# GEORGI III. REGIS.

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## Cap. 91.

An Act to provide a Fund for repairing and improving the Harbour of *Dunbar*, and other Public Works within the Burgh of *Dunbar*. [3d July 1806.]

**W**HEREAS the Harbour of *Dunbar*, situated at the Entry of the Frith of *Forth*, is not only necessary to the Trade of that Town, but is of great Benefit to the Country at large, as affording a Retreat to the numerous Vessels, which are forced, particularly in the Winter Season, into the Bay of *Dunbar*: And whereas the said Harbour is in bad Repair, and a great Part of the Pier has been lately destroyed, or much injured, by the Effect of severe Storms, and requires to be speedily repaired, and the Town-house and School-house of the said Burgh, and the Market for Butchers' Meat, are in a ruinous Condition: And whereas a Duty upon Malt Liquors, brewed and vended within the said Burgh, was formerly granted, by various Acts of Parliament, for a limited Time, for improving and preserving the said Harbour, and other public Works in the said Burgh, which are now expired, and there is at present no sufficient Fund for those Purposes, and the Rates of Burgh Customs, at present levied there, were established long ago, and are become very low and inadequate: And whereas it would be expedient and advantageous to the said Burgh, and Inhabitants thereof, and to the Public, if the Magistrates and Town Council of the said Burgh were authorised to increase the Rate of the Burgh Customs and Dues, and to levy other small Duties on Property in the said Burgh, and on Commodities brought into, and manufactured or vended in the same, for the Purpose of raising a Fund, to be applied towards the Reparation and Preservation of the Harbour, and to accomplish the other Purposes before mentioned; to effectuate which, the Aid and Authority of Parliament is requisite: May it therefore please

your Majesty, That it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That, from and after the Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, an Imposition or Duty of Two pennies *Scots*, or One Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, (over and above the Duties of Excise, payable to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors,) shall be leviable upon and for every *Scots* Pint of Porter, Ale, or Beer, which shall be brewed for Sale within the said Burgh of *Dunbar*, and Royalty thereof, including the Villages of *Belhaven* and *Westbarns*, or within the Distance of One Mile from the Royalty of the said Burgh, and upon every *Scots* Pint of Porter, Ale, or Beer, brought into, or vended within the said Burgh and Royalty thereof; and that the said Imposition or Duty shall be payable, and paid by the Brewers for Sale, Venders, or Sellers of all such Porter, Ale, and Beer, to the Magistrates and Town Council of the said Burgh, and their Successors in Office for the Time being, who are hereby appointed Trustees for putting in Execution all the Powers, by this Act given and granted; and the Money raised and collected by virtue of this Act, is hereby vested in the said Magistrates and Town Council, as Trustees aforesaid; and shall be collected and received by such Person or Persons, as the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, shall, from Time to Time, appoint to receive the same.

II. Provided always, and be it enacted, That a Drawback, or Deduction of the said Duty or Imposition shall be allowed to the Brewers within the said Burgh and Royalty thereof, and District aforesaid, for and in respect of Porter, Ale, or Beer, sent beyond the Bounds of the said Burgh, Royalty, and District, or shipped from the Harbour of *Dunbar*, upon rendering an Account of the Quantity so sent or shipped, every Three Months, upon Oath; which Oath the said Trustees, or any One of them, are, or is hereby empowered to administer.

III. And be it further enacted, That, from and after the said Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, it shall be lawful to the said Magistrates and Town Council, as Trustees aforesaid, to impose, levy, and take, for and in respect of all Spirituous Liquors of every Kind, vended within the said Burgh and Royalty thereof, a Duty of One Halfpenny Sterling for each Gallon, over and above the Duties of Excise, payable to His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, to be collected in the same Way that the said Duty upon Porter, Ale, and Beer, is hereinbefore appointed to be levied.

IV. And be it also enacted, That, from and after the said Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, it shall be lawful to the said Magistrates and Town Council, as Trustees aforesaid, to levy and take, for and in respect of the several Articles and Commodities, enumerated and specified in the Schedule hereunto annexed, the several Duties in the said Schedule mentioned, as payable by the Burgeses of the said Burgh of *Dunbar*, resident therein, by the non-resident Burgeses, and by other Persons, or Strangers, upon the Importation of the said Articles and Commodities into the Harbour of *Dunbar*, or bringing the  
same

lamé into the said Burgh or Royalty thereof; and that, in lieu of the Rates and Duties which have been in Use, to be paid according to the Custom Roll established in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, or otherwise upon the Articles enumerated in the Table, referred to by the said Custom Roll, and again specified in the Schedule hereunto annexed, or as new Duties upon Articles not enumerated in the said Table, or made payable by Persons, either wholly or partially exempted heretofore; which Rates and Duties are hereby vested in the said Magistrates and Town Council, as Trustees aforesaid; and shall be collected and received, by any Person or Persons, appointed by them, or the major Part of them, to receive the same.

