

2. In Order LXVI (which relates to notices, printing, copies, etc.) the following rule shall be substituted for Rule 3:—

“3.—(1) All pleadings, affidavits, orders, accounts, notices, writs and other documents required for filing or use in the Supreme Court or in any of the offices thereof, shall be legibly written or printed, or partly written and partly printed, on foolscap paper of durable quality with an inner margin one and three-quarter inches wide.

(2) The paper to be used for the pleadings and other documents referred to in the preceding paragraph shall be cream-wove tub-sized all-rag writing paper of a substance of not less than 13 lbs. per 500 foolscap sheets.”

**The Supreme Court Vacations (Northern Ireland)
Order in Council, 1959.**

BY THE GOVERNOR IN THE PRIVY COUNCIL OF NORTHERN IRELAND

I, John de Vere, Baron Wakehurst, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, in pursuance and by virtue of section thirty of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act (Ireland) 1877(a), as that enactment applies to the Supreme Court of Judicature of Northern Ireland(b) and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, upon the report or recommendation of the Council of Judges of the said Supreme Court made with the consent of the Lord Chief Justice do by this Order alter the Vacations to be observed in the several Courts and offices of the said Supreme Court in the manner appearing in the Schedule hereto.

This Order may be cited as the Supreme Court Vacations (Northern Ireland) Order in Council, 1959, and shall come into force on the 15th day of April, 1959.
