An Act for more effectually repairing and improving the Roads from Market Harborough to Loughborough, and from Filling Gate to the Melton Mowbray Turnpike Road, in the County of [19th March 1830.] Leicester.

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act to continue and render more effectual Two Acts 11 G. 3. c.88. passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the First and the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road from Market Harborough to Loughborough in the County of Leicester, and for repairing, widening, turning, and altering the Road branching out of the aforesaid Road at a Place called Filling Gate, to a Road called the Foss Road, and from thence to the Turnpike Road leading from Melton Mowbray to the Guide Post in Saint Margaret's Field, Leicester: And whereas an Act was passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an 33G.3. c.176. Act passed in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to continue and render more effectual Two Acts ' passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the First and the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road from Market Harborough to Loughborough in the County of Leicester, and for repairing, widening, turning, and altering the Road branching out of the aforesaid Road at a Place ' called  $\lceil Local. \rceil$ 

called Filling Gate, to a Road called the Foss Road, and from thence ' to the Turnpike Road leading from Melton Mowbray to the Guide ' Post in Saint Margaret's Field, Leicester:' And whereas an Act was passed in the Fifty-third Year of the Reign of His said late 53 G. 3. c.23. Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads from Market Harborough to Loughborough, and from Filling Gate to the Melton Mowbray Turnpike Road, in the County of Leicester: And whereas by the said recited Act of the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, the Roads comprised therein were made Two separate and distinct Districts, and called the Harborough District of Roads and the Wanlip District of Roads: And whereas the Trustees acting under the said several Acts have proceeded to put the same in execution, and have borrowed several considerable Sums of Money on the Credit of the Tolls thereby granted, which Money still remains due and owing, together with some Arrear of Interest, and the same cannot be paid off, nor can the said Roads be effectually amended, widened, altered, improved, and kept in repair, unless the Term granted and continued by the said recited Acts be further continued; and it is expedient that the said Acts should be repealed, and further, better, and more effectual Provisions made for repairing, maintaining, and otherwise improving the said Roads; but the same cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Par-Recited Acts liament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the Second Monday next after the passing of this Act the said several herein-before recited Acts shall be and the same are hereby declared to be repealed, and null and void to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall from thenceforth commence and take effect, and shall be put in execution, for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, for the Purpose of amending, widening, altering, and otherwise improving and keeping in repair the Road from Market Harborough to Loughborough in the County of Leicester, and the Road branching out of the aforesaid Road at a Place called Filling Gate, to a Road called the Foss Road, and from thence to the Turnpike Road leading from Melton Mowbray to the Guide Post in Saint Margaret's Field, Leicester.

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Trustees for the Wanlip District. IV. And be it further enacted, That all and every His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Time being acting for the said County of Leicester, together with the several Persons herein-before named as Trustees for putting this Act into execution as to the said Harborough District of Roads, and Francis Allsop, Charles Allsop, John Breedon, Thomas Moore, Methuselah Moore, Thomas Parr, and Needham Carnall, and their Successors, being duly qualified as aforesaid, shall be and they are hereby appointed the Trustees for putting this Act into execution, so far as the same relates to or concerns the said Wanlip District of Roads.

Power to appoint additional Trustees.

V. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees of the said respective Districts, at their First or Second Meeting to be holden in pursuance of this Act, to elect and appoint any Number of Persons, not exceeding Three in the whole, being duly qualified, to be Trustees for the Purposes aforesaid; and such Persons, when so elected and appointed, shall have the same Powers and Authorities as if they had been nominated or appointed Trustees in or by this Act.

