EXPLANATORY NOTE.

(This note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

- 1. This Order, which has effect as from 5th December, 1946, fixes the annual holidays and certain other days of holidays (referred to as "customary holidays") which an employer is required to allow to a worker in relation to whom the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates.
- 2. The provisions of Order N.I.T.R.B. (38) cease to have effect when the new provisions under this Order come into force.

THE RETAIL BESPOKE TAILORING WAGES COUNCIL (NORTHERN IRELAND) WAGES REGULATION ORDER, 1946, DATED 9TH APRIL, 1946, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR UNDER SECTION 10 OF THE WAGES COUNCILS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1945 (9 & 10 Geo. 6, CH. 21).

Whereas the Ministry of Labour (hereinafter referred to as "The Ministry") has received from the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland) wages regulation proposals for fixing the minimum remuneration to be paid to the workers in relation to whom the Council operates in substitution for the minimum remuneration now payable to the said workers and for the amendment of the Order of the Ministry N.I.T.R.B. (38) dated the 29th day of July, 1940, confirming holidays provided for by a direction given, and holiday remuneration fixed, under the Holidays with Pay Act (Northern Ireland), 1938, in relation to the said workers (hereinafter referred to as "Order N.I.T.R.B. (38)");

Now, THEREFORE, the Ministry by virtue of section 10 of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945, and of every other power in that behalf hereby makes the following Order:—

Statutory minimum remuneration.

2 Geo. 6.

Ch. 24.

1.—(1) Subject to the provisions of paragraph (2) of this Article the provisions relating to statutory minimum remuneration set out in the First and Second Schedules hereto shall become effective as from the 15th day of April, 1946 (hereinafter referred to as "the specified date") and the Order of the Ministry N.I.T.R.B. (23) dated the 8th day of September, 1926, as amended by Orders N.I.T.R.B. (46), N.I.T.R.B. (48), N.I.T.R.B. (52) and N.I.T.R.B. (56) dated the 18th day of May, 1943, the 31st day of August, 1943, the 6th day of October, 1944, and the 6th day of November, 1945, respectively, shall thereupon cease to have effect.

- (2) Where as respects any worker who is paid wages at intervals not exceeding seven days the specified date does not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid, the provisions relating to statutory minimum remuneration set out in the First and Second Schedules hereto shall, as respects that worker, become effective as from the beginning of the next such period following the specified date and Order N.I.T.R.B. (23), as amended by Orders N.I.T.R.B. (46), N.I.T.R.B. (48), N.I.T.R.B. (52) and N.I.T.R.B. (56) shall cease to have effect in relation to that worker accordingly.
- 2. As from the specified date Order N.I.T.R.B. (38) shall have Holidays effect subject to the amendments set out in the Third Schedule to this and holiday remuneration.
- 3.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Short Title Wages Council (Northern Ireland) Wages Regulation Order, 1946. and Interpretation.
- (2) The Interpretation Act, 1921, applies to the interpretation 12 Geo. 5, of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Parlia-Ch. 4. ment of Northern Ireland.

RATES FOR CERTAIN MALE LEARNERS

PARAGRAPH 4.

During the first year of learnership a learner employed in Area A is entitled to receive 7s. 3d. per week of 48 hours and a learner employed in Area B is entitled to receive 4s. 3d. per week of 48 hours, provided that he is being instructed by a worker remunerated at piece rates of wages and that the work done by him during that period is credited to that worker; otherwise, the full general minimum time rate of 11s. or 6s. 9d., as the case may be, applies.

PARAGRAPH 5.

The general minimum time rates set out in paragraph 3 above for the fourth and fifth years of learnership apply only to workers whose instruction includes coat-making (i.e., the making of the entire garment); otherwise workers who have completed three years of learnership are entitled to the appropriate general minimum time rates according to age, as set out in paragraph 2 above, during the fourth and fifth years of their employment in the trade.

CALCULATION OF HOURLY RATES

PARAGRAPH 6.

For the purpose of calculating the minimum rate payable to workers of the classes specified in paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 in respect of each hour of employment the respective weekly rates must be divided by 48,

B. FEMALE WORKERS

The general minimum piece rates for female workers employed on any of the operations included in the Second Schedule to this Order are—

Two-thirds of the appropriate general minimum piece rates for male workers as specified in sub-paragraph A of this paragraph.

