Business and Regulatory Impact Assessment

Title of Proposal

The Legal Aid and Advice and Assistance (Miscellaneous Amendment) (Scotland) Regulations 2024

Purpose and intended effect

Background and Objectives

Carer's Allowance Supplement

Carer's Allowance Supplement is an extra payment made to people in Scotland who are in receipt of Carer Support Payment or Carer's Allowance on a particular date. It was introduced by s.81 of the Social Security (Scotland) Act 2018. It is paid twice a year as a lump sum (currently £288.60).

Carer Support Payment is currently disregarded when the Scottish Legal Aid Board (SLAB) assesses financial eligibility for civil and children's legal aid and advice and assistance, but Carer's Allowance Supplement is not. This SSI will provide for Carer's Allowance Supplement to also be disregarded.

Care-Experienced Students Bursary

The Care-Experienced Students Bursary is a non-repayable allowance of £9000 which is paid to those completing an eligible course of further or higher education who have been looked after before they were 18 by a local authority in the UK. This SSI will also provide for the Care-Experienced Students Bursary to be disregarded by SLAB when assessing financial eligibility for these types of legal assistance.

Legislative amendments

- The Advice and Assistance (Scotland) Regulations 1996
- The Civil Legal Aid (Scotland) Regulations 2002
- The Children's Legal Assistance (Scotland) Regulations 2013

Amendments are needed to the above instruments to provide for the above payments to be disregarded by SLAB when calculating an individual's financial eligibility for civil and children's legal aid and advice and legal assistance. Such payments are also excluded from "clawback" to the Scottish Legal Aid Fund.

Rationale for Government intervention

Current provision does not allow for these payments to be disregarded when SLAB assesses financial eligibility for these types of legal assistance. Without provision to allow for these payments to be disregarded, individuals in receipt of these payments might find that they are required to make a contribution to legal fees or costs. They may even become ineligible for any publicly funded legal assistance by virtue of receiving such payments, threatening their access to justice.

Consultation

Within Government

SLAB is a non-departmental public body which administers legal aid in Scotland and is accountable to the Scotlish Government. SLAB have been consulted in the development of these draft Regulations.

Public Consultation

No public consultation was carried out due to the technical nature of the proposed regulations.

Business

There has been consultation with the Faculty of Advocates (the FoA), the Law Society of Scotland (LSS) and SLAB in developing these regulations.

Options

Option 1: Do Nothing

Current provision will remain in place and those in receipt of payments of Carer's Allowance Supplement or Care-Experienced Students Bursary will have these payments considered as part of SLAB's assessment for financial eligibility for legal assistance. This may result in them becoming ineligible for any publicly funded legal assistance by virtue of them receiving such payments.

Option 2: Bring forward Regulations

Legislate for amended provisions, as noted above.

Benefits

Option 1: Do Nothing

The current arrangements for legal aid will remain in place. There are no benefits to this option.

Option 2: Bring forward Regulations

Those in receipt of payments of Carer's Allowance Supplement or Care-Experienced Students Bursary will have these payments disregarded from SLAB's calculations for financial eligibility for legal assistance. This ensures that access to justice is maintained and those in receipt of these payments are not prevented from accessing the publicly funded legal assistance they may be entitled to, as a consequence of receiving these payments.

Costs

Option 1: Do Nothing

No costs are associated with this option.

Option 2: Bring forward Regulations

There may be a minor impact on the Legal Aid Fund as a result of these regulations (see 'Legal Aid Impact Test' below).

Scottish Firms Impact Test

It has been assessed that there is likely to be minimal impact on firms or sole practitioners as a result of these amendments.

Competition Assessment

Having applied the Competition and Markets Authority competition filter, these proposals will not impact on competition within the legal aid market. These Regulations do not directly or indirectly limit the number or range of suppliers. They do not limit the ability of suppliers to compete or reduce suppliers' incentives to compete vigorously.

Consumer Assessment

These regulations will not have an impact on consumers.

Test run of business forms

All legal aid applications are currently submitted online through SLAB's Legal Aid Online. Guidance and application updates will be incorporated ahead of commencement.

Digital Impact Test

These regulations will not have a digital impact.

Legal Aid Impact Test

Carer's Allowance Supplement

While the cost to the legal aid fund as a consequence of disregarding the Carer's Allowance Supplement is unknown, SLAB have estimated that the impact is likely to be minimal due to the relatively low value of the payments to be disregarded.

Care-Experienced Students Bursary

SLAB have estimated that the impact on the legal aid fund as a consequence of disregarding the Care-Experienced Students Bursary is likely to be minimal due to the likely small number of individuals in receipt of these payments in Scotland.

Enforcement, sanctions and monitoring

The proposals will be set down in secondary legislation. The proposals do not, otherwise, create any new enforcement or monitoring mechanisms. SLAB has responsibility for administering the Scottish Legal Aid Fund and will monitor the implications of these measures.

Implementation and delivery plan

The SSI is due to come into force on 3 October 2024.

Post-implementation review

The Scottish Legal Aid Board will monitor changes and reports impacts to the Scottish Government.

Summary and recommendation

It is recommended that the amendments to the current legal aid regulations in Scotland are implemented (**Option 2**).
