An Act to vest the Coins and Medals given by the Will of Robert Austen Esquire deceased, in the Governor and Company of the Bank of England. [9th June 1812.]

HEREAS Robert Austen Esquire duly made and published his Will of Rollast Will and Testament in Writing, bearing Date the Twenty-bert Austen Esq. 26th sixth Day of December in the Year One thousand seven hun-December dred and ninety-six; and thereby gave, devised, and bequeathed all and 1796 every his Manors, Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Tythes, and Hereditaments, Freehold, Copyhold, and Leafehold, not in Settlement, and over which he had any Power of Disposition, and not therein-before disposed of (though in point of Fact no Disposition had been previously made in the faid Will of any Real Estate), and also the Reversion in Fee of his Real Estates in the County of Surrey, which were in Settlement, and also all and every Part and Parcel of his Personal Estate of what Nature or Kind soever not thereby before disposed of, (except his large Diamond? Ring, his Books, Manuscripts, Pictures, Drawings, Medals, and Coins) unto Henry Halsey Esquire, Lannoy Richard Coussmaker Esquire, and William Bray Esquire, their Heirs, Executors, and Administrators, according to the different Nature and Quality of his said Estates respectively, in Truit, to convey and assign the same Real and Personal Estates respectively, and all the Savings or Increase thereof, unto his Son Henry Edmund Austen, and his Heirs, Executors, and Administrators for ever, when and so soon as he should attain his Age of Twenty-one Years, or marry before that Age by and with the previous Consent and Approbation of his [Loc. & Per.] Guardian: 38 T

