAB IN POTATOES (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER OF 1935, DATED 10TH DAY OF JULY, 1935.

1935. No. 86.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts (Northern Ireland) 1877 to 1934, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. Short Title.

This Order shall be known as "The Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland) Order of 1935."

II. Amendment of the Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland), Consolidation Order, 1930.

The following shall be substituted for Article 9-of the Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland) Consolidation Order, 1930:—

Restriction on Planting, Digging, and Moving Potatoes or Cabbage Plants within prohibited Areas.

9. Within the area described in the Fifth Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to as the prohibited areas) potatoes or cabbage plants shall not be grown, planted, dug, or otherwise raised out of the ground or moved from any field, plot, pit, shed, outhouse or other place on or used in connection with any farm, garden, cottage, plot or agricultural holding otherwise than under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence authorising same.

III. Commencement.

This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of July, nineteen hundred and thirty-five.

THE BLACK SCAB IN POTATOES (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER (No. 2) OF 1935, DATED 31ST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1935.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts (Northern Ireland), 1877 to 1934, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. Short Title.

This Order shall be known as "The Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland) Order (No. 2) of 1935."

II. Amendment of the Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland), Consolidation Order, 1930.

The Black Scab in Potatoes (Northern Ireland) Consolidation Order, 1930, shall be read and have effect as if the following were included in the Sixth Schedule (Additional Districts in which the growing and planting of Potatoes are restricted) thereto:

District No. 3 (Ballycastle Safety Zone).

A District comprising the townlands of (and all towns and villages included therein) Aghrunniaght, Balleny (part Southeast of road from Ballymoney to Ballycastle), Ballylig, Cape Castle, Carnduff, Carneatly, Carnmoon, Carnsampson, Clare, Cloghanmurry, Coolkenny, Cregganboy, Doonans, Glebe (E.D. Armoy), Gortconny, Knockans (E.D. Glenshesk), Magheramore, Mill Five Acre, Monanclogh, those portions of