PARAGRAPH 15.

The general minimum piece rates specified in paragraph 14 apply only in cases where workers are remunerated on the "log" system of payment; otherwise each piece rate paid must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate set out in paragraphs 7 to 12 above.

PARAGRAPH 16.

For the purpose of the application of the general minimum piece rates specified in paragraph 14 the materials from which garments are made shall be classified in the manner set out in the Second Schedule to this Order.

OVERTIME

PARAGRAPH 18.

Overtime rates are payable as follows:-

A. WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME WORK:

- (i) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, Time-and-a-quarter, except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of (iii) and (iv) of this sub-paragraph.
- (ii) For the first two hours of overtime on any day except Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sunday or public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.
- (iii) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sunday and public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, and for all overtime on Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Time-and-a-half.
- (iv) For all time worked on Sunday and on public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, DOUBLE TIME.

Overtime rates are payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a public holiday customarily observed in the establishment) the number of hours worked exceeds 9, or in the case of Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor) exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that---

- (a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance on five days a week only, overtime rates are payable only where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.
- (b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Saturday in alternate weeks only, overtime rates are payable for all hours worked in excess of 50 in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required.

B. WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE WORK:

Workers employed on piece work are entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, IN ADDITION to piece rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate, an amount equal to one-quarter, one-half or the whole of the appropriate piece work basis time rate, according as the overtime rate which would have been payable under the provisions of sub-paragraph A of this paragraph, if the worker had been employed on time work, would have been equivalent to Time-and-a-quarter, Time-and-a-half or Double Time respectively.

PARAGRAPH 19.

In the case of workers employed on operations to which the general minimum piece rates specified in paragraphs 14 and 17 of this Schedule apply, piece rates calculated to yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate, shall be held to include all such general minimum piece rates.

PARAGRAPH 20.

For the purpose of paragraph 18A, the expressions time-and-a-quarter, time-and-a-half and double time mean, respectively, one-and-a-quarter times, one-and-a-half times or twice the amount of the general minimum time rate otherwise applicable.

PARAGRAPH 21.

Where a worker is of the Jewish religion and is employed subject to the provisions of Section 96 of the Factories Act (Northern Ireland), 1938,(a) on Sunday instead of Saturday, the overtime rates apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions relating to overtime, the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

THE HOURS OF WORK OF WOMEN AND YOUNG PERSONS ARE SUBJECT TO THE PRO-VISIONS OF THE FACTORIES ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1938 (a).

DEFINITIONS

DEFINITION AND CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT OF LEARNERS

PARAGRAPH 22.

A male or female learner in the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade is a worker who :-

- A. (i) In the case of a MALE LEARNER to coat-making (i.e., the making of the entire garment) only, or to coat-making in conjunction with other branches of the trade, has not been employed for more than five years in the said Trade.
 - (ii) In the case of a MALE LEARNER other than a learner of the class specified in (i) above, has not been employed for more than three years in the said Trade.
- B. In the case of a FEMALE LEARNER, has not been employed for more than four years in the said Trade; and
 - C. In the case of MALE and FEMALE LEARNERS
 - (i) is employed during the whole or a substantial part of his or her time in learning any branch or process of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade, as specified in paragraph 26, by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and
 - (ii) has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Wages Council, or has made application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration.

Provided that the certification or registration of a learner shall become invalid if at any time during learnership the provisions set out herein relating thereto are not complied with.

Provided also that an employer may employ a learner on his or her first employment in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade, as specified in paragraph 26, without a certificate or registration for a probationary period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of the employment as a learner being continued thereafter, the probationary period shall be included in the period of learnership.

PARAGRAPH 23.

For the purpose of determining the period of employment in the trade and the general minimum time rate applicable to a learner, the following provisions shall apply:—

- (1) Any female learner who has been previously employed in :-
 - (a) any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade (as defined in paragraph 26), or
 - (b) any branch of the Readymade and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade coming within the scope of the Readymade and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland), or
 - (c) any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade coming within the scope of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Wages Council (Northern Ireland)

shall be entitled to count the whole period of such previous employment.

