An Act for repairing and otherwise improving the Road from Beverley, by Molescroft, to Kendell House, and the Road from Molescroft to Bainton Balk, in the County of York. [23d June 1830.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for repairing and widening the Road from 6G.3.c.59. Beverley, by Molescroft, to Kendell House, and from Molescroft to Bainton Balk, in the County of York: And whereas an Act was passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His said late Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the 27G.3.c.86. Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from Beverley, by Molescroft, to Kendell House, and from Molescroft to Bainton Balk, in the County of York: And whereas an Act was passed in the Forty-eighth Year of His said late Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for continuing the Term and alter- 48G.3.c.27. ing and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from Beverley, by Molescroft, to Kendell House, and from Molescroft to Bainton Balk, in the County of York: And whereas considerable Sums of Money have been borrowed and still remain due and owing upon the Credit of the Tolls by the said recited Acts authorized to be collected on the said Roads, and such Roads cannot be effectually kept in repair, nor can the said Debt be discharged, unless the Term granted and continued by the said Acts be further continued, and the Tolls arising on the said Roads be increased: And whereas it would be more convenient if the said 38 E [Local.]

said recited Acts were repealed, and other Powers and Provisions granted and made in lieu of the Powers and Provisions in such Acts contained; but the Purposes aforesaid cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Par-Recited Acts liament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the Third Saturday next after the passing of this Act, the said recited Acts passed in the Sixth, Twenty-seventh, and Fortyeighth Years of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, shall be and the same are hereby declared to be repealed, and null and void to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever.

This Act to take effect for repairing the Roads.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect, and be put in execution for and during the Term hereinafter mentioned, for the Purpose of repairing and otherwise improving the Road leading from Beverley, by Molescroft, to Kendell House, and the Road from Molescroft to Bainton Balk, in the County of York.

IV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Power to ap-Trustees, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, at their point addi-First or Second Meeting to be holden in pursuance of this Act, to tees. elect, nominate, and appoint any Number of fit and proper Persons, not exceeding Three in the whole, to be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, in addition to the Trustees hereby nominated and appointed; and such additional Trustees, when so elected, nominated, and appointed, and being qualified to act as Trustees for repairing Turnpike Roads in England, shall be and they are hereby invested with the same Powers and Authorities for executing this Act as if they had been named and appointed Trustees in and by this Act.

V. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees shall meet at Meetings of the East Riding Sessions House in Beverley aforesaid, or at some the Trustees. other convenient House or Place in Beverley aforesaid, on the Third Saturday next after the passing of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be, between the Hours of Nine of the Clock in the Forenoon and Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, and shall then and there proceed to put this Act into execution, and shall and may then and from Time to Time afterwards adjourn to and meet at such Times and Places in Beverley aforesaid, or Driffield, or in the Neighbourhood of the said Roads, as the said Trustees, or the major Part of them present at such respective Meetings, shall think proper and appoint.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the respective Tolls following Power to shall be demanded at each Turnpike and Toll Gate erected, set up, take Tolls. and continued, or which shall hereafter be erected or set up, upon or across the said Roads, by each and every Person or Persons whom the said Trustees shall from Time to Time appoint to receive the same, before any Horse, Mule, Ass, Beast, or other Cattle, or any Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Chariot, Chaise, Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other Carriage, shall be permitted to pass through any such Turnpike or Toll Gate; (that is to say,)

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Landau, Ba- Tolls. rouche, Phaeton, Sociable, Chaise, Chariot, Calash, Hearse, Litter, Vis-a-vis, Curricle, Gig, Car, Whiskey, Caravan, Chair, Taxed Cart, or other Carriage of the like kind, drawn by Four or more Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Three-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Landau, Barouche, Phaeton, Sociable, Chaise, Chariot, Calash, Hearse, Litter, Vis-a-vis, Curricle, Gig, Car, Whiskey, Caravan, Chair, Taxed Cart, or other Carriage of the like kind, drawn by Three Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Five-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Landau, Barouche, Phaeton, Sociable, Chaise, Chariot, Calash, Hearse, Litter, Vis-a-vis, Curricle, Gig, Car, Whiskey, Caravan, Chair, Taxed Cart, or other Carriage of the like kind, drawn by Two Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Five-pence Halfpenny:

For One Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Landau, Barouche,

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Nine Inches or upwards, drawn by Four or more Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Four-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Nine Inches or upwards, drawn by Three Horses or other Beasts,

not exceeding the Sum of Five-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Nine Inches or upwards, drawn by Two Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Five-pence Halfpenny:

For One Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Nine Inches or upwards, not exceeding the Sum of Eleven-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Nine Inches, drawn by Four or more Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Seven-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Nine Inches, drawn by Three Horses or other Beasts, not

exceeding the Sum of Seven-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Nine Inches, drawn by Two Horses or other Beasts, not exceeding the Sum of Eight-pence:

For One Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than

Nine Inches, not exceeding the Sum of Eleven pence:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast, laden or unladen, and not

For every Drove of Oxen or other Neat Cattle, not exceeding the Sum of One Shilling and a Halfpenny per Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less Number:

And for every Drove of Calves, Swine, Pigs, Sheep, or Lambs, not exceeding the Sum of Sixpence per Score, and so in proportion for

any greater or less Number:

Tolls vested Which said respective Sums of Money shall be demanded and taken in the Name of or as Toll, and shall be vested in the said Trustees; and the same and every Part thereof shall be recovered, collected, paid, applied, and disposed of for the Purposes of this Act.