First Meeting of the Trustees.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees shall meet at the Three Crowns Hotel in Leicester in the County of Leicester, or at some other convenient House or Place in Leicester aforesaid, on the Second Tuesday next after the passing of this Act, between the Hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Two in the Afternoon, or as soon after that Time as conveniently may be, for the Purpose of carrying this Act into execution, notwithstanding any Adjournment may then have been made by the said Trustees under or by virtue of the said recited Acts hereby repealed, and shall and may adjourn themselves from Time to Time, and meet at the above Hotel, or at such Place on or near the said Roads, as they may think proper; and if at any Meeting appointed to be held by virtue of this Act there shall not appear a sufficient Number of Trustees to act, the Meeting shall be adjourned; and Two Trustees shall be sufficient for the Purpose of Adjournment only; and in case the said Trustees, or any of them, shall not attend, or shall omit to adjourn, then the Clerk or Clerks to the said Trustees shall adjourn the said Meeting, and appoint the said Trustees to meet at the Place where such last Meeting was appointed to be held, and shall cause Notice thereof to be affixed on the several Turnpike Gates on the said Roads at least Ten Days before such Meeting.

Power to take Tolls on the Harborough District.

VII. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees for the said Harborough District of Roads, or for the Collector or Collectors, Lessee or Lessees appointed or to be appointed by them, to demand and take, at each and every Toll Gate, Turnpike, Side Bar, or Chain which now is or hereafter shall be erected upon or across or on the Side or Sides of the said Harborough District of Roads, on every Day, (such Day to be computed from Twelve of the Clock in one Night to Twelve of the Clock in the next succeeding Night,) the Tolls and Duties following; (that is to say,)

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Chaise Marine, Coach, Tolls. Stage Coach, Diligence, Landau, Berlin, Barouche, Phaeton, Sociable, Chariot, Calash, Hearse, Break, Chaise, Curricle, Caravan, Van, Gig, Chair, or Taxed Cart, or other Carriage of the like Description, by whatsoever Name called or known, the Sum of Four-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches at the

Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Four-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Four and a Half Inches and less than Six Inches at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Fourpence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards, the Sum

of Three-pence:

For every Four-wheeled Carriage fixed in any Manner to any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage, the Sum of Ninepence:

And for every Two-wheeled Carriage so fixed, the Sum of Four-pence

Halfpenny:

For every Drug so constructed as that the Distance between the Axletrees thereof, measured at their Ends, shall be more than Nine Feet, and laden otherwise than with a single Piece or Block of Timber, Stone, or Iron, the Sum of One Shilling and Sixpence over and above the Toll or Duty payable for the Horses drawing the same:

For every Horse, Mule, Ass, or other Beast, laden or unladen, and

not drawing, the Sum of One Penny:

For every Drove of Oxen and all Kinds of Neat Cattle, the Sum of Ten-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

For every Drove of Swine, Sheep, or Lambs, the Sum of Five-pence

per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

And for every Carriage, Machine, or Caravan not drawn by any Horse or other Beast of Draught, but propelled or moved by Steam or Machinery, the Sum of One Shilling and Sixpence:

Which said respective Tolls or Sums of Money shall be demanded Tolls vested and taken as aforesaid, before any Horse, Mule, Ass, or other Beast, in the Trustees. or any Cattle, Carriage, or Thing whatsoever, upon which any Toll is by this Act imposed on the said Harborough District, shall be permitted to pass through any such Toll Gate, Turnpike, or Side Bar or Chain; and such several and respective Tolls or Sums of Money shall be and are hereby vested in the said Trustees for the said Harborough District of Roads, and shall be applied for the Purposes of this Act in manner herein-after directed.

VIII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to empower the said Trustees for the said Harborough District, or any of them, District.

Limiting the Tolls on the Harborough

to cause more than Three full Tolls to be demanded or taken for the Passage of the same Horse, Beast, Carriage, or other Thing (except as herein-after mentioned) between the Town of Leicester and the Town of Market Harborough on the same Day (such Day to be computed as aforesaid), nor more than Two full Tolls for the Passage of the same Horse, Beast, Carriage, or other Thing (except as aforesaid) between the Town of Leicester and the Town of Loughborough on the same Day (to be computed as aforesaid).

Power to take Tolls on the Wanlip District.