V. Provided always, and be it enacted, That Articles and Commodities, upon the Importation of which into the said Harbour of *Dunbar*, the Dues in the said Schedule mentioned shall have been paid, and which shall be exported in the same State, shall not be liable to pay any of the said Dues upon Exportation. Articles not to pay twice.

VI. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful to, and in the Power of the said Magistrates and Town Council, as Trustees aforesaid, and they are hereby authorized, during the Continuance of this Act, to impose and levy an Annual Assessment upon all Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, situated within the said Burgh and Royalty thereof, not exceeding Twenty-five Shillings *per Centum* of the actual Rents, payable for such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, or at which the same might be let, to be collected by any Person or Persons appointed by the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, to collect and receive the same; which Assessment shall be payable in the First Place by the Tenants, or Occupiers of the said Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, who shall have Right to deduct and retain the Sums actually paid by them, in respect to such Assessments, out of the Rents payable to their Landlords, or the Proprietors. Assessment upon the Rents of Houses, &c.

VII. And be it enacted, That the whole Monies levied and collected under the Authority of this Act, shall, after defraying the necessary Expences of collecting the same, be applied by the said Trustees towards the repairing and preterving the Harbour of *Dunbar* and Piers thereof, to repairing or rebuilding the Town-house and School-house thereof, making a Market-place for Butchers' Meat, and other Public and necessary Purposes for the Benefit and Utility of the said Burgh and the Inhabitants thereof; and it shall be lawful to the Burgessees, or any Seven or more of them, at all Times to require from the said Trustees an Account of the Monies collected, and the Application thereof, and to bring and maintain Actions against the said Trustees, in any competent Court, to compel Production of the said Accounts, and to enforce the due Application of the said Monies. Application of Monies levied.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, may make such Rules and Regulations, and give such Directions for raising, collecting, receiving, and disposing of the several Sums of Money arising from the said Duties and Rates hereby authorized to be levied, as they shall think proper and necessary, and may appoint One or more fit Person or Persons, to be Collector or Collectors Accounts to be produced.

Collectors of the said Rates and Duties, and also order and direct One or more Officer or Officers, from Time to Time, to gauge the Vessels of the Distillers and Brewers, and the Worts, Spirits, Porter, Ale and Beer therein contained; and such Distillers and Brewers are hereby required to permit and allow the same to be done, as freely, and in such Manner, and at such Times as the Officers of Excise shall, for the Time being, be permitted and allowed to do: Provided always, that the said Trustees shall and are hereby required to take sufficient Security from their Collector or Collectors, for duly accounting for the Monies received by him or them.

IX. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, shall from Time to Time, during the Continuance of this Act, order and direct One or more Book or Books to be provided, wherein shall be fairly entered and kept an Account of all Money which shall be received in pursuance of this Act, and of all Payments and Disbursements made out of the same, and of the respective Times when the same was received, paid, or disbursed, and for what Uses and Purposes such Payments or Disbursements were made; and that within Thirty Days after the Twenty-fourth Day of *September* in every Year successively, during the Continuance of this Act, an Account from the said Books shall be fairly drawn out and stated by the Collector or Collectors, Receiver or Receivers of the said Rates and Duties for the Time being, and delivered to the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, upon Oath, which Oath the said Trustees, or any One of them, are or is hereby empowered to administer.

X. And be it enacted, That the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, shall have full Power and Authority, by an Act of the Town Council, to borrow any Sum or Sums of Money, not exceeding Five thousand Pounds; and to convey, assure, and assign over the Rates and Duties hereby granted, or such Parts thereof as they shall think proper, as a Security to any Person or Persons who shall advance or lend any Sum or Sums of Money thereon, at legal Interest; and such Sum or Sums of Money, so borrowed, shall be applied only for and towards such Purposes as the Rates and Duties arising by virtue of this Act are hereby directed to be applied.

XI. Provided always and be it enacted, That out of the Money to be collected, raised, or borrowed as aforesaid, the Expences of procuring this Act shall, in the first Place, be paid and discharged.

XII. And be it further enacted, That if any Person or Persons liable to, and chargeable with the Payment of the Rates and Duties by this Act granted, or any of them, shall refuse or neglect to pay the same when demanded, it shall and may be lawful for any One or more of the Magistrates of the said Burgh, by Warrant under his or their Hand or Hands, to summon such Person or Persons, before him or them, on a certain Day to be specified in such Warrant; and in case such Person or Persons shall not appear, or shall appear and not pay the said Rates or Duties, the Magistrate or Magistrates issuing such Warrant is and are hereby empowered to make an Order for the Payment thereof; and if such Person or Persons shall not pay the same  
within

within Twenty Days after Notice of such Order, it shall and may be lawful for the Collector or Collectors of the said Rates and Duties, by Warrant under the Hand or Hands of One or more of the Magistrates of the said Burgh, to take and distrain any of the Goods and Effects of the Person or Persons neglecting or refusing to pay the said Rates or Duties; and in case the same shall not be paid within Ten Days after any Distress shall be taken as aforesaid, that then it shall and may be lawful for the Collector or Collectors of the said Rates and Duties to sell the Goods so distrained, and therewith to satisfy the Rates and Duties so refused, neglected, or delayed to be paid, as also his or their reasonable Charges in taking and keeping such Distress, not exceeding One Tenth Part of the Sum distrained for, rendering the Overplus, (if any be,) to the Owner or Owners thereof, on Demand.

