Salaries and Allowances

ORDER, DATED 19TH OCTOBER 1973, MADE BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE UNDER SECTION 12(1) OF THE MAGISTRATES' COURTS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND) 1964.

I, THE RIGHT HONOURABLE WILLIAM WHITELAW, M.C., M.P., in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 12(1) of the Magistrates' Courts Act (Northern Ireland) 1964(a), section 1(1) of the Northern Ireland (Temporary Provisions) Act 1972(b) and all other powers enabling me in that behalf do hereby make the following Order:

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the Resident Magistrates (Salaries and Allowances) (No. 2) Order (Northern Ireland) 1973.

Salaries of Resident Magistrates

- 2.—(1) The annual salary payable to a Resident Magistrate appointed for the City of Belfast shall be £7,910 as from the 1st April 1973.
- (2) The annual salary payable to every other Resident Magistrate shall be £7,660 as from 1st April 1973.

Allowances of Resident Magistrates

3. In addition to the salary specified in Article 2 a Resident Magistrate shall be paid an allowance in respect of travelling, subsistence and incidental expenses at such rate and subject to such conditions as may from time to time be fixed by the Ministry of Home Affairs with the concurrence of the Ministry of Finance.

Salaries and allowances of Deputy Resident Magistrates

4. The salary payable to a Deputy Resident Magistrate shall with effect from 1st April 1973 be at the rate of £26 for each day upon which he adjudicates, together with such allowances in respect of travelling, subsistence and incidental expenses as may from time to time be fixed by the Ministry of Home Affairs with the concurrence of the Ministry of Finance.

Revocation

5. The Resident Magistrates (Salaries and Allowances) Order (Northern Ireland) 1973(c) is hereby revoked.