IX. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees for the said Wanlip District of Roads, or for the Collector or Collectors, Lessee or Lessees appointed or to be appointed by them, to demand and take at each and every Toll Gate, Turnpike, Side Bar, or Chain which now is or hereafter shall be erected upon or across or on the Side or Sides of the said Wanlip District of Roads, on every Day, (such Day to be computed from Twelve of the Clock in one Night to Twelve of the Clock in the next succeeding Night,) the Tolls and Duties following; (that is to say,)

Tolls.

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Chaise Marine, Coach, Stage Coach, Diligence, Landau, Berlin, Barouche, Phaeton, Sociable, Chariot, Calash, Hearse, Break, Chaise, Curricle, Caravan, Van, Gig, Chair, or Taxed Cart, or other Carriage of the like Description, by whatsoever Name called or known, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches at

the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Nine-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Four and a Half Inches and less than Six Inches at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Seven-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse or Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage of the like Kind, having the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards, the Sum of

Sixpence:

For every Four-wheeled Carriage fixed in any Manner to any Waggon, Wain, Drug, Cart, or other Carriage, the Sum of One Shilling:

And for every Two-wheeled Carriage so fixed, the Sum of Sixpence: For every Drug so constructed as that the Distance between the Axletrees thereof, measured at their Ends, shall be more than Nine Feet, and laden otherwise than with a single Piece or Block of Timber, Stone, or Iron, the Sum of One Shilling and Sixpence over and above the Toll payable for the Horses drawing the same:

For every Horse, Mule, Ass, or other Beast, laden or unladen, and not drawing, the Sum of Two-pence:

For every Drove of Oxen and all Kinds of Neat Cattle, the Sum of Ten-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

For every Drove of Swine, Sheep, or Lambs, the Sum of Five-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

And

And for every Carriage, Machine, or Caravan not drawn by any Horse or other Beast of Draught, but propelled or moved by Steam or Machinery, the Sum of One Shilling and Sixpence:

Which said respective Tolls or Sums of Money shall be demanded and taken as aforesaid before any Horse, Mule, Ass, or other Beast, or any Cattle, Carriage, or Thing whatsoever, upon which any Toll is by this Act imposed on the said Wanlip District of Roads, shall be permitted to pass through any such Toll Gate or Turnpike, or Side Bar or Chain; and such several and respective Tolls or Sums of Money shall be and are hereby vested in the said Trustees for the said Wanlip District of Roads, and shall be applied for the Purposes of this Act in manner herein-after directed.

X. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That nothing Limiting the herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to empower Tolls on the the said Trustees for the said Wanlip District, or any of them, to District. cause more than One full Toll to be demanded or taken for the Passage of the same Horse, Beast, Carriage, or other Thing through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on that District on the same Day, to be computed as aforesaid (except as herein-after mentioned).

XI. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That if any Person Tolls to be or Persons shall have paid the Tolls hereby respectively authorized paid but once to be taken for the passing of any Horse, Cattle, Beast, or Carriage a Day. through any of the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Bars or Chains erected or to be erected on the said Roads or either of them, such Horse, Cattle, Beast, or Carriage (except Horses or other Beasts of Draught drawing any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, Cart, or other Stage Carriage, or any Post Chaise or other such like Carriage, or any Carriage propelled or moved by Machinery, travelling for Hire as herein-after mentioned,) shall, upon a Ticket denoting the Payment thereof on that Day being produced, be permitted to pass Toll-free during the same Day, to be computed as aforesaid, through the same Toll Gate, Turnpike, or Side Bar or Chain, and also through such other Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Bars or Chains as the Ticket for such Payment shall denote to be free; any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

XII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That none of Tolls not to the Tolls authorized by this Act to be taken upon the said Roads, be laid out in repairing, &c. nor any of the Monies raised by virtue of the said recited Acts or Streets. any of them, or to be raised by virtue of this Act, shall be paid, laid out, or expended in the Repair or Improvement of any Street, Highway, or Place within the Town of Leicester, nor shall any Tolls be collected therein by virtue of this Act.