Charge of the Distress not to exceed one-tenth Part of the Sum distrained for.

XIII. And be it further enacted, That besides the Remedy given by this Act for levying, recovering, and making effectual the Rates and Duties by this Act granted, the said Magistrates and Town Council, and their Collector or Collectors, shall, from and after the said Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, and during the Continuance of this Act, be entitled to use all other Methods, Remedies, and Execution against the Person or Persons neglecting or refusing to pay the said Rates or Duties, which are competent by the Laws of *Scotland* to the Magistrates and Town Council of Royal Burghs, and their Collector or Collectors, for recovering the ordinary Revenues of such Burghs.

Besides the Remedy given, all others may be pursued which are competent by the Law of *Scotland*.

XIV. Provided always, and it is hereby declared, That no Distress which shall be taken by the Authority of this Act shall extend or be construed to extend to prejudice, incumber, or render ineffectual the Duty of Excise payable to His Majesty, his Heirs, or Successors; nor shall this Act, or any Thing herein contained, extend or be construed to extend, to charge any Spirits, Wort, Porter, Ale or Beer with the Payment of the Duty hereby granted, if it shall appear that the said Duty hath been once paid.

Not to prejudice the King's Duty of Excise.

Duty to be paid but once for the same Spirits, &c.

XV. And be it further enacted, That if at any Time during the Continuance of this Act, any Spirituous Liquors, Porter, Ale, or Beer, shall be brought in, to be vended or sold within the said Burgh, or Royalty thereof, not having first paid the Duty hereby laid and made payable, such Spirituous Liquors, Porter, Ale or Beer, with the Casks containing the same, shall be confiscated for the Use of the Burgh.

Spirits, &c. brought into the Town, not having paid the Duty, to be confiscated.

XVI. And be it enacted, That the Extent or Quantity of Spirits, Worts, Porter, Ale or Beer, distilled or brewed, and charged with the Duty hereby granted, may be ascertained by the Voucher or Vouchers made by the Officers of Excise for the Time being, (conformable to which the Duties of Excise are payable,) which Voucher or Vouchers shall be the Rule for determining any such Difference; and the Collector or Officer of the Excise for the Time being is hereby required to deliver an authentic Copy, or Copies of the said Voucher, or Vouchers, gratis, once in every Twelve Weeks, or oftener if required, to some of the said Trustees, or to the Collector or Collectors of the Duty

hereby granted to be used for that Purpose; and the Extent or Quantity of the Spirits, Worts, Porter, Ale and Beer distilled, brewed, or vended, and subject to the Duties by this Act imposed, shall and may be ascertained by the Oath of the Distiller, Brewer, or Vender, who are hereby required to keep an exact Account thereof, and to give in such Account to the said Magistrates and Town Council, on the Twenty-fourth Day of *December*, the Twenty-fourth Day of *March*, the Twenty-fourth Day of *June*, and the Twenty-fourth Day of *September* in every Year; and the said Magistrates are, or any One of them is, hereby authorized to administer an Oath to the said Distiller, Brewer, or Vender, with regard to the Extent or Quantity distilled, brewed, or vended, and the Truth of the Account rendered.

XVII. And be it further enacted, That if any Person or Persons, shall, at any Time or Times after the said Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, conceal or embezzle any Spirits, Wort, Porter, Ale, or Beer, subject and liable to the Duty, by this Act granted and made payable, in order to avoid the Payment of such Duty, the Magistrates of the said Burgh, for the Time being, or any One or more of them, shall, upon the Information of any Person or Persons, summon such Offender or Offenders before them; and the Party offending, shall, upon Conviction, forfeit the Value of what shall be so concealed or embezzled; and the Sum of Ten Shillings for the Expences of the Court, for which Distress, conformable to Law, is hereby allowed.

XVIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Trustees, or the major Part of them, to farm and set out the Rates and Duties hereby granted, or either or any of them, by Way of Public Roup, for such Term or Terms, and upon such Conditions, as they shall from Time to Time think fit, for the best Price and Prices that can be got for the same; and the Money arising thereby, shall be applied and laid out, to and for the Purposes of this Act, and to and for no other Use and Purpose whatsoever.

Public Act.

XIX. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken Notice of as such, by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

Continuance

XX. And be it further enacted, That this Act, and the Rates and Duties hereby granted and made payable, shall take Place and have Continuance, from and after the Twenty-fourth Day of *September* One thousand eight hundred and six, for and during the Term of Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
