Evidence Base (for summary sheets)

We have conducted a public consultation into this proposal and asked stakeholders and interested parties for comments. A draft Impact Assessment was published alongside the consultation paper. The consultation received no comments on the detail set out in the draft Impact Assessment and therefore our assumptions remain the same.

1. Introduction

Scope of the proposals

This Impact Assessment assesses the costs and benefits of closing Dorking Magistrates' Court, and transferring the work to Redhill and Guildford Courts.

Organisations in the scope of the legislation

The proposed policy would have a impact on HM Courts Service, and specifically on Dorking Magistrates' and Redhill and Guildford Courts.

2. Rationale for Proposals

Use of Dorking Magistrates' Court has declined in recent years, to the extent that the court is now operating at a level of efficiency considered unsustainable. The accommodation at Dorking Magistrates' Court is not considered adequate for the delivery of modern, customer focussed services. The cost of maintaining a presence in what is considered an unsuitable building is difficult to justify, particularly given the low number of Dorking Magistrates' Court users.

The close proximity of Redhill and Guildford Courts and the availability and quality of transport links means there should be no significant additional difficulties in travelling to Redhill and Guildford from any part of South East Surrey. Redhill and Guildford Courts benefit from a wider range of facilities, and are able to offer a full range of services to the court user. Further, it is anticipated that the transfer of cases from Dorking to Redhill and Guildford could be handled by Redhill and Guildford Courts.

Economic Rationale

The conventional economic approach to Government intervention is based on efficiency or equity arguments. Government intervenes if there is a perceived failure in the way a market operates ("market failures") or if it would like to correct existing institutional distortions ("government failures"). Government also intervenes for equity (fairness) reasons. Intervention in this case would be made to correct an existing institutional distortion: Dorking Magistrates' Court is no longer being fully utilised, meaning closure is justified on efficiency grounds.

3. Cost Benefit Analysis

The Impact Assessment requires that all options are assessed relative to a common 'base case' over the appropriate appraisal period of the relevant 'do-something' options.

A full assessment of the anticipated costs and benefits of the policy will be developed over the consultation period. This initial impact assessment describes the costs and benefits that the policy is expected to impose, and briefly describes the methods which will be used to identify

these costs and benefits in a full cost benefit analysis. Comments relating to both the scope of costs and benefits presented, and the proposed analytical methods are welcomed.

Option 0: do nothing

Description

Under the do nothing base case, Dorking Magistrates' Court would continue to operate as currently. As this is the base case against which Option 1 is assessed, there are no costs or benefits associated with this option.

Option 1: Closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court

Description

Under this option, Dorking Magistrates' Court would be closed, and the work of the court transferred to nearby Redhill and Guildford Courts.

Costs

Travel costs

The transfer of services to Redhill and Guildford may impose increased travel costs for those attending court. The drivers of overall travel costs will include (a) the distance between Dorking Magistrates' and Redhill and Guildford Courts; (b) the quality of transport links between Dorking Magistrates' and Redhill and Guildford Courts; (c) the cost of transport in the South East Surrey region; and (d) the number of users of Dorking Magistrates' Court.

Geographic Information Systems (GIS) analysis will be used to calculate the distance between Dorking Magistrates' and Redhill and Guildford Courts. Local information will also be used in conjunction with HMCS data to produce an overall estimate of the costs imposed by the closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court.

Benefits

Releasing value

In line with Green Book guidance, closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court will generate savings for HMCS. These savings will be quantified based on annual running costs of Dorking Magistrates' Court and on a judgement on the extent to which Redhill and Guildford's running costs would increase, resulting from their additional workload.

Court users' court experience

The standard of accommodation at Dorking Magistrates' Court falls short of the minimum requirement for the provision of services. Redhill and Guildford Courts do not suffer from these problems. The proposal to transfer cases from Dorking to Redhill and Guildford should therefore improve the experience of all court users once at the court.

Waiting times

Transfer of work from Dorking Magistrates' Court to Redhill and Guildford Courts may reduce waiting times in the South East Surrey area, via the reallocation of District Judge time. It would also allow increased flexibility in listing practices by increasing the use of "back to back lists."

To be determined in the final Impact Assessment based upon the results of the cost benefit analysis.

4. Impact Tests

Equality Impact

A draft Equality Impact Assessment Screening has been completed. The initial screening shows no expected negative impact on the various groups. This will be reviewed following the response to the consultation.

Rural Impact

Rural impacts will depend on the extent to which Dorking Magistrates' Court users live in rural communities, and on the quality of transport links in the South East Surrey region. These factors will be considered when assessing whether the closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court will have a disproportionate travelling burden on rural communities.

Environmental Impacts

The additional environmental costs resulting from any additional travel by court users may be offset by reduced transport costs from court staff. The net environmental impact from changes to travel resulting from the closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court will be assessed as part of the final Impact Assessment.

There may be some savings to the MoJ carbon budget upon closure of Dorking Magistrates' Court. However, these are not considered significant.

Legal Aid

As the proposed policy only relates the location of court activity, there are no anticipated impacts relating to legal aid.

Other Impact Tests

The proposed policy is not expected to have a disproportionate impact on small firms, nor have a negative effect on competition. There are no expected health or human rights implications.
