- (4) Obtain replacement stock only from:—
 - (a) an accredited parent breeding farm;
 - (b) a licensed hatchery; or
 - (c) any other source approved by the Ministry.
- (5) Keep in such form as the Ministry may require a record of all stock received on or sent from the farm together with the names and addresses of the consignors or consignees.
- (6) Ensure that each poultry house on the farm after being cleared of stock shall be cleansed, disinfected and rested for two weeks before again being used to house poultry.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note does not form part of the Scheme but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

This Scheme which replaces an existing Scheme lays down conditions and requirements for the accreditation of poultry farms. The new Scheme does not specify the breeding policy to be followed but places emphasis on the need to maintain and improve the health and economic characteristics of poultry flocks in Northern Ireland.

Composition and Labelling

Salad Cream

REGULATIONS, DATED 19TH AUGUST 1966, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES UNDER SECTIONS 4, 7 AND 68 OF THE FOOD AND DRUGS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1958.

The Ministry of Health and Social Services, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by Sections 4, 7 and 68 of the Food and Drugs Act (Northern Ireland) 1958(a), having consulted with such organisations as appear to it to be representative of interests substantially affected by these regulations, hereby makes the following regulations:—

Citation and commencement

1. These regulations may be cited as the Salad Cream Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1966 and shall come into operation on 19th September 1966.

Interpretation

2.—(1) In these regulations—

"the Act" means the Food and Drugs Act (Northern Ireland) 1958; "container" includes any form of packaging of food for sale as a single

item, whether by way of wholly or partly enclosing the food or by way of attaching the food to some other article, and in particular

includes a wrapper or confining band;

"permitted additive" means any colouring matter, antioxidant, emulsifier, stabiliser or preservative, as the case may be, inasmuch as its use in salad cream is permitted by the appropriate regulations mentioned in the Schedule:

- "salad cream" means any smooth, thick, stable emulsion of vegetable oil, water, whole egg or egg yolk and an acidifying agent, with or without the addition of one or more of the following substances, namely, vinegar, lemon juice, salt, spices, sugar, milk, milk products, mustard, edible starch whether modified or not, edible gums and other minor ingredients and permitted additives, and the expression includes mayonnaise, but does not include horse-radish sauce, horse-radish cream, ice cream, imitation cream or mustard sauce sold as such:
- "sell" includes offer or expose for sale or have in possession for sale; and "sale" and "sold" shall be construed accordingly.
- (2) All percentages mentioned in these regulations are percentages calculated by weight and are calculated on the weight of the product as sold.
- (3) Any reference in these regulations to a label borne on a container shall be construed as including a reference to any legible marking on the container however effected.
- (4) For the purpose of these regulations, the supply of food, otherwise than by sale, at, in or from any place where food is supplied in the course of a business shall be deemed to be a sale of that food, and reference to purchasing and purchasers shall be construed accordingly.

Exemptions

- 3. The following provisions shall not apply in relation to any salad cream—
 - (a) sold for exportation to any place outside the United Kingdom; or
 - (b) supplied under Government Contracts for consumption by Her Majesty's Forces or for consumption by a visiting force within the meaning of any of the provisions of Part I of the Visiting Forces Act 1952(a); or
 - (c) sold to a manufacturer for the purposes of his manufacturing business or to a cateror for the purposes of his catering business.

Composition of salad cream

4.—(1) Any salad cream sold, consigned or delivered shall contain not less than 25 per cent. edible vegetable oil, and not less than 1.35 per cent. egg yolk solids:

Provided that this regulation shall not apply in relation to any salad cream which is sold, consigned or delivered in a container bearing a label on which there appears, as the name of such salad cream, a true description of the nature of such salad cream, and such description does not include the word "salad", "cream", or "mayonnaise" is not included in any description appearing on such label as the name of such salad cream.

(2) No person shall sell, consign or deliver, as the case may be, any salad cream in contravention of this regulation.

General requirements as to composition and description

- 5.—(1) No person shall sell any food under such a description as to lead an intending purchaser to believe that he is purchasing any salad cream for which compositional requirements are specified unless the food complies with the appropriate requirements as to composition set out in relation to that salad cream.
- (2) Where a person sells any food to a purchaser in response to a request for any kind of salad cream for which compositional requirements are specified, he shall be deemed to sell salad cream of that kind and conforming to the compositional requirements for salad cream of that kind which are specified in relation to that salad cream unless he clearly notifies the purchaser at the time of sale that the food is not of that kind.