(2) Any period of time spent by a male or female learner learning the trade in an industrial school shall count only as regards one-half of its duration in determining the period of learnership or employment in the trade.

PARAGRAPH 24.

Notwithstanding compliance with the conditions specified above, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if he or she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of his or her parent or guardian.

GENERAL.

WAITING TIME

PARAGRAPH 25.

- (1) A worker shall be entitled to payment of statutory minimum remuneration as aforesaid during all the time during which he is present on the premises of his employer unless he is so present either without his employer's consent express or implied, or for some purpose unconnected with his work and other than that of waiting for work to be given to him to perform.
- (2) A piece worker shall during any time during which he is present as aforesaid and is not doing piece work be entitled to payment of the general minimum time rate applicable to workers of the class to which he belongs.

(3) Provisions (1) and (2) do not apply when—

- (a) a worker is present on his employer's premises by reason only of the fact that he is resident thereon, or
- (b) a worker is present on his employer's premises during normal meal times in a room or place in which no work is being done and is not waiting for work to be given to him to perform.

APPLICABILITY OF STATUTORY MINIMUM REMUNERATION

PARAGRAPH 26.

The statutory minimum remuneration aforesaid shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945, to workers in relation to whom the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates, that is to say, workers employed in Northern Ireland in the trade specified in the Schedule to the Trade Boards (Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade, Northern Ireland) (Constitution, Proceedings and Meetings) Regulations, 1924 (a), dated 16th September, 1924, namely:—

Those branches of men's, women's, boys' and girls' bespoke tailoring in which the tailor supplies the garments direct to the individual wearer and employs the worker direct.

A worker shall be deemed to be employed by the tailor direct if employed by another worker in the employ of the tailor to whom statutory minimum remuneration fixed by a wages regulation order is applicable, or if employed by a sub-contractor engaged in cutting, making or finishing garments exclusively for the tailor in the tailor's shop or in a building of which the shop forms part or to which the shop is attached;

INCLUDING :-

- (1) (a) the altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of men's, women's, boys' and girls' tailored garments where carried out for the individual wearer by a tailor who employs the worker direct, as defined above;
 - (b) the cleaning of such garments where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the repairing, renovating or remaking of the garments;
- (2) the lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;
- (3) all processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;
- (4) the packing and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

BUT EXCLUDING :-

- all or any of the above-menioned operations where carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments;
- (2) the making of head-gear.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

STATEMENT OF TIME ALLOWANCES

(Expressed in Log Hours and Fractions thereof)

This statement sets out the time to be allowed for the various items of work in order to ascertain the general minimum piece rates payable to male and female workers in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 14 of the First Schedule to this Order, or any amendment or variation thereof.

The statement applies only to the garments mentioned.

In the count of a garment only those operations actually performed are to be included.

The respective time allowances for the several operations set out herein apply to the making of garments from First Class Material only (as defined below). Where Second or Third Class Material (as defined below) is made up, the time allowance for each operation shall be proportionate to the times set out at (a), (b) and (c) at the conclusion of the start in each case.

DEFINITIONS OF MATERIALS

For the purpose of the application of the time allowances set out herein the materials from which garments are made up shall be classified in the manner specified hereunder, viz.:—

- (a) First Class Materials shall be deemed to consist of Superfine Cloth, Dress Beaver, Venetian all Covert Coatings with a perceptible face, Kersey, Buckskin, Doeskin, Satara, Treble-milled Melton or West of England Coating, Velvet, Velveteen or Velvet Cord, Bedford Cord, Double-milled Whipcord, very fine Dress Worsted Coating, Plush, Silk, Satin, Quilting, Cassimere, Fur, Knitted Vests, faced heavy Hunting Vestings.
- (b) Second Class Materials shall be deemed to consist of Fancy or Worsted Coatings and Trouserings or Meltons (not being Treble-milled Meltons), Naps, Witney, Pilots, and unfaced Covert Coatings, Silk Mixture, Vicuna, heavy Milled Angola, Saxony and Cheviot, West of England and Chipping Norton Tweeds, Worsted Serges and all other Serges except Cheviot Serges, Angola or Tropical Tweed, Corduroy and Moleskin, Drill and Fancy Vestings.
- (c) THIRD CLASS MATERIALS shall be deemed to consist of all Cheviots other than those included in Second Class (as set out in (b) above); Cheviot Serge, Saxony Tweeds, Freizes, Fleeces, Harris and other Homespun Tweeds, Tennis or Cricket Flannel, Duck and Cotton.