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Guardian or Guardians or the major Part of them then living; but in case he should marry before that Age without such Consent, the said Testator then directed his said Trustees, immediately on such Marriage, to convey, lettle, and affure all and every Part of his faid Freehold and Copyhold Estates, to the Use of his the Testator's said Son Henry Edmund, therein called Henry, for his Life, with Remainder to Truffees and their Heirs during his Life, upon Trust to preserve Contingent Remainders; Remainder to the Use of the First and other Sons of his said Son Henry Edmund severally and successively in Tail General; Remainder to the Useof the First and every other Daughter of his said Son severally and successively in Tail General; and in Default of such Issue, or in case his said Son should die under the Age of Twenty-one without having been married, then in Trust to convey, settle, and assure all and every his the Testator's said Freehold and Copyhold Estates to the said Testator's Daughter Frances Ann, afterwards the Wife of John Bedford Esquire, (but in the said Will called by the Name of Frances) her Heirs and Assigns. for ever, in case she should attain the Age of Twenty-three Years, or marry before that Time, by and with the previous Consent and Approbation of her Guardian or Guardians then living, or the major Part of them then living; but in case she should marry before that Age without such Consent, the Testator then directed his said Trustees immediately on such Marriage to convey, settle, and assure the said Freehold and Copyhold Estates to the Use of the said Frances Ann Bedford for her Life; with Remainder to Trustees and their Heirs during her Life, upon Trust to preserve the Contingent Remainders; Remainder to the Use of the First and other Sons of the faid France's Ann Bedford severally and successively in Tail General; Remainder to the Use of the First and every other Daughter of the said Frances Ann Bedford severally and successively in Taik General; and in Default of such Issue, or in case the said Frances Ann Bedford should die under the Age of Twenty-three Years without having been married, then with Remainder to Elizabeth Austen, another of the said Testator's Daughters, her Heirs and Assigns for ever, in case she should attain her Age of Twenty-three Years, or marry under that Age, with such Consent and Approbation of Guardians as aforesaid; but if she should marry before that Age without such Consent and Approbation, then his laid Trustees should settle the aforesaid Freehold and Copyhold Premises to the Use of the said Elizabeth Austen for her Life; with Remainder to Trustees. to preserve Contingent Remainders; with Remainder to her First and other Sons severally and successively in Tail General; Remainder to her First and other Daughters severally and successively in Tail General; and in Default of such Issue, or in case the said Elizabeth should die under the Age of Twenty-three Years, without having been married, then to the Use and Behoof of the above named William Bray, his Heirs and Assigns; and the faid Testator thereby directed that his Diamond Ring, containing some of the Hair of his late Uncle Robert Austen Esquire, deceased, and also all his Books, Manuscripts, Pictures, Drawings, Medals, and Coins should be considered as Heir Looms and go with his Mansion House at Shalford to his Children and their Issue; provided that no Person taking an Estate Tail by Purchase in his said devised Real Estate, under the Limitations aforesaid, should be entitled to the absolute Interest in the Chattels thereinhefore directed to be considered as Heir Looms, unless he or she shouldattain the Age of Twenty-one Years, or die under that Age leaving Issue; but if all his Children should die without Issue as aforesaid, then he gaveand. and dewifed his faid Ring, Printed Books, Pictures, and Drawings to his Friend the said William Bray, and all his Manuscripts, Books, Medals, and Coins to the Trustees of the British Museum, to be by them deposited in she said Museum and made Part thereof (except such of his Medals and Coins as would make the faid Trustees to have Duplicates) and fuch Medals and Coins as should be found to be Duplicates he the said Testator gave to the aforesaid William Bray; and he directed that an exact and true Catalogue of the said Books, Manuscripts, Pictures, Drawings, Medals, and Coins, and an Inventory of his Plate, should be made out within Three Calendar Months next after his Decease, and fairly written and entered in Three Books, and One of them to be delivered to and remain in the Hands of each of them the faid Henry Halfey, Lannoy Richard Coussmaker, and William Bray, and another fair Copy of the Catalogue, fo fair as related to the Manuscripts, Books, Medals, and Coins, should be made and given to the Trustees of the British Museum within the Time above specified; and the said Testator appointed the said Henry Halfey, Lannoy Richard Coussmaker, and William Bray, joint Executors of his said Will: And Codicil, 18 whereas the faid Testator duly signed and published a Codicil to his said November Will, beating Date the First Day of November in the Year One thousand 1797. seven hundred and ninety-seven; but the same did not affect the Devise therein-before mentioned, nor the Bequest of the faid Coins and Medals: And whereas the Said Robert Austen died on the Third Day of the same Death of R. Month of November One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, without Austen Esq. having revoked or altered the faid Will, otherwise than by the said Codicil, and without having revoked or altered the faid Codicil; and the fame Will and Codicil were duly proved by all the faid Executors in the Preprogrative Court of Canterbury: And whereas by a Decrete of the High Decree in Court of Chancery, bearing Date on or about the Twenty-fifth Day of Chancery, June in the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, in a Cause 25th June wherein the said Frances Ann Bedford, by her then Name of Frances Ann 1799. Ausben, and Elizabeth Austen, both then Infants, by their Guardian, were Plainviffs, and the said Henry Halfey, Lannoy Richard Cousmaker, William Bruy, and Henry Edmund Austen, were Defendants, it was decreed, that the said Will and Codicil of the said Testator Robert Austen were well proved, and that the same ought to be established, and the Trusts thereof carried into Execution: And whereas the faid Henry Edmund Austen inter-Marriage of married with Ann Amelia Bate his now Wife on the Twenty-first Day of H E Austen Motober in the Year One thousand eight hundred and five, without the Efquire; Consent of his Guardians or the major Part of them, as mentioned in the Said Will of the said Robert Austen, he the said Henry Edmund, Austen being then under the Age of Twenty-one Years: And whereas the said Henry Edmund Austen afterwards attained his Age, of Twenty-one Years, Videlieët, on the Twentieth Day of May in the Year One thousand eight hundred and six: And whereas the said Frances Ann Bedford attained her Marriage of Age of Twenty-one Years in the Month of May One thouland eight hun. F.A. Bedford. dred, and intermartied with the faid John Bedford, with the Confent and Approbation of the major Part of her Guardians, in the Month of July One mouland eight hundred, and afterwards attained her Age of Twenty. three Years: And whereas by another Decree of the faid Court of Chancery in a supplemental Suit, commenced by the said John Bedford and Frances Ann his Wife and Elizabeth Austen against the said Henry Halfey, Lannay Richard Coussmaker, William Bray, and Henry Edmund Austen, and against John Sewell Doctor of Laws, therein stated to be out of the Jurisdiction

And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Court of Chancery from Time to Time to make such Orders as the said Court shall think expedient, just, or reasonable, for allowing, taxing, and fettling all Costs, Charges, and Expences which have been or shall be in-Execution of curred in obtaining and passing this Act and making the several Applications to the said Court in pursuance thereof, and in making the Sale of the Coins and Medals, and in investing the clear Monies which under this Act shall be paid into the Bank of England in the Manner herein: directed, or otherwise in carrying the Trusts and Purposes of this Act into complete Execution; and also from Time to Time to make an Order for Payment of all such Costs, Charges, and Expences as aforesaid out of the said Sum of Two thousand six hundred and sifty Pounds so paid into the Bank as aforesaid.

VIII. Saving always to the King's most Excellent Majesty, His Heirs: and Successors, and to all and every other Persons and Bodies Politic and Corporate,

Corporate, his, her, and their Heirs, Successors, Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, (other than and except the said Henry Edmund Austen and his Issue, and except the said Edward Henry Bedford his Heirs and Assigns, and all other Person and Persons claiming or to claim any Estate or Interest under and by virtue of the said recited Will and Codicil of the said Robert Austen deceased, or under or by virtue of the said recited Indentures of Lease and Release and Settlement of the Twelsth and Thirteenth Days of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, or any or either of them) all such Estate, Right, Title, Interest, Property, Claim, and Demand whatsoever, of, in, to, or out of the said Coins and Medals as they, every, or any of them had before the passing of this Act, or would or might have had, held, and enjoyed in case this Act had not been made.

IX.
