**ROYAL ULSTER CONSTABULARY (WOMEN MEMBERS)****Pay**

ORDER, DATED 24TH APRIL, 1959, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS UNDER THE CONSTABULARY AND POLICE (IRELAND) ACT, 1919, AS APPLIED BY THE CONSTABULARY ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

I, the Right Honourable W. W. B. Topping, Q.C., Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section two of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922(a), and by sub-section (1) of section four of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919(b), as applied by the said Act of 1922, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, do hereby order as follows, and I certify that sub-section (2) of section four of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919, which provides that a draft of any Order proposed to be made under the said section shall be submitted to the representative body or bodies constituted by the Act and representing any rank or ranks affected and that before making the Order the Ministry shall consider any representations made by such body or bodies, has been fully observed:—

1. Subject to the conditions governing the management and control of the force the pay of members of the several ranks mentioned in the Schedule to this Order shall be in accordance with the rates, scales and conditions prescribed in that Schedule.

2. There may be deducted from a member's pay the amount of any sickness benefit under the National Insurance Act (Northern Ireland), 1946, to which she was or may be entitled after 5th January, 1949, or injury benefit under the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act (Northern Ireland), 1946, to which she was or may be entitled on or after 5th July, 1948.

3. In this Order:—

“existing member” means a member who was serving in the force on the 22nd April, 1958;

“the force” means the Royal Ulster Constabulary;

“Inspector General” means the Inspector General of the Royal Ulster Constabulary;

“member” means a woman member of the force and “members” shall be construed accordingly;

“the Ministry” means the Ministry of Home Affairs.

4. This Order may be cited as the Royal Ulster Constabulary (Women Members) Pay Order, 1959 and shall have effect as from the 22nd April, 1958.

5. The Royal Ulster Constabulary (Women Members) Pay Order, 1958(c), is hereby revoked.

1. In determining the point at which an existing member shall enter the scale of pay in this schedule prescribed for her rank, credit shall be given to her for past service in that rank since her latest promotion thereto by reckoning it for purposes of increment, except that in the case of an existing sergeant who enters the scale prescribed for her rank the following shall apply:—

- (a) the rate of pay of a sergeant who was promoted to that rank on or after the twenty-third day of April, 1957, and before the twenty-second day of April, 1958, shall from the twenty-second day of April, 1958, be in accordance with a scale which begins with the rate of £670 a year and increases on the twenty-second day of April, 1959, to the rate of £695 a year and on the twenty-second day of April, 1960, to the rate of £715 a year;