THE ABOVE CLASSIFICATION SHALL APPLY IRRESPECTIVE OF THE COLOUR, OR MATERIALS EXCEPT WHERE OTHERWISE PROVIDED.

GENTLEMEN'S COATS, JACKETS, ETC.

LOUNGE JACKET

Preamble.—Plain S.B. Frock coats measuring 48 inches at chest or 44 inches at waist, from lapel seam to lapel seam, extra, 12; for each additional 2 inches or part of 2 inches, 2.

Extra and under Length:-

44 inches and not exceeding 46 inches, extra, ½. For each additional 2 inches, or part of 2 inches, \frac{1}{2}. Under 36 inches to be reduced at the same ratio.

SILK FACINGS, ETC. :-

Short silk facings, 9 inches from step, $1\frac{1}{2}$; if to waist, 2.

If back to scye, extra, 1.

Stitching round front scye, ½; gorge, ½. Each row of stitching in shoulders or sides, ½.

Half-inch quilting, sides, half way down, 1½. Half-inch quilting, back lining to run with sides, 2. Quarter-inch quilting, sides, half way down, 3½.

back lining to run with sides, 4.

All other quilting to be paid on proportionate basis.

Cuts, etc. :-

Waist cuts in forepart, including lining or facings.

Not exceeding 6 inches long, if seamed, if uncut,

if stoted, if outside, rentered, Bottom of forepart, drawn in with thread or bridle, canvas cut, 1/2.

Bottom of forepart, drawn in with thread or bridle, if facing cut, 3.

Cut across breast, \frac{1}{2}; cuts in gorge, not exceeding 2 inches each pair, \frac{1}{4}. Cuts in top of skirt, each pair if seamed or stoted, ½; if rentered, 1.

Puffs in linings or facings, each pair, ½.

HAIRCLOTH, ETC. :-

Haircloth through shoulder, bound, 1.

Haircloth through shoulder, if 4 inches below level of scye, 12.

Haircloth through shoulder, if continued to waist, 2.

Double canvas through shoulder, ½; right through, sewed together and breast

Shoulder or back pads, not exceeding 3 plies, ½.

Built shoulders, 1.

If no back lining, continuation of side lining to shoulder with wadding equal to

If no padding or wadding, $\frac{1}{2}$ hour each to be deducted. Short bridles, $\frac{1}{4}$; long bridles, $\frac{1}{2}$; back seam taped, $\frac{1}{2}$. Bogie on top of back lining, $\frac{1}{2}$; binding bogie, $\frac{1}{4}$.

Pockets, etc.:-

Inside, breast, or skirt pocket, $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches, plain, $\frac{3}{4}$. With welt or bound, 1; if stitched behind binding, extra, $\frac{1}{4}$.

EXTRAS ON FROCK COATS - continued.

With welt or bound, from 6½ inches to 10 inches (both inclusive), hole and button,

1½.

Ticket pocket in waist seam, plain, ½; inside welt or flap, 1.

Ticket pocket in waist seam, plain, 2: if with flaps, 3.

Full sized pockets in waist seam, plain, 2; if with flaps, 3. Flaps on waist, 1; with pockets under, $2\frac{1}{2}$. Pockets and flaps below waist seam, 3; if flaps out and in, extra, $\frac{1}{2}$.

If no plait pockets, 1 hour to be deducted from putting in and fixing up pockets and waist tacks.

Outside breast pocket with welt, corded, stitched or bound, 1½.

Cording bluff-front edges and one back, 2; collar, ½; sleeves, ½.

Binding back-stitched on one side and felled on the other, front edges and one back,

3; collar, \(\frac{3}{4}\); sleeves, \(\frac{3}{4}\).