XIII. And be it further enacted, That the respective Tolls hereby made payable for or in respect of all Horses or other Beasts drawing ing Stage Coaches, &c. any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, Cart, or to pay every other Stage Carriage carrying or conveying Passengers or Goods for Time of

Horses draw-Pay, passing.

Pay, Hire, or Reward, or any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, or Caravan or other Stage Carriage propelled or moved by Machinery, carrying or conveying Passengers or Goods for Pay, Hire, or Reward, shall be paid every Time of passing and also every Time of repassing through any of the said Toll Gates, Turnpikes, Side Bars, or Chains.

XIV. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls hereby made payable for or in respect of Horses drawing any Post Chaise or other Carriage, or in respect of any Carriage propelled or moved by Machinery, which shall be let out to Hire, shall be payable and paid every Time of passing along the said Roads, or either of them, whenever any new Hiring thereof shall take place.

No Person to exercise Three Horses at once, having one on each Side of him. XV. And be it further enacted, That if any Person shall exercise Three or more Horses at the same Time upon any Part of the said several Roads, riding One of the said Horses, and shall not lead or keep the others on one and the same Side of the Horse on which he shall ride, but shall lead One or more of such Horses on each Side of him, he shall for every such Offence forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Shillings.

One Horse Carts may be weighed. XVI. And whereas it frequently happens that Carts drawn by One Horse, passing along the said Roads, carry a greater Weight than is by Law allowed for Carts drawn by Two or more Horses; be it therefore further enacted, That all Carts passing along the said Roads drawn by One Horse only shall and may be weighed at any Weighing Machine now erected or to be erected on the said Roads, and the like additional Tolls demanded, received, and recovered for the Overweight thereof as are by Law payable in respect of the Overweight of Carts drawn by Two or more Horses; and all the Powers, Regulations, Penalties, Matters, and Things now in force relating to the weighing of Waggons, Carts, and other Carriages drawn by more than One Horse, shall be applicable to Carts passing on the said Roads drawn by One Horse only, and to the Drivers, Masters, and Owners thereof.

Penalty for hanging out Clothes, &c.

XVII. And be it further enacted, That if any Person or Persons shall hang or put or place out any Linen or other Clothes on any Line, Bank, Rail, or Fence adjoining the said Roads, or shall hang or put or place any Hook or Hooks or other Thing or Things to, from, or in any House, Shop, or Place adjoining or being near to the said Roads, so as to project into the said Roads or be an Annoyance to any Persons or Cattle passing thereon, or prevent the free and safe Use of the whole Breadth of the said Roads, every Person offending in any of the Cases aforesaid shall forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Shillings for every such Offence.

Entrance to Fields, &c. to be made with hard Materials.

XVIII. And be it further enacted, That in all Places throughout the said Roads respectively hereby directed to be repaired, where any Entrance shall be from the said Roads to any Field, Garden, Yard, or other Land or Ground, or to any Building from the said Roads, or either of them respectively, or any Part thereof, such Entrance shall be properly covered with Stone, Gravel, or other hard Materials, and a

proper

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proper Culvert or Drain made by or at the Expence of the Proprietor or Occupier of such Field, Garden, Yard, Land, Ground, or Buildings, so that such Roads may not be injured by Carriages or Horses passing to or from the same by such Entrance; and in case such Proprietor or Occupier shall neglect to cover with proper Materials such Entrance, or to make such Culvert or Drain, or to keep the same respectively in proper Order, for the Space of One Calendar Month after Notice in Writing given to such Proprietor or Occupier, or left for him or her at his or her usual or last known Place of Residence, by the Surveyor to the said Trustees, or other Person appointed by them, requiring such Proprietor or Occupier so to make or repair the same, then it shall be lawful for the said Trustees, or any Three or more of them, or their Surveyor, or any other Person acting by or under their or his Authority, to cover such Entrance with Stone, Gravel, or other hard Materials, and to make such Culvert or Drain, or to repair the same respectively (as the Case may be); and the Expences thereof shall be reimbursed and paid to the said Trustees by such Proprietor or Occupier (as the Case may be); and in case of Nonpayment of such Expences within Fourteen Days after the same shall have been demanded by or on behalf of the said Trustees, then such Expences shall and may be recovered, together with the Costs and Charges attending the same, by Distress and Sale of the Goods and Chattels of such Proprietor or Occupier, by Warrant under the Hand and Seal or Hands and Seals of any Justice or Justices of the Peace of the said County of Leicester, and which Warrant of Distress any such Justice or Justices is or are hereby authorized and empowered to grant on Proof made before him or them, on Oath, of such Expence having been incurred, and of such Notice having been given as aforesaid; and the Overplus (if any) shall be returned, on Demand, to the Person or Persons whose Goods and Chattels shall have been so distrained and sold.

