EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

This Order, which comes into operation on 25th June, 1964, sets out the statutory minimum remuneration payable in substitution for that fixed by the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Wages Regulation (No. 2) Order (Northern Ireland) 1962 (Order N.I.W.D. (101)), which Order is revoked.

New provisions in the Schedule are printed in italics.

Wages Regulation (Brush and Broom)

ORDER, DATED 16TH JUNE, 1964, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR AND NATIONAL INSURANCE UNDER THE WAGES COUNCILS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1945.

The Ministry of Labour and National Insurance, in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 10 of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland) 1945(a), hereby makes the following Order to give effect to wages regulation proposals received from the Brush and Broom Wages Council (Northern Ireland):—

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation Order (Northern Ireland) 1964.

Commencement

2. The wages regulation proposals set out in the Schedule shall come into operation on the specified date and on the day immediately preceding that date the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation Order (Northern Ireland) 1962(b) and the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation (Amendment) Order (Northern Ireland) 1963(c) shall cease to have effect.

Interpretation

3. In this Order the expression "the specified date" means the 23rd day of June, 1964, provided that where, as respects any worker who is paid wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, that date does not correspond with the beginning of the period for which the wages are paid, the expression "the specified date" means, as respects that worker, the beginning of the next such period following that date.

B. Workers employed on piece work:

Workers employed on piece work are entitled to receive, in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to the general minimum piece rates applicable or, where no such general minimum piece rates have been fixed, in addition to piece rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate

an amount equivalent to one-quarter, one-half or the whole of the appropriate piece work basis time rate

according as the overtime payable under the provisions of sub-paragraph A, if the worker has been employed on time work, would have been equivalent to time-and-a-quarter, time-and-a-half, or double time, respectively.

Paragraph 12.

The expression "customary holiday" means-

- (1) Christmas Day (or, if Christmas Day falls on a Sunday, such other weekday as may be appointed by national proclamation or, if none is so appointed, the next following Tuesday), Boxing Day, Easter Monday, Easter Tuesday, and two other days (being days on which the worker normally works) in the course of a calendar year to be fixed by the employer and notified to the worker not less than three weeks before the holiday;
- or (2) a day substituted by the employer for any one of the said days, being a day recognised by local custom as a day of holiday in substitution for the said day.

Paragraph 13.

For the purpose of paragraph 11 the expressions "time-and-a-quarter", "timeand-a-half", and "double time" mean respectively, one-and-a-quarter times, oneand-a-half times, and twice the amount of the general minimum time rate otherwise applicable.

GENERAL

APPLICATION OF STATUTORY MINIMUM REMUNERATION TO PIECE WORKERS

Paragraph 14.

In the case of male or female workers employed on piece work for which no general minimum piece rates have been fixed, each piece rate paid must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate. In determining whether any piece rate satisfies the foregoing condition regard will be had only to the earnings of ordinary workers, that is, workers of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question and not to the earnings of morkers of less than ordinary skill and experience, for example, juvenile and infirm workers.

EMPLOYMENT OF JUVENILE WORKERS ON PIECE WORK

Paragraph 15.

An employer will, in any case where a learner or other juvenile worker is employed on piece work during the first twelve months of his employment in the trade, be deemed to pay wages at less than the minimum rate unless he shows that such worker has received in respect of his employment on piece work in each week during that period, at least the same amount of money as such worker would have been entitled to receive if employed on time work. An employer will, in any case where any such worker is so employed at any

An employer will, in any case where any such worker is so employed at any time subsequent to the first twelve months of his employment in the trade, be deemed to pay wages at less than the minimum rate unless he shows that such worker has, in respect of his employment on piece work, been paid at piece rates which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker (not being a juvenile worker) at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece work basis time rate.

WAITING TIME '

Paragraph 16.

- (1) A worker is entitled to payment of statutory minimum remuneration as aforesaid during all the time during which he is present on the premises of his employer, unless he is present thereon in any of the following circumstances, that is to say:—
 - (a) without the employer's consent, express or implied;
 - (b) for some purpose unconnected with his work and other than that of waiting for work to be given to him to perform;
 - (c) by reason only of the fact that he is resident thereon; or
 - (d) during normal meal times in a room or place in which no work is being done and is not waiting for work to be given to him to perform.
- (2) The statutory minimum remuneration payable under sub-paragraph (1) to a piece worker when not engaged on piece work shall be that which would be payable if he were a time worker.