Flat braid, front edges, 3; one back, \(\frac{1}{2}\); double to the waist, \(\frac{3}{4}\); collar, \(\frac{3}{4}\); sleeves, 1; bottom, including dust hole, 1; open plaits, extra, \(\frac{1}{4}\).

Stitching front of skirt and one back in raw edge, 1.

First row of stitching in bluff-front edges and one back, 2; collar, $\frac{1}{2}$; sleeves, $\frac{1}{2}$. Second row of stitching in front edges and one back, $2\frac{1}{2}$; collar, $\frac{3}{4}$; sleeves, $\frac{3}{4}$.

Edges, stoted, $\frac{1}{2}$ extra. In treble-milled goods, each row on whole coat, extra, $\frac{1}{2}$. Jetting or piping edges with cloth (cord in piping), front edges and one back, 31; collar, 2; sleeves, 1.

if with velvet, extra, 1.

Seams :-

Single stitched raw, per yard, ½; turned in (not seamed), per yard, ‡; seams, seamed and stitched, seamed and double stitched, seamed opened and stitched each side of seam or second row in raw seams, per yard, 1 hour each row.

Seams felled and stitched equal to double stitched raw.

Treble-milled goods, 10 minutes extra per yard.

Tabs, etc.:-

Tabs on skirt or small flies, one hole and button, each, ½. Small tab on collar, one hole and button, ½. Swivel tab on collar, #; two holes and buttons, 1. Large tab on collar — each hole and button, extra, 1. Turning in and surging up bottom, \(\frac{1}{4}\).

Dust hole, not exceeding 4 inches, \(\frac{1}{4}\); if dust hole faced, extra, \(\frac{1}{4}\). Lining, loose across bottom, both sides turned in, 1.

SLEEVES, ETC. :-

Short vents, up to and including $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches, $\frac{1}{4}$; vents, over $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches up to and including 4 inches, $\frac{1}{2}$; vents, over 4 inches up to and including 5 inches, $\frac{5}{8}$; vents, over 5 inches up to and including 6 inches, \(\frac{1}{4}\); one hole and button on each vent, \(\frac{1}{2}\); two holes and buttons on each vent, \(\frac{1}{4}\); binding, cording, braiding, or stitching vents, \(\frac{1}{4}\) extra; hand filling, \(\frac{1}{4}\); plain round cuffs, \(\frac{1}{4}\); hand facings, \(\frac{1}{2}\); if velvet, cross stitched or felled, $\frac{1}{2}$ extra; forming uncut cuffs filled up, equal to round cuffs, $\frac{3}{4}$.

Forearm of sleeve thrown underneath, $\frac{1}{4}$; if over 1 inch, extra, $\frac{1}{2}$.

GENERAL:

For each two rows of extra padding above 16 in each lapel, \frac{1}{4}. Capping sleeve tops (no linings under), ½; if linings under, ¾, Interlining sleeves, $\frac{1}{2}$; sides and back, $\frac{1}{2}$. Overlinings (finished below), sleeves, 2; sides and back, 2. Tacking buttons, each 4 buttons, 1.

NORFOLK JACKET

To start same as LOUNGE JACKET in each class.

EXTRAS ON NORFOLK JACKET:-

Two laid-over plaits in front, $1\frac{1}{2}$.

Two pockets in plaits, 1.

Two box plaits in fronts, 2.

If made separate and felled on, each extra, $\frac{1}{2}$.

One box plait on back, when no back seam, $\frac{1}{2}$; if made separate and felled on, 1; if with back seam, $1\frac{1}{2}$.

Preamble.—Single-breasted, with side, back, and shoulder seams, front edges and collar stitched raw or bluff, two outside pockets with welts, canvas in breast, padded lapels (ten rows), facings filled up with lining, side and back linings; padding and wadding flash basted in or prepared for machine, one ply of wadding or tweed in sleeve tops, plain sleeves without stitching, hand filling or facing, linings fastened to seams, four holes and buttons on breast, four rows of stitching in stand, and six rows of padding in lye of collar.

