	ne Health Protection (Coronavirus) (International Travel etc.) endments) (Scotland) (No. 2) Regulations 2021

Executive summary	<ul> <li>The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (International Travel etc.) (Miscellaneous Amendments) (Scotland) (No. 2) Regulations 2021 come into force on 17 May 2021 making a number of changes to the Health Protection (Coronavirus) (International Travel) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 to implement the policy changes, as set out below.</li> <li>International travellers who have been in a country or area on the red list at any point in the 10 days before arriving in Scotland, are only allowed to enter the UK if they are a British or Irish National, have the right to live in the UK or have an exemption. Before travelling to Scotland from a red list country, passengers are required to <ul> <li>Complete a Passenger Locator Form</li> <li>Take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) Pre Departure Test (PDT)</li> <li>Book and pay for a managed self-isolation package in a quarantine hotel for 10 days, including two Coronavirus (Covid-19) tests</li> <li>take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) test on or before day two and on or after day eight</li> </ul> </li> <li>On arrival in Scotland, travellers must quarantine in the hotel booked for 10 nights. Whilst this position has not changed as a result of these amendments, it forms part of the wider "red amber, green" scheme introduced by the amending</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>When travelling to Scotland, international travellers who have been in a country or area on the amber list at any point in the 10 days before arriving in Scotland are required to <ul> <li>Complete a Passenger Locator Form</li> <li>Take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) Pre Departure Test (PDT)</li> <li>Book and pay for Coronavirus (Covid-19) tests or take after arrival into Scotland on or before day two and on or after day eight</li> </ul> </li> <li>On arrival in Scotland, travellers must isolate at home or in the place they are staying for a period of ten days and take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) test on or before day two and on or after day eight</li> <li>Arrivals from a "Green" list country (or have arrived from elsewhere in the Common Travel Area but has travelled from or through a "green" list country in the preceding 10 days prior to arrival in Scotland) are required to <ul> <li>Complete a Passenger Locator Form</li> <li>Take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) Pre Departure Test (PDT)</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Book and pay for a Coronavirus (Covid-19) test to take on day two after arrival into Scotland</li> <li>On arrival in Scotland, travellers do not need to isolate unless the test they have taken on day two after arriving back in Scotland is positive.</li> <li>The requirement to enter a managed isolation hotel for 10 days when travelling from a red list country and to self-isolate at home for the same period when travelling from an amber country will apply to children and young people as well as adults.</li> <li>The principal Regulations provide an exemption for children under 11 so that they do not need to take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) test before travelling. Children aged between 11 and 18 must take a Coronavirus (Covid-19) test before travelling where they are accompanied by an adult. Proof of the child's negative test result must be shown by an adult travelling with the child upon arrival in Scotland.</li> <li>The principal Regulations have previously been amended to provide an exemption from the requirement to be in possession of a managed isolation package for</li> <li>unaccompanied under 18's1. This allows them to self-isolate at home or in other suitable accommodation, rather than in a managed isolation hotel, as long as the parent and anyone else in the household also self-isolates. (Unaccompanied includes a child who travels with one adult where that adult intends to hand the child over to another adult when they arrive in Scotland).</li> <li>A further amendment was made to the principal Regulations for children and young people arriving in Scotland for the purposes or entering a boarding school for education. An exemption is in place to allow students to self-isolate at the boarding school premises for 10 days, rather than enter a managed isolation hotel.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Children unaccompanied by an adult or if the accompanying adult ceases to accompany them prior to travel to the specified premises for self-isolation are not required to stay in managed self-isolation hotels. An unaccompanied child who does not have a home in Scotland can also stay in accommodation arranged by a local authority. All persons within the specified premises where the child isolates are required to isolate.4</li> </ul>

All children travelling into Scotland from outwith the common travel area	Article 1 Article 1 defines a child as every human below the age of 18 unless under the law applicable to the child majority is attained earlier. This policy covers all children under the age of 18. Article 2 Article 2 requires that States Parties shall respect and ensure the rights set forth in the Convention to each child without discrimination irrespective of the child's or his or her parents or legal guardian's race, national, ethnic or social origin (amongst others). The principle regulations have been amended to provide an exemption for unaccompanied under 18's6 to self-isolate at home rather than in a managed isolation hotel, as long as the parent and anyone else in the household also self-isolates. (Unaccompanied includes a child who travels with one adult where that adult intends to hand the child over to another adult when they arrive in Scotland). This alongside the easing of restriction on international travel could benefit children who were born or whose parents were born outwith the