Tolls to be paid once a Day, except in the Cases after mentioned.

VII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That when the Toll authorized to be taken by virtue of this Act shall have been paid for or in respect of any Horse, Beast, or other Cattle passing through any of the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the said Roads or on the Sides thereof, no Toll shall be demanded or taken

for or in respect of the same Horse, Beast, or other Cattle (except in the Cases herein-after mentioned), on a Ticket being produced denoting such Payment, but such Horse, Beast, or other Cattle shall be permitted to pass Toll-free through the same Toll Gate at any Time or Times during the same Day, such Day to be computed from Twelve of the Clock in one Night to Twelve of the Clock in the next succeeding Night.

VIII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls Stage hereby made payable shall be paid in respect of all Horses or other Coaches, &c. Beasts drawing any Stage Coach or Stage Waggon, or any Waggon, Time of Cart, Van, or other Carriage, conveying Passengers or Goods for Hire passing. or Reward, every Time of passing through any of the said Gates: Provided nevertheless, that no further or additional Toll shall be payable in respect of Stage Coaches, Stage Waggons, Waggons, Carts, Vans, or other Stage Carriages, on account only of the Horses drawing the same having been changed.

IX. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls hereby Post Chaises, made payable shall be paid for or in respect of all Horses, Beasts, or Cattle let out to Hire, and drawing any Post Chaise or other Carriage, Hiring. for every Time of passing along the said Roads, whenever any new Hiring thereof shall take place.

X. And for regulating the Weights to be allowed to Carts or other weight of Carriages which shall be drawn upon the said Roads by One Horse Single-horse or Beast only, be it further enacted, That the Weights to be allowed Carts limited. to Carts or other Carriages drawn by One Horse or Beast shall not exceed the Weights following; (that is to say,) from the First Day of May to the Thirty-first Day of October (both Days inclusive), One Ton and Ten Hundred Weight for each such Carriage and the Lading thereof; and from the First Day of November to the Thirtieth Day of April (both Days inclusive), One Ton and Five Hundred Weight for each such Carriage and the Lading thereof.

XI. And be it further enacted, That all Carts or other such Car- One-horse riages passing along the said Roads, drawn by only One Horse or Carts to be Beast, shall and may be weighed at any Weighing Machine on the weighed. said Roads, and the like additional Tolls demanded and recovered for the Overweight thereof as are by Law payable in respect of the Overweight of Carts drawn by Two or more Horses; and all the Powers, Regulations, and Penalties now in force relating to the weighing of Waggons, Carts, or other Carriages drawn by Two or more Horses shall be applicable to Carts passing on the said Roads drawn by only One Horse or Beast, and to the Drivers and Owners thereof.

XII. And be it further enacted, That none of the Tolls hereby Tolls not to authorized to be taken shall be applied in or towards the Repair of the Repair of any Branch Road upon which there shall not be a Toll Gate erected Branch Road or continued under the Authority of the said Trustees; and no more unless Gates of the Tolls or other Monies arising by virtue of this Act shall be laid [Local.]

out or expended upon the said Branch Road, or in the Payment of any Principal Money borrowed on the Credit only of the Tolls arising or payable upon such Branch Road, or the Interest thereof, than shall be actually raised or received upon or in respect of such Branch Road.

Application of the Tolls and other Monies.

XIII. And be it further enacted, That as well all the Monies which before the Commencement of this Act shall have been raised or produced by virtue of the said recited Acts of the Sixth, Twenty-seventh, and Forty-eighth Years of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, hereby repealed, and which shall remain undisposed of, and also all the Monies which shall be produced under or by virtue of this Act, shall be applied, in the first place, in Payment of all the Charges and Expences which shall have been incurred in applying for and obtaining and passing this Act; in the second place, in paying and discharging the Interest now in arrear and accruing and becoming due upon the several Mortgages and Securities which have been already made and granted, or which shall be at any Time hereafter made or granted upon the said Tolls in pursuance of this Act; and in the next place, in defraying the Expences of making, erecting, and keeping in repair Toll Gates, Weighing Engines, Toll Houses, and other Buildings upon the said Roads, and of widening, repairing, preserving, and otherwise improving the said Roads, and in putting this Act into execution in all other respects; and lastly, in reducing, paying off, and discharging the Principal Sums for the Time being due and to become due on Security of the Tolls and Duties granted by this Act, and to or for no other Use or Purpose whatsoever.

Tolls not to be laid out in repairing the Streets.

XIV. Provided always, and be it further enacted. That none of the Tolls authorized by this Act to be taken upon the said Roads, nor any of the Monies raised by virtue of the said recited Acts, or to be raised by virtue of this Act, shall be paid, laid out, or expended in the Repair or Improvement of any Street, Highway, or Place within the Towns of Beverley, Driffield, or any other Town through which the said Roads shall pass, nor shall any Toll be collected therein by virtue of this Act.

Mortgages.

No Priority of XV. And be it further enacted, That no Preference shall be given to any Person who may have heretofore advanced any Money on the Credit of the Tolls granted by the said recited Acts hereby repealed, or who may hereafter advance any Money on the Credit of the Tolls granted by this Act, in respect of the Priority of the Mortgage or Assignment or other Security for the same, or of advancing such Money, but such respective Persons shall (in proportion to the Sums mentioned in any such Security) be Creditors under this Act in equal Degree one with another.

Public Act.

XVI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

XVII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence Term of Act. upon the Third Saturday next after the passing thereof, and shall continue and be in force and be executed for and during the Term of Thirty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