Preamble.—Plain S.B. coat with side, back and shoulder seams, front edges and collar stitched raw or bluff, two outside pockets with welts or fixed flaps, canvas in breast, padded lapels, facings pieced out in shoulder or padding under lining, breast and back linings, one ply of wadding or tweed in sleeve tops, plain sleeves, without stitching, hand filling or facings, linings fastened to seams, five holes on breast, four rows of stitching in stand and six of padding in lye of collar; length from 37 to 45 inches in the case of Chesterfield coats and not to exceed 54 inches in the case of Ulster Coats.

VENTS, ETC. :-

Plain vent in back seam, not exceeding 12 inches long, $\frac{1}{2}$; bearer or facing seamed or stoted, $\frac{1}{2}$ extra each side; stitching vent, $\frac{1}{2}$; each hole and button on vent, $\frac{1}{2}$; fly in vent, $\frac{1}{2}$; vents in sides, $\frac{41}{2}$ inches, $\frac{1}{2}$; if faced extra, $\frac{1}{2}$; turning in and fastening up inturn round bottom, 1.

EDGES, ETC. :-

Edges seamed and stitched or swelled, front edges, 1½; flaps, ½; collar, ½; sleeves, ½;

fly, 1. Seaming and opening or felling and stitching or cording front edges, 2; flaps, ½; collar, $\frac{1}{2}$; sleeves, $\frac{1}{2}$; fly, $\frac{1}{4}$.

Second row of stitching; front edges, 2; collar, \(\frac{3}{4}\); sleeves, \(\frac{3}{4}\); flaps, \(\frac{1}{2}\); fly, \(\frac{1}{4}\); edges

stoted, extra, ½.

In treble-milled goods each row in whole garment, extra, ½. Binding front edges, $1\frac{3}{4}$; flaps, $\frac{1}{2}$; collar, $\frac{1}{2}$; sleeves, $\frac{3}{4}$; fly, $\frac{1}{4}$.

Binding, cording, or stitching round bottom, #.

Facing bottom with cloth, $\frac{1}{2}$; all stitching 1 hour per yard, per row. Jetting or piping edges with cloth (cord in piping), front edges, $3\frac{1}{4}$; collar, $\frac{3}{4}$; flaps, $\frac{3}{4}$; sleeves, 1; fly, ½; round bottom, 1; velvet extra, 1.

Flat braid, front edges, 2; collar, $\frac{3}{4}$; sleeves, 1; two flaps and ticket flap, $\frac{1}{2}$; double to waist, 1; to the bottom, $\frac{1}{2}$ extra; round bottom, 1; outside breast pocket, welt or flap, \(\frac{1}{4}\); vents in sleeves, \(\frac{1}{4}\).

If lining felled up from bottom in binding or braiding extra, \(\frac{1}{2}\).

Pockets jetted top and bottom, $\frac{1}{2}$ each pair, chamois pockets, large, $\frac{1}{2}$ each; small, $\frac{1}{4}$ each if, flaps out and in, $\frac{1}{2}$ each pair; ticket pocket with welt or jetted, 1; with flap, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra; plain patch pocket, 1; two sewings, $1\frac{1}{4}$; with flap, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra flap to go out and in (if corners filled up), $\frac{1}{4}$ extra; outside breast pocket with welt, stitched, corded, or bound, $1\frac{1}{4}$; if with flap, plain, $1\frac{1}{2}$; if stitched, corded or bound, $1\frac{3}{4}$; if out and in, extra, 1.

HAIRCLOTH, ETC.:-

Haircloth through shoulders bound, 1; if 4 inches below level of scye, $\frac{1}{2}$ extra; double canvas through shoulders, $\frac{1}{2}$; shoulders or back pads not more than 3 plies, $\frac{1}{2}$; built shoulders, 1; bogie on top of back lining, $\frac{1}{2}$; taping back, $\frac{1}{2}$; bottom, $\frac{1}{4}$; vent, $\frac{1}{2}$; binding bogie, 1.

