An Act for repairing the Road from Birmingham, through Warwick and Warmington, in the County of Warwick, to the utmost Limits of the said County on Edgehill. [29th May 1830.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, intituled An Act for repairing the Roads leading from 12 G. 1. c. 6. Birmingham through Warwick to Warmington, and from Birmingham through Stratford-upon-Avon to Edgehill, in the County of Warwick: And whereas another Act was passed in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled An Act 18 G. 2. c. 32. for continuing, amending, and making more effectual an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the First, for repairing the Roads leading from Birmingham to Edgehill in the County of Warwick: And whereas another Act was passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Second, intituled An Act to continue and render more effectual 31 G.2.c. 58. Two Acts of Parliament, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty and in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads leading from Birmingham to Edgehill in the County of Warwick: And whereas another Act was passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act to continue, enlarge, and 20 G. 3. c. 80. render more effectual the Term and Powers in Three several Acts, $\lceil Local. \rceil$ 28 Zmade

made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the First, and in the Eighteenth and Thirty-first Years of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the Roads from Birmingham through Warwick to Warmington, and from Birmingham through Stratfordupon-Avon to Edgehill, in the County of Warwick, so far as the same relate to the Road from Birmingham through Warwick to Warmington aforesaid, and so on to the utmost Limits of the said County on Edgehill aforesaid: And whereas another Act was passed in the Fiftieth Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King 50 G. 3. c. 95. George the Third, intituled An Act to continue the Term and alter and enlarge the Powers of several Acts, for repairing the Roads from Birmingham to Warmington, and from Birmingham to Edgehill, in the County of Warwick, so far as the same relate to the Road from Birmingham to Warmington, and so on to the utmost Limits of the said County on Edgehill: And whereas the Trustees appointed under or by virtue of the said Acts have proceeded in the Execution thereof, and have from Time to Time for that Purpose borrowed considerable Sums of Money on the Credit of the Tolls authorized to be taken on the said Road from Birmingham to Warmington and Edgehill, which Money still remains due and owing, and the same cannot be repaid, nor can the said Road be effectually amended, widened, improved, and kept in repair, unless the Terms of the said Acts be further extended, and the Tolls increased or altered: And whereas Parts of the said Road are narrow, circuitous, and inconvenient, and it is expedient that certain Variations should be made therein: And whereas it would facilitate the Execution of the Purposes aforesaid if the said several recited Acts were repealed, and if the Powers thereby given, and such further Powers as may be necessary, for repairing and maintaining the said Road, and for carrying this Act into execution, were granted, and comprised in One Act: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and immediately after the Third Wednesday next after the passing of this Act the said several recited Acts, passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King. George the First, the Eighteenth and Thirty-first Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and the Iwentieth and Fiftieth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, so far as the same relate to the Road from Birmingham to Warmington and Edgehill, shall be and the same are hereby declared to be repealed.

So much of recited Acts as relate to the Road from Birmingham to Warmington repealed.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be put into This Act to take effect execution, for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, for the for repairing Purpose of more effectually amending, widening, improving, and the said keeping in repair the present Turnpike Road leading from Bir-Road. mingham through Warwick to Warmington aforesaid, and so on to the utmost Limits of the said County on Edgehill aforesaid.

are hereby appointed Trustees for amending, widening, improving, and keeping in repair the said Road, and for otherwise carrying this Act into execution.

Meetings of Trustees.

IV. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees shall meet on the Fourth Wednesday next after the passing of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be, between the Hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Two in the Afternoon, at the Warwick Arms in the Town of Warwick aforesaid, or at some other convenient House or Place on the Line of the said Road, and shall then proceed to carry this Act into execution; and the said Trustees shall then and from Time to Time afterwards adjourn to and meet at the same Place, or at such other Place on the said Road, and at such Times, as the said Trustees, or the major Part of them present at any Meeting, shall think proper and appoint.

Power to appoint additional Trustees.

V. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees and they are hereby authorized and empowered to elect and appoint any Number of Persons, not exceeding Five in the whole, in addition to the Number of Trustees herein named and appointed, to be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act; and such Persons, so elected and appointed, being duly qualified, shall be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, and are hereby invested with the same Powers and Authorities for executing the same as if they had been herein named.

Power to take Tolls. VI. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Trustees, or any Person or Persons to be appointed Collector or Collectors of the Tolls to be taken by virtue of this Act, to demand and take the Tolls following at the several and respective Turnpikes and Toll Gates or Toll Houses, or Side Bars or Side Gates or Chains, which are or is or shall be erected or continued, by virtue of this Act, in, upon, across, or on the Side or Sides of the said Road or any Part thereof, once on every Day, such Day to be computed from Twelve of the Clock at Night to Twelve of the Clock of the next succeeding Night; (that is to say,)

Tolls.