XIX. And be it further enacted, That all the Monies which shall Application have been raised and produced by virtue of the said recited Acts have been raised and produced by virtue of the said Harborough raised on the hereby repealed, so far as the same relate to the said Harborough Harborough District of Roads, which shall be remaining undisposed of on the Day District. of the Commencement of this Act, and also all the Monies which shall arise and be collected and levied under or by virtue of this Act, and the Monies which shall be borrowed on the Credit thereof, so far as relates to the same District of Roads, shall be applied and disposed of by the said Trustees in manner following; (that is to say,) in the first place, in paying and discharging the Costs of procuring and passing this Act (except such Share thereof as shall be paid on account of the said Wanlip District); in the next place, in paying and discharging the Interest now in arrear and accruing and becoming due upon the several Mortgages and Securities which have been already made and granted, or which shall be at any Time made and granted upon the said Tolls in pursuance of this Act, in respect of the said Harborough District; and in the next place, in erecting Toll Houses, Turnpikes, and Weighing Machines, and in diverting, repairing, widening, altering, lighting, guarding, draining, and improving the said District of Roads, and keeping the same in repair, and in defraying all the Charges and Expences of carrying this [Local.]

this Act into execution in respect of the same District; and lastly, in reducing, paying off, and discharging the Principal Monies already owing, or to be borrowed on Security of the Tolls and Duties by this Act granted, so far as relates to or concerns the said *Harborough* District of Roads, and to or for no other Use or Purpose whatsoever.

Application of Tolls raised on the Wanlip District.

XX. And be it further enacted, That all the Monies which shall have been raised and produced by virtue of the said recited Acts hereby repealed, so far as the same relate to the said Wanlip District of Roads, which shall be remaining undisposed of on the Day of the Commencement of this Act, and also all the Monies which shall arise and be collected and levied under or by virtue of this Act, and the Monies which shall be borrowed on the Credit thereof, so far as relates to the same District of Roads, shall be applied and disposed of by the said Trustees in manner following; (that is to say,) in the first place, in paying and discharging the proportionate Share of the Costs of procuring and passing this Act; in the next place, in erecting Toll Houses, Turnpikes, and Weighing Machines, and in diverting, repairing, widening, altering, lighting, guarding, draining, and improving the said Wanlip District of Roads, and keeping the same in repair, and in defraying all the Charges and Expences of carrying this Act into execution, and in paying and keeping down the Interest of the Monies now in arrear and accruing and becoming due on the several Mortgages and Securities which have been already made and granted, or which shall be at any Time made and granted upon the said Tolls in pursuance of this Act, in respect of the said Wanlip District of Roads; and lastly, in reducing, paying off, and discharging the Principal Monies already owing or to be borrowed on Security of the Tolls and Duties by this Act granted, so far as relates to or concerns the said Wanlip District of Roads, and to or for no other Use or Purpose whatsoever.

Public Act.

XXI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

Commencement and Continuance of the Act. XXII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect from and after the Second Monday next after the passing thereof, and shall from thenceforth continue and be in full Force and Effect and be executed for and during the Term of Thirty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

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