SLEEVES, ETC. :-

Short vents, up to and including $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches, $\frac{1}{4}$; vents, over $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches up to and including 4 inches, $\frac{1}{2}$; vents, over 4 inches up to and including 5 inches, $\frac{1}{3}$; vents, over 5 inches up to and including 6 inches, $\frac{3}{4}$; one hole and button on each vent, $\frac{1}{4}$; two holes and buttons on each vent, $\frac{3}{4}$; cording, binding, stitching, or braiding vent, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra; round cuffs, $\frac{3}{4}$; hand filling, $\frac{1}{4}$; hand facings, $\frac{1}{2}$; if velvet; cross-stitched or felled, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra; forming uncut cuffs, filled up equal to round cuffs, $\frac{3}{4}$; forearm thrown underneath, $\frac{1}{4}$; if over one inch, $\frac{1}{2}$.

Capping sleeves (no limings under), $\frac{1}{4}$: if linings under. $\frac{3}{4}$: interlining sleeves $\frac{1}{4}$:

Capping sleeves (no limings under), ½; if linings under, ½; interlining sleeves, ½; interlining right through or preparing all linings for machine quilting without creas-

ing, $2\frac{1}{2}$.

EXTRAS ON CHESTERFIELD OR SAC OVERCOAT - continued.

RAGLAN SLEEVES :---

If backarm and forearm seams only, extra $\frac{1}{2}$; with shoulder cut, extra, 1; with three seams right through, extra, 11/2.

The time above set forth is for plain sleeves without any stitching or fit on; there is consequently no allowance for basting up sleeves or basting in sleeves for fit on, all such basting to be paid extra.

No deduction to be made for shoulder padding not in the garment, this being already provided for in the start of the Chesterfield coat.

Basting in Raglan sleeves to be ½ hour (that is ¼ hour extra on ordinary sleeve).

Full baste up of three-seam Raglan sleeve to be 4 hour in all.

Double outlets on each pair of seams 1 hour extra.

Cuts, etc.:--

Short bridles, $\frac{1}{4}$; long bridles, $\frac{1}{2}$; cuts in gorge, not exceeding 2 inches, each pair, $\frac{1}{4}$. Gorge drawn in with staytape and canvas cut equal to short cuts, 1. Cuts in gorge, 4 inches each pair, ½; cut down and across, ½.

Cuts under arm from scye to pocket, 1; if stoted, 1½; if uncut, 1½.

Puffs in linings or facings, each pair, \frac{1}{2}.

SEAMS, ETC. :-

Single stitching, raw, per yard, $\frac{1}{2}$; turned in not seamed, per yard, $\frac{3}{4}$; seamed and stitched or double stitched, seamed, opened, and stitched each side of seam or second row in raw seams, 1 hour per yard each row; seams felled and stitched equal to double stitched raw; treble milled goods ten minutes per yard extra.

SILK FACINGS, ETC. :-

Linings brought forward to form silk facings behind the holes, 1½; if to the front edge, 2; separate silk facings, 9 inches from step, 1½; over 9 up to and including 15 inches from step, 2; full length, 3.

Full length silk facings to the front edge with cloth or domett under, 4; if no cloth

or domett under, 3.

Edging or strapping velvet collar, 1.

Extra padding in collar to be paid for each four rows, \(\frac{1}{2}\); collar over 3 inches in overlye paid same as Ulster collar (see below).

Swivel tab on collar, \(\frac{3}{4}\); two holes and button, 1; each extra hole and button, \(\frac{1}{4}\).

EXTRAS ON ULSTER OR TRAVELLING COAT:

For every additional 3 inches or part thereof in length, extra,

Double shoulders not more than two inches below scye, felled and stitched, 2; including back, 3; if over two inches below scye, extra, $\frac{1}{2}$; and for additional two inches, ½; for all points over four each side, ½ per pair; double sleeve tops, extra, 1.
 Ticket pocket in sleeve, 1; if with flap, extra, ½.
 Back straps seamed in with wide seam, two holes and buttons, 1½; second sewing,

\frac{1}{2} extra; slit in seam for strap to go out and in, \frac{1}{2}.

Pointed strap, with one hole and button at each end, 1½; second sewing, extra, ½ Waist belt right round, two holes and buttons, $2\frac{1}{2}$; second sewing, 1; loops at side $\frac{1}{2}$. Straps at hands, seamed in one hole and two buttons, 1½; second sewing, extra, ½. Tabs on front, ½ each.