common travel area and who are
returning to Scotland.
Article 3 Article 3 requires that in all actions concerning children the best interests of the child shall be a primary consideration.
We have continued to ensure that the best interests of the child have been central to our response to Coronavirus (Covid-19), including in relation to the imposition of these latest travel restrictions.
Article 9 Article 9 provides that States Parties shall respect the right of the child who is separated from one or both parents to maintain personal relations and direct contact with both parents on a regular basis.
The Scottish Government accepts that entering managed isolation from red list countries may have a negative impact on a child's ability to maintain direct contact with both parents where one of the parents lives outwith the common travel area. The exemption from managed isolation hotels for unaccompanied under 18's and the easing of restrictions on International Travel will help to mitigate this.
Where other legal obligations apply – for example, in relation to shared custody – children may be able to move between households as a result of regulation 9(6)(e) <b>7</b> of the Regulations. Regulation 9(6)(e) allows movement outside of the place of self-isolation to fulfil legal obligations.
<b>Article 10</b> Article 10 of the UNCRC says "children and young people should be able to stay in contact with and

<ul> <li>visit their parents, even if they live in different countries" and "should always be able to enter and leave their own country".</li> <li>Article 10(2) also highlights that "The right to leave any country shall be subject only to such restrictions as are prescribed by law and which are necessary to protect the national security, public order (order public), public health or morals or the rights and freedoms of others and are consistent with the other rights recognized in the present Convention".8</li> <li>Recognising this, provisions have been put into place to allow children who return from visiting parents overseas. Easing restrictions on international travel alongside the amendment to the principle Regulations providing an exemption for unaccompanied under 18's to self-isolate at home rather than in a managed isolation hotel could benefit children who are returning to Scotland.</li> <li>Article 12 gives children the right to have their views considered.</li> <li>It is acknowledged that managed self-isolation when returning from red list countries and self-isolation from amber countries and the requirement to be tested on days 2 and 8 may negatively impact upon this article. To mitigate</li> </ul>
against this, children under the age of 11 are exempt from the requirement of day 2 and 8 testing, although they can take a test if they wish to do so. Article 15

Article 15 states that every child
has the right to freedom of assembly: to meet with other children, and to join groups and organisations, as long as it does not stop others from enjoying their rights.
For children and young people, the importance of maintaining social interaction and engagement with their peers is of fundamental importance to wellbeing. If arriving from a Red list country, the use of free Wi-Fi in managed isolation hotels may allow children to meet with peers online, although it is acknowledged that not all young children are familiar with online facilities, and access to IT facilities is variable.
Article 18 Article 18 provides that States Parties shall use their best efforts to ensure recognition of the principle that both parents have common responsibilities for the upbringing and development of the child.
The Scottish Government accepts that entering managed isolation from Red list countries may have a negative impact on a child's ability to maintain direct contact with both parents where one of the parents lives outwith the common travel area. The exemption from managed isolation hotels for unaccompanied under 18's and the easing of restrictions on International Travel will help to mitigate this.
The principle Regulations allow for children to move between households if self-isolating as a result of travel from an Amber list country to fulfil legal obligations in relation to shared custody.
Article 28 Article 28 informs that every child has the right to education on the

basis of equal opportunities.
To support this every managed isolation hotel room has free WI-FI which will allow children to access online remote education where applicable.
Children and young people have experienced educational remote learning from schools during 2020 and 2021. Schools and Local Authorities will be able to support learning for those self-isolating at home when returning to an Amber country.
A further amendment was made to the principle Regulations for children and young people arriving in Scotland for the purposes or entering a boarding school for education. An exemption is in place to allow students to self- isolate at the boarding school premises for 10 days, rather than enter a managed isolation hotel.
Article 31 Article 31 states that every child has a right to rest and leisure, to engage in play and recreational activities, and to take part in a range of cultural and artistic activities.
The regulations provide for a defence for leaving the room within managed self-isolation to exercise subject to prior permission by a person authorised by Scottish Ministers. In this instance, authorisation will be granted by the contracted security organisation, who will attempt to ensure this possible where possible. Not all of the hotels in operation can guarantee outside exercise/fresh air, but where they can they will and, in accordance with the information leaflet provided to arrivals at the hotels, children and people with disabilities will be prioritised.

	The Parent Club website offers help and guidance for parents/carers self-isolating at home with children. As well as providing tips, information and links to additional help, it offers a guide to helping children though play. <b>9</b>