Labelling and advertisement of salad cream

- 6. No person shall—
- (a) give with any food sold by him, or display with any food offered or exposed by him for sale, any label, whether attached to or printed on the container or not, or
- (b) publish, or be party to the publication of, any advertisement for food, being a label or advertisement which bears or includes, as the case may be, the description "salad cream" or "mayonnaise" unless such food is salad cream which complies with the compositional requirements specified in regulation 4:

Provided that this regulation shall not apply in relation to any such label or advertisement—

- (i) if the description "salad cream" or "mayonnaise" is used in such a context, upon or in such label or advertisement, as the case may be, as to indicate that the salad cream is used as an ingredient of the food to which the label or advertisement refers, and
- (ii) if such salad cream complies with the compositional requirements specified in regulation 4.

Regulation of use of description "salad dressing"

- 7. No person shall—
- (a) give any label bearing the description "salad dressing", whether such label is attached to or printed on the container or not, with any smooth, thick, stable emulsion (other than any salad cream complying with the compositional requirements specified in regulation 4) capable of being used for any purpose for which salad cream is commonly used, and sold by him, or
- (b) display any such label with any such emulsion offered or exposed by him for sale, or
- (c) publish or be party to the publication of any advertisement including the description "salad dressing", for such emulsion.

Penalties

- 8.—(1) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the foregoing provisions he shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction—
 - (a) to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or to both such fine and such imprisonment; and
 - (b) in the case of a continuing offence, to a further fine not exceeding

five pounds for each day during which the offence continues after conviction.

(2) The requirement of Section 47(3) of the Act (which requires notice to be given to the Ministry of Health and Social Services of intention to begin a prosecution for an offence against any provisions relating to the labelling, advertising or description of food) shall not apply as respects any proceedings instituted by a health authority for an offence against any such provisions.

Defences

- 9.—(1) In any proceedings for an offence in relation to the publication of an advertisement, it shall be a defence for the defendant to prove that, being a person whose business it is to publish or arrange for the publication of advertisements, he received the advertisement for publication in the ordinary course of business and did not himself make or cause to be made any material alteration in the substance of the advertisement.
- (2) In any proceedings against the manufacturer or importer of salad cream for an offence in relation to the publication of an advertisement, it shall rest on the defendant to prove that he did not publish and was not a party to the publication of the advertisement.

Amendment of Food Standards (Miscellaneous Foods) Regulations

10. The Food Standards (Miscellaneous Foods) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1960(a) shall be amended by deleting the reference to Salad Cream. Mayonnaise and any other Salad Dressing in Column 1 and the standard for such food specified in Column 2 of the Schedule thereof.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the regulations but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These regulations come into operation on 19th September 1966 and supersede the provisions for Salad Cream, Mayonnaise and any other Salad Dressing in the Food Standards (Miscellaneous Foods) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1960.

The regulations specify compositional requirements regulating the amount of vegetable oil, and egg yolk solids contained in salad cream (regulation 4), and requirements for the labelling and advertisement of salad cream (regulations 6 and 7).

The regulations do not apply to salad cream sold for export, to salad cream sold for consumption by Her Majesty's Forces or by a visiting force, or to salad cream sold to a manufacturer for the purposes of his manufacturing business or to a caterer for the purposes of his catering business (regulation 3).

NATIONAL INSURANCE (INDUSTRIAL INJURIES)

Prescribed Diseases

REGULATIONS, DATED 18TH AUGUST 1966, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES UNDER THE NATIONAL INSURANCE (INDUSTRIAL Injuries) Act (Northern Ireland) 1966.

The Ministry of Health and Social Services, in exercise of powers conferred by sections 54 and 55 of the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act (Northern Ireland) 1966(a), and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby makes the following regulations:

Citation and commencement

1. These regulations, which may be cited as the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) (Prescribed Diseases) Amendment Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1966, shall be read as one with the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) (Prescribed Diseases) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1960(b) (hereinafter referred to as "the principal regulations") and shall come into operation on 22nd August 1966.

Amendment of Part I of Schedule 1 to the principal regulations

2. Part I of Schedule 1(c) to the principal regulations shall be further amended by the addition at the end of the first and second columns thereof, respectively, of the disease, hereinafter referred to as "mesothelioma", specified in the first column of Schedule 1 hereto and of the occupations set against the said disease in the second column of that Schedule.
