Import of Poultry and Eggs

ORDER, DATED 23RD MAY, 1947, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1894 TO 1935.

1947. No. 80

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland (hereinafter referred to as "the Ministry") by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Diseases of Animals Acts (Northern Ireland), 1894 to 1935, as amended and adapted by any other enactments and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

- Extension of Definition of Animals.** 1. For the purposes of Section 22 of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, (hereinafter referred to as the "principal Act") the definition of "animals" contained in Section 59 (1) of the principal Act shall be extended so that the same shall for those purposes comprise poultry.
- Definition.** 2. "Poultry" for the purposes of this Order means live poultry of the following kinds :—domestic fowls, turkeys, geese, ducks, guinea fowls, pigeons, pheasants and partridges.
- Import of Poultry and Eggs.** 3. A person shall not bring, or cause to be brought, into Northern Ireland poultry or eggs for hatching except under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence issued by the Ministry or a duly authorised officer thereof.
- Issue of Licences.** 4. Where, on an application for a licence under the last foregoing article, a person satisfies the Ministry that the issue of such a licence to him—

(a) would not result in the spread of contagious disease in poultry in Northern Ireland; and

(b) would not create a risk of such spread of disease as aforesaid; a licence shall be granted to that person.

5. No liability, financial or otherwise, shall attach to the Ministry in connection with any poultry or eggs dealt with in any manner under the provisions of this Order. Ministry's Liability.

6. Any person committing, or aiding, abetting, counselling, or procuring the commission of any breach of the provisions of this Order is liable, on summary conviction, to the penalties provided by the Diseases of Animals Acts (Northern Ireland), 1894 to 1935. Offences.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-third day of May, One thousand nine hundred and forty-seven. Commencement.

8. While this Order is in force the provisions of the Poultry Diseases Order (Northern Ireland), 1947, shall not have effect: Consequential provisions as to S. R. & O. (N.I.) 1947, No. 28.
 Provided that nothing in this article shall affect the operation of that Order as respects anything done before this Order comes into force.

9. This Order may be cited as the Import of Poultry and Eggs Order (Northern Ireland), 1947. Short Title.

Prescribed Dipping

1. All sheep within Northern Ireland during the period from 29th September to 1st November, 1947, shall with the exceptions as specified
