

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO

THE DERBYSHIRE DALES (ELECTORAL CHANGES) ORDER 2022

2022 No. [XXXX]

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England and is laid before Parliament by Command of Her Majesty.

2. Purpose of the instrument

- 2.1 The Order provides for new district wards and numbers of councillors for Derbyshire Dales District Council at the district elections in 2023 and thereafter.

3. Matters of special interest to Parliament

4. Extent and Territorial Application

- 4.1 The territorial extent of this instrument is England and Wales.
4.2 The territorial application of this instrument is England.

5. European Convention on Human Rights

- 5.1 As the instrument is subject to negative resolution procedure and does not amend primary legislation, no statement is required.

6. Legislative Context

- 6.1 The Commission has power under section 59 of the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009 (the 2009 Act) to make an order giving effect to recommendations contained in a report, prepared under section 58(4) of the 2009 Act, after conducting an electoral review under section 56(1) of that Act. This instrument is being made to give effect to the Commission's recommendations for new electoral arrangements set out in its report prepared following an electoral review of Derbyshire Dales District Council.

7. Policy background

What is being done and why?

- 7.1 The purpose of an electoral review is to decide on the appropriate electoral arrangements including the number of councillors and the names, number and boundaries of wards or divisions for a specific local authority. The Commission began the electoral review of Derbyshire Dales District Council in August 2020. The Commission decided to conduct the review as it is required to review each local authority in England from time to time. Additionally, based on the December 2017 electorate figures, 16% of wards had an electoral variance of greater than 10% from the average for the authority and one ward had a variance greater than 30%.

- 7.2 An electoral review aims to ensure that the number of electors represented by each councillor is as close to equal as possible, but the recommendations must also have regard to community identities and interests and the need for effective and convenient local government. To achieve these aims, the Commission tries to ensure that the number of electors per councillor in every division or ward is as close as possible to the average for the authority, but is happy to show flexibility in moving away from the average based on the evidence provided during the consultation stages of the review. Following a six-stage review process the Commission published its ‘New electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council - Final recommendations’¹ on 11 January 2022.
- 7.3 The Order provides for changes to the electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council at the district elections in 2023 as recommended by the Commission. The existing wards of the council will be replaced by 21 new ones. Five wards will each return three councillors, three wards will each return two councillors and 13 wards will each return a single councillor.
- 7.4 Under section 56 of the 2009 Act, whenever the Commission recommends changes to the electoral arrangements for a borough, district or county council it must also recommend whether, in consequence of those changes, any changes should be made to the electoral arrangements for any parish council that is within the authority. Among other things, under Schedule 2 to that Act, recommendations must ensure that no parish ward is split between new district wards, and under section 56 of that Act, recommendations must be made regarding the number of parish councillors for each parish ward.
- 7.5 Consequently, in addition to making changes to the electoral arrangements for the district the Order also, where necessary, makes provision with respect to the establishment of new parish wards and sets the number of parish councillors for each of those parishes.

8. European Union Withdrawal and Future Relationship

- 8.1 This instrument does not relate to withdrawal from the European Union.

9. Consolidation

- 9.1 This Instrument does not amend or revoke any legislation.

10. Consultation outcome

- 10.1 The Order gives effect to recommendations that were consulted on during the review of electoral arrangements from August 2020 to January 2022. During the course of the review, the Commission received approximately 314 representations. The consultations involved the District Council, parish and town councils, local MPs, local residents and other interested parties. There was an initial 10-week consultation, during which the Commission asked for proposals on the most appropriate number of councillors and ward boundaries for the district. The Commission considered that a council size of 34 would ensure effective and convenient local government for the

authority. Having considered the submissions received, the Commission published its ‘New electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council – Draft Recommendations’² on 2 February 2021. Following a 10-week consultation on the draft recommendations, the Commission considered the further evidence received and published its original final recommendations.

- 10.2 In response to the consultation on the draft recommendations, the Commission modified its recommendations for Bonsall & Winster, Darley Dale, Matlock All Saints, Matlock St Giles and Wirksworth & Carsington Water wards because of community evidence received from these areas.
- 10.3 The Commission confirmed its draft recommendations for the remainder of the district as final and published its ‘New electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council – Final Recommendations’³. However, following the publication of these final recommendations, the Commission received a communication from two local stakeholders which drew attention to a several errors in the final recommendations report. There were found to be several discrepancies between the published mapping and the forecast electorates for several of the proposed wards. The wards affected were Ashbourne North, Brailsford, Hulland and Wirksworth & Carsington Water. As the Commission has no power under legislation to amend published final recommendations, a set of new draft recommendations, ‘New electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council – New Draft Recommendations’⁴, were published. These made the minimum number of changes necessary to bring Ashbourne North and Hulland wards within electoral variances of 10%.
- 10.4 Following a 10-week consultation on the new draft recommendations, the Commission considered the further evidence received and published its final recommendations. These included modifications to our recommendations for Ashbourne North, Ashbourne South, Bakewell, Brailsford, Darley Dale, Hulland, Masson, Matlock East & Tansley, Matlock West, Wirksworth & Carsington Water and Youlgrave wards. These changes were largely in response to strong community evidence regarding the reliance of Middleton by Wirksworth parish on Wirksworth parish and objections to the geographical size of our proposed Youlgrave ward. The Commission then confirmed its new draft recommendations for the remainder of the district as final.
- 10.5 A detailed analysis of the outcome of the consultation is set out in the report ‘New electoral arrangements for Derbyshire Dales District Council – Final Recommendations’ dated 11 January 2022. As indicated in the Order, the mapping referred to in the Order is normally accessible at all reasonable times at the Commission’s offices. If any person wishes to view the map and the report, the Commission will consider this and seek to make appropriate arrangements. 11. Guidance

- 11.1 The Commission does not intend to issue any guidance alongside this instrument. This is not considered necessary as the Order is self-explanatory and gives effect to recommendations following consultation with interested parties as to the changes to electoral arrangements.

12. Impact

- 12.1 There is no, or no significant, impact on business, charities or voluntary bodies.
- 12.2 The impact on the public sector will be limited to the area for which the Order makes provision. The one-off cost of producing the map referred to by the instrument is to be funded by the Commission. The one-off cost of amending the electoral register to reflect the new wards is to be funded by Derbyshire Dales District Council.
- 12.3 A full Impact Assessment has not been prepared for this instrument because the impact is limited and relates to the specific local authority area under review.

13. Regulating small business

- 13.1 The legislation does not apply to activities that are undertaken by small businesses.

14. Monitoring & review

- 14.1 The Commission will have no role in monitoring the Council's implementation of the Derbyshire Dales (Electoral Changes) Order 2022. The Commission is not required to undertake such monitoring; that is a matter for the relevant officers of Derbyshire Dales District Council. The Order will be reviewed insofar as the Commission continually monitors local authorities in England to identify any that meet its criteria for electoral reviews.