DEFINITIONS

Paragraph 17.

A "female pan hand" is a female worker of any age who is employed in pan setting, that is to say, the making or setting by hand of a pan knot or both such making and setting with or without the operations of boring and trimming or either of them.

Paragraph 18.

An "out-worker" is a worker who works in his own home or in any other place which is not under the control or management of the employer.

APPLICABILITY OF STATUTORY MINIMUM REMUNERATION

Paragraph 19.

The statutory minimum remuneration aforesaid applies, subject to the provisions of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland) 1945, to workers in relation to whom the Brush and Broom Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates, that is to say, workers employed in Northern Ireland in the trade specified in the Schedule to the Trade Boards (Brush and Broom Trade, Northern Ireland) (Constitution, Proceedings and Meetings) Regulations 1924(a), dated 28th August, 1924, namely:—

The manufacture of brushes (other than feather brushes) or brooms, including the following operations, where all or any of them are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such brushes or brooms:—

- (a) the drafting, dressing or mixing of bass, whisk, or similar fibres or animal bristles or hair and the working of wood, bone, ivory, or celluloid;
- (b) all finishing, warehousing, packing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of such brushes or brooms,

but excluding the following operations: ----

the sawing and turning of wood as a preliminary operation to the manufacture of such brushes or brooms; the making of metal parts and the mounting of brushes with metal or tortoise-shell backs.

PAYMENT OF HIGHER REMUNERATION

Paragraph 20.

The statutory minimum remuneration set out in this Schedule is without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of remuneration in excess of the statutory minimum.

SECOND SCHEDULE

Holidays and Holiday Remuneration

- The Brush and Broom Wages Regulation (Holidays) Order (Northern Ireland) 1962(b) (Order N.I.B.B. (87)) shall have effect as if in the Schedule thereto:—
- 1. the proviso to sub-paragraph (1)(a) of paragraph 6 were omitted.
- 2. in paragraph 11, for the definition of "TOTAL REMUNERATION" there were substituted the following:---

" 'TOTAL REMUNERATION' means any payments paid or payable to the worker under his contract of employment for time (other than hours of overtime) worked or piece work done by him (other than during hours of overtime), holiday remuneration, any productivity or long service bonus payable to the worker on a weekly, fortnightly or monthly basis and merit payments so payable, but does not include any other payments."

Public Health

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to *indicate its general purport.*)

This Order, which comes into operation on 23rd June, 1964, sets out the statutory minimum remuneration payable in substitution for that fixed by the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation Order (Northern Ireland) 1962 (Order N.I.B.B. (86)) as amended by the First Schedule to the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation (Amendment) Order (Northern Ireland) 1963 (Order N.I.B.B. (89)).

The amendment to the Brush and Broom Wages Regulation (Holidays) Order (Northern Ireland) 1962 (Order N.I.B.B. (87)), set out in the Second Schedule to this Order, was contained in the Second Schedule to Order N.I.B.B. (89), and is repeated without alteration.

New provisions in the First Schedule are printed in italics.

Order N.I.B.B. (86) and Order N.I.B.B. (89) are revoked.

REGULATIONS, DATED 16TH JUNE, 1964, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR NORTHERN IRELAND UNDER THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1878 TO 1962 AND SECTION 143 OF THE PUBLIC Health Act 1936.

The Ministry of Health and Local Government for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by the Public Health Acts (Northern Ireland) 1878 to 1962 and by section 143 of the Public Health Act 1936(a), as extended to Northern Ireland by the Public Health (Northern Ireland) (Extension of Enactments) Order 1939(b), and adapted by the Ministries of Northern Ireland (Transfer of Functions) Order 1945(c) and the Local Authorities (Transfer of Functions) (Northern Ireland) Order 1953 made by the Governor in the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, and of the powers conferred upon it by the said section 143 as amended, in relation to aerodromes for the time being vested in or under the control of the Minister of Aviation by paragraph 1 of the Eleventh Schedule to the Civil Aviation Act 1949(d) and extended to Northern
