# **Designation Order**

ORDER\*, DATED 7TH JULY 1966, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF DEVELOPMENT, WITH THE CONCURRENCE OF THE MINISTER OF FINANCE, UNDER SECTION 1 OF THE NEW TOWNS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1965.

I, the Right Honourable William Craig, Minister of Development, with the concurrence of the Minister of Finance, in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by section 1 of the New Towns Act (Northern Ireland) 1965(a) (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), hereby make the following Order:—

#### Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the New Town (Antrim) Designation Order (Northern Ireland) 1966.

# Designation of Site

2. The area of land comprising the Rural District of Antrim (hereinafter called "the designated area") and shown surrounded by a thick black line on the map marked "New Town (Antrim) Designation Order (Northern Ireland) 1966, Map No. 1" and signed by me is hereby designated as the site of a new town.

# Land Distinguished

3. The portion of the designated area described in the Schedule and shown surrounded by a thick black line on the map marked "New Town (Antrim) Designation Order (Northern Ireland) 1966, Map. No. 2" and signed by me is hereby distinguished as land that the Ministry of Development proposes to acquire for the purposes of the Act.

# **SCHEDULE**

The portion of the designated area distinguished under article 3 is situate in and comprises all or part of the townlands of Balloo, Ballycraigy, Birch Hill, Bleerick, Caulside, Dunsilly, Half Umry, Irishtown, Islandbane, Kilbegs, Moylinny, Muckamore, New Park, Niblock, Park Hall, Rathenraw, Rathmore, Spring Farm, Steeple, Stiles, Tirgracey and Town Parks, and Kettlebottom Island and three small adjacent unnamed islands.

# AGRICULTURAL EMPLOYMENT SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE

#### Ladders

REGULATIONS, DATED 8TH JULY 1966, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER SECTION 1 OF THE AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE Provisions) Act (Northern Ireland) 1959(a).

The Ministry of Agriculture in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 1 of the Agriculture (Safety, Health and Welfare Provisions) Act (Northern Ireland) 1959 and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, after consultation with such organisations as appear to it to represent the interest concerned, hereby makes the following regulations:—

#### Citation and commencement

1. These regulations, which may be cited as the Agriculture (Ladders) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1966, shall come into operation on the 1st day of November 1966.

## *Interpretation*

2. In these regulations—

"ladder" does not include a permanently fixed ladder, or a ladder made of rope or other non-rigid material, but save as aforesaid includes every kind of ladder (including steps and a trestle-ladder), whether made of wood, metal or other material;

"rung" means the rail or tread, serving as a step, set into the stiles of a ladder:

"steps" means a ladder (other than a trestle-ladder) provided with a means of self-support;

"stile" means the side-rail of a ladder into which the rungs are fitted; "tie-rod" means a metal rod, extending through both stiles, which is so secured as to prevent the stiles moving apart;

"trestle-ladder" means a ladder-made of two frames hinged together at the top, both being fitted with rungs.