Hoods:

Hood seamed in with collar, one seam right through, with drawing string or elastic, 2; if with band and five holes and buttons or hooks and eyes, 4; if lined or taped, 1 extra; cuts in hood each pair, \(\frac{1}{4}\); if taped, extra, \(\frac{1}{4}\).

Capes, etc.:—

Cape not exceeding 18 inches long (measuring down the back) with two shoulder seams right through one sewing in edge, five holes and buttons, or hooks and eyes round gorge, $4\frac{1}{2}$.

EXTRAS ON ULSTER OR TRAVELLING COAT - continued.

Felling two seams or lining, extra, 1; back seam, $\frac{1}{4}$; if felled, $\frac{1}{2}$; band on gorge, $\frac{1}{4}$; each hole and button on front (large or small), $\frac{1}{4}$; small tabs, one hole and button, $\frac{1}{2}$ each.

Tabs or straps on front of cape, one hole on each end, 1 hour each.

Second sewing in each, \(\frac{1}{4}\) extra; leather strap and buckle, \(\frac{1}{2}\).

Second sewing in front of cape, 1 hour.

For every additional four inches in length, extra, $\frac{1}{2}$.

Plugged clasps, each pair, 1.

COLLARS :-

Collar, if over three inches in overlye, for each half inch $\frac{3}{4}$; swivel tab, $\frac{5}{4}$; tab with two holes and buttons, 1; each hole and button, extra, $\frac{1}{4}$.

VENTS, ETC. :-

Plain vent in back seam, not exceeding twenty inches long, $\frac{3}{4}$; vent with step and double tack, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra; vent faced, $\frac{1}{4}$ extra each side; each hole and button on vent, $\frac{1}{4}$; fly in vent, $\frac{1}{2}$.

Felling seams in Ulster equal to linings; taping seams, facings, etc., first sewing of tape equal to linings, second sewing 20 minutes per yard, basting tape for machine equal to one sewing.

OTHER EXTRAS NOT MENTIONED, SAME AS CHESTERFIELD COAT.

FUR ON CHESTERFIELD OR ULSTER:-

Body and sleeve linings (set ready prepared), except putting in sleeves, 5; if linings finished below, 3 hours extra; fur collar, 2; if roll collar, 1 extra; fur lapels, 2; fur cuffs, 2; fur over edge to form binding, 2. Cotton or linen flash basted on fur, 2.

Crow's toes or drop loops across breast, each 1.

Loops on edge equal to holes.

COVERT COAT OR SHORT CHESTERFIELD

Same as Chesterfield with the following extras:-

Making strapping for seams, 20 minutes per yard.

Cutting raw strapping for seams, 10 minutes per yard.

Making broad strap for back seam, ½.

Basting or strapping when handsewn, 15 minutes per yard.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

HOLIDAYS AND HOLIDAY REMUNERATION

The provisions of Order N.I.T.R.B. (38) dated 29th July, 1940, shall have effect subject to the following amendments:—

- (1) Any reference in the Schedule thereto to a minimum rate of wages fixed by the Trade Board shall be read as including a reference to statutory minimum remuneration fixed by a wages regulation order pursuant to proposals of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland) and the reference in paragraph 9 of the said Schedule to the Holidays with Pay Act (Northern Ireland), 1938, shall be construed as including a reference to the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945; and
- (2) The amount of any holiday remuneration due to any worker under the said Order shall be calculated in accordance with the provisions of Part II of the ... Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

- 1. The First Schedule to this Order, read in conjunction with the Second Schedule thereof, sets out the statutory minimum remuneration payable as from 15th April, 1946, to the workers in relation to whom the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates.
- 2. The Third Schedule amends the Direction for Holidays with Pay confirmed by the Ministry's Order N.I.T.R.B. (38) dated 29th July, 1940, by a number of formal amendments necessitated by the enactment of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945.
- 3. The provisions of Order N.I.T.R.B. (23), as amended by Orders N.I.T.R.B. (46), N.I.T.R.B. (48), N.I.T.R.B. (52) and N.I.T.R.B. (56), cease to have effect when the new provisions under this Order come into force.
