ORDER, DATED 20TH JULY, 1943, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS UNDER THE CONSTABULARY AND POLICE (IRELAND) ACT, 1919, AS APPLIED BY THE CONSTABULARY ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

I, THE RIGHT HONOURABLE WILLIAM LOWRY, K.C., Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by Section 2 of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, and by Section 4 of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919, as applied by the said Act of 1922, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, do hereby order that as from the 1st June, 1943, none of the following Orders shall apply to any woman appointed as a member of the Royal Ulster Constabulary, that is to say :—

The Royal Ulster Constabulary Pay Orders,
The Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances Orders,
The Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions Orders.

And I certify that sub-Section (2) of Section 4 of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919, which provides that a draft of any Order proposed to be made under the said Section shall be submitted to the representative body or bodies constituted by the Act and representing any rank or ranks affected, and that before making the Order the Ministry of Home Affairs shall consider any representations made by such body or bodies, has been fully observed.

In this Order the expression—

“ The Royal Ulster Constabulary Pay Orders ” means the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pay Orders, 1922 to 1941.

“ The Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances Orders ” means the Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances (Consolidation) Order, 1929, the Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances (Consolidation) (Amending) Order, 1931, the Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances (Consolidation) (Amending) Order, 1935, the Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances

(Consolidation) (Amending) Order, 1936, and the Royal Ulster Constabulary Allowances (Consolidation) (Amending) Order, 1938.

“The Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions Orders” means the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions Order, 1923, the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions (Amending) Order, 1925, the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions (Amending) Order, 1929, and the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions (Amending) Order, 1941.

This Order may be cited as the Royal Ulster Constabulary (Non-application of Pay, etc., Orders to Women Members) Order, 1943.

SCUTCH MILLS AND FLAX.

Fire Insurance.

REGULATIONS, DATED 16TH JANUARY, 1943, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER SECTION 7 OF THE SCUTCH MILLS AND FLAX (FIRE INSURANCE) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1943.

1943. No. 12.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland (hereinafter referred to as “the Ministry”), in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by section seven of the Scutch Mills and Flax (Fire Insurance) Act (Northern Ireland), 1942, hereby makes the following Regulations :—

Contributions to the Funds.

1. (1) Every person operating a scutch mill shall pay to the Ministry, to be credited to the Scutch Mills Fund, the sum of 2d. per stone in respect of all scutched flax fibre processed on commission at the Mill.
