An Act for more effectually repairing and improving the Road from Bolton-le-Moors to Blackburne in the County Palatine of Lancaster, with Two Branches of Road therefrom; and for making and maintaining a Branch of Road to or near the Village of Lower Darwen.

[8th April 1830.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Thirty-seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for amending, widening, altering, and 37G.3.c.173. keeping in repair the Road from Bolton-in-the-Moors to Blackburn in the County Palatine of Lancaster: And whereas an Act was passed in the Fiftieth Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act to continue the Term and alter and 50 G.3. c. 100. enlarge the Powers of an Act of the Thirty-seventh Year of His present Majesty, for amending the Road from Bolton-in-the-Moors to Blackburn in the County Palatine of Lancaster; and for making a Branch of Road from the said Road to the Road leading from Blackburn to Preston, and another Branch of Road from Mather Fold to Hardmans, both in Turton in the said County: And whereas the Trustees acting under and by virtue of the said recited Acts have proceeded to put the same into execution, and have borrowed several considerable Sums of Money on the Credit of the Tolls thereby authorized [Local.]

authorized to be taken on the said Roads, which still remain due and owing, and cannot be paid off, or the Interest thereof discharged, nor can the said Roads be effectually amended, improved, and kept in repair, unless the Term granted and continued by the said Acts be further continued; and it would be more convenient to the said Trustees and beneficial to the said Roads if the said recited Acts were repealed, and if further and more effectual Provisions were granted instead thereof: And whereas the making and maintaining of a Branch Road from and out of the said Road leading from Bolton-le-Moors to Blackburn, commencing at or near a certain Field called the Eyes Meadow, in the Occupation of William Turner Esquire, in the Township of Lower Darwen in the said County, and terminating at or near the River Darwen in the same Township, would be very advantageous and convenient to the Public; but the Purposes aforesaid cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Recited Acts Authority of the same, That upon the Fourth Day of August next after the passing of this Act, the said recited Acts of the Thirty-seventh and Fiftieth Years of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third shall be and the same are hereby declared to be repealed, and null and void to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall thereupon to commence commence and take effect and be put into execution for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, for the Purpose of more effectually amending, widening, altering, improving, maintaining, and keeping in repair the Road leading from the Northernly End of Bridge Street in the Town of Bolton-le-Moors to the Southerly End of Darwen Street Bridge in the Town of Blackburn, all in the County Palatine of Lancaster, and the Branch of Road leading from and out of the said Road, at or near Mather Fold in the Township of Turton in the said County, to or near Hardmans in the same Township, and the Branch of Road leading from and out of the said first-mentioned Road, at or near Heywood Mill in the Township of Lower Darwen in the said County, to the Blackburn and Preston Road, at or near a Smithy called Ned Pickup's Smithy, in the Township of Livesey in the said County; and also for making, maintaining, and keeping in repair another Branch of Road from and out of the said firstmentioned Road at or near a certain Field called the Eyes Meadow, in the Occupation of William Turner Esquire, in Lower Darwen aforesaid, to or near the River Darwen in the same Township.

Power to appoint additional Trustees.

VI. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said respective Trustees, and they are hereby respectively authorized and empowered from Time to Time at any of their Meetings to be held for that Purpose, to elect and appoint any Number of Persons, not exceeding Three in the whole for each of the said respective Districts of Road, to be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, in addition to the respective Trustees hereby nominated and appointed; and such Trustees so elected and appointed shall be and they are hereby invested with the same Powers and Authorities for executing this Act as if they had been hereby nominated and appointed.

Meetings of Trustees.

VII. And be it further enacted, That the first Meeting of the Trustees for the said Road from Bolton-le-Moors to Blackburn, and the said Branch of Road from Mather Fold to Hardmans, shall be held at the Bridge Inn in Bolton-le-Moors, or at some other convenient House or Place, on the Fourth Day of August next after the passing of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be; and the first Meeting of the Trustees for the said Branch of Road from Heywood Mill in Lower Darwen to Ned Pickup's Smithy in Livesey, and of the Trustees for the said Branch of Road from the Eyes Meadow in Lower Darwen to the River Darwen, shall be held at the Old Bull Inn in Blackburn, or at some other convenient House or Place, on the Sixth Day of August next after the passing of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be; and the said respective Trustees shall then and there proceed to carry this Act into execution, and shall and may then and from Time to Time afterwards adjourn to and meet at such Time and Times, and at such Place or Places in the Neighbourhood of the said Roads, as they shall respectively think proper.

No Money VIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall not be lawful for to be laid out the said Trustees to lay out or expend any Money received by or vested

vested in them by virtue of this Act in the Repair or Improvement in the Repair of any of the Streets, Highways, or Pavements of any of the Towns through or into which any of the said Roads pass, or to collect any Toll therein.
