## **EXECUTIVE NOTE**

# The Adults with Incapacity (Accounts and Funds) (Scotland) Regulations 2008 S.S.I. 2008/51

The above statutory instrument was made in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 24D(7), 27B and 27E(2) of the Adults with Incapacity (Scotland) Act 2000(1) (the 2000 Act) and of all other powers enabling them to do so. The instrument is subject to negative resolution procedure and comes into force on 1st April 2008.

## **Policy Objective**

These Regulations take account of changes made to the 2000 Act by the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 (the 2007 Act). These Regulations relate to new Part 3 of the 2000 Act inserted by section 58 of the 2007 Act. They will provide the mechanisms for the provisions to become operational as follows:

- the details of the account which need to be given to the Public Guardian under section 24D(7) (Regulation 2);
- the medical certificate in section 27B to take account of the range of applications available under Part 3 (Regulation 3 and Schedule); and
- a 21 day period for objections under section 27E(2) (Regulation 4).

## **Background**

Part 3 of the 2000 Act allows for an application to the Public Guardian for authority to intromit with the funds of an adult who lacks capacity to meet his or her day to day living expenses. The scheme has not been used as much as anticipated. To improve accessibility and flexibility, new Part 3 of the 2000 Act was inserted by section 58 of the 2007 Act. Under new Part 3 an extended range of applications is now possible, including for authority to a fundholder to release information about an adult's funds and for authority to open an account in the adult's name.

#### Account details

New section 24D (1)-(3) provides that the Public Guardian may, on application, issue a certificate authorising the opening of an account in the adult's name for the purpose of intromitting with funds. This was not previously possible. Section 24D(7) provides that the applicant must notify the Public Guardian of the details of the account once it has been opened. The details to be notified require to be prescribed. Regulation 2 prescribes those details as follows

- sort code
- account number/roll number
- name of account
- name of bank
- address of bank
- type of account.

#### Medical certificate

A medical certificate is currently required to support an application to intromit with funds. New section 27B provides for a medical certificate to be prescribed to accompany the increased range of applications which will be possible once the changes are commenced - authority to provide information (24C); to open an account (24D); and to intromit (25). Medical certificates under this section will certify that that adult is incapable in relation to decisions about or incapable of acting to safeguard or promote the adult's interest in the adult's funds. Regulation 3 and the Schedule provide the new certificate

## Period within which objections may be made

New section 27E provides a requirement that objectors should be heard in relation to all applications and refusals of applications under this Part. The period within which objections should be made requires to be prescribed. Regulation 4 prescribes a period of 21 days which reflects current practice. The existing guidance on Part 3 applications issued by the Public Guardian allows 21 days for objections to be lodged. 21 days allows a reasonable period for objections to be made.

## Revocation of redundant SSI

Regulation 5 revokes SSI 2001/76 The Adults with Incapacity (Certificates from Medical Practitioners) (Accounts and Funds) (Scotland) Regulations 2001 <a href="http://www.opsi.gov.uk/legislation/scotland/s-200100.htm">http://www.opsi.gov.uk/legislation/scotland/s-200100.htm</a> to reflect the change in the

legislation.

#### Consultation

Key stakeholders were invited to comment on the draft Regulations. A list is attached at **Annex A**. The consultation was also available on the Scottish Government website. The consultation was launched on 16 August and closed on 8 November 2007. There were 14 responses – 2 from solicitors, 2 from the voluntary sector, 7 from local authorities and 3 from professional bodies.

The responses were very positive and no changes were suggested to these Regulations.

## **Financial Effects**

Fees are charged by the Public Guardian for the existing procedures under Part 3 of the 2000 Act. There will be fees for the new procedures in new Part 3 which will fit into the current framework of fees charged by the Public Guardian.

## **Regulatory Impact Assessment**

None has been carried out because there is no impact on business.