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Coach, Chariot, Sociable, Landau, Berlin, Vis-à-vis, Barouche, Britska, Phaeton, Calash, Chaise, Caravan, Hearse, Litter, or other Four-wheeled Carriage, Four-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Curricle, Chaise,

Chair, Gig, or Whiskey, Four-pence:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, or other Carriage of Four Wheels with Six-inch Wheels or upwards, when Six or more Horses, Three-pence each; Five Horses, Three-pence Three Farthings each; Four Horses or under, Five-pence each Horse;

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, or other Carriage with Wheels of the Width of Four and a Half

Inches, Five-pence Three Farthings:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, or other Carriage with Wheels of less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, Seven-pence:

For

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Cart or other Carriage with Wheels of Six Inches, Three-pence:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Cart or other Two-wheeled Carriage with Wheels of the Width of Four and a Half Inches, Three-pence Three Farthings:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Cart or other Two-wheeled Carriage with Wheels of less Width than Four and a

Half Inches, Four-pence Halfpenny:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast not drawing, One Penny: For every Drove of Oxen or other Neat Cattle, Ten-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less Number:

For every Drove of Calves, Swine, and Sheep or Lambs, Five-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less Number:

And between the First Day of January and the Sixth Day of April, and the Eleventh Day of October and the Thirty-first Day of December, in each Year, each Day inclusive, for every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, or other Carriage laden with Timber, Double the Tolls herein-before authorized to be taken for such Horses, Mules, or other Beasts drawing any kind of Carriage:

Which said respective Sums of Money shall be demanded and taken in the Name of and as a Toll; and the Money so to be raised and collected shall be and the same is hereby vested in the said Trustees, and the same and every Part thereof shall be paid, applied, and disposed of in manner herein-after directed.

VII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That if any Tolls to be Person shall have paid the Toll hereby authorized to be taken for paid but once the passing of any Horse, Cattle, Beast, or Carriage through any One a Day. of the said Toll Gates, Toll Bars, Side Gates, Side Bars, or Chains, to be erected or continued by virtue of this Act, such Horse, Cattle, Beast, or Carriage shall, on a Ticket denoting the Payment thereof for that Day being produced, be permitted to pass Toll-free through the same Toll Gate, Toll Bar, Side Gate, Side Bar, or Chain, and also through such other Gate or Gates as the Ticket for such Payment shall free, at any Time or Times during the same Day, to be computed as aforesaid; any thing in this Act contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That no more than Four full Limiting the Tolls shall be taken upon the said Road for the same Horses, Cattle, Number of and Beasts passing and repassing through all or any of the Toll Gates, taken on the Turnpikes, or Side Bars, Chain or Chains, erected or to be erected Whole Line across or on the Sides of the said Road, in any one Day, such Day to of Road. be computed from Twelve of the Clock in one Night to Twelve of the Clock in the next succeeding Night.

Tolls to be

IX. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls Stage hereby made payable shall be paid for and in respect of all Horses Coaches, &c. or Cattle drawing any Stage Coach, Van, Caravan, or Stage Waggon Time of or other Stage Carriage conveying Passengers or Goods for Pay or passing. Reward, for every Time of passing or repassing along the said Road; provided nevertheless, that no further or additional Toll shall [Local.] 29 A

shall be payable in respect of Stage Coaches on account only of the Horses drawing the same having been changed.

&c. on every new Hiring.

Post Chaises, X. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls hereby made payable shall be paid for and in respect of all Horses or other Beasts drawing any Post Chaise, Car, or other Carriage travelling for Hire, for every Time of passing or repassing along the said Road whenever a new Hiring of such Post Chaise, Car, or other Carriage shall have taken place.

Application of Tolls and other Monies.

XI. And be it further enacted, That out of the Tolls and other Monies which shall be raised or received by virtue of this Act the said Trustees shall in the first place pay and discharge all the Expences and Costs relative to the procuring and passing of this Act, and the Remainder of such Monies shall from Time to Time be applied in erecting Toll Houses, Toll Bars, Side Gates, Side Bars, Chains, and Weighing Machines, and in making, amending, widening, altering, and improving the said Road, and keeping the same in repair, and in defraying all the Charges and Expences of carrying this Act into execution, and in repaying the Principal Monies by this Act charged or to be borrowed, and the Interest due or to grow due thereon.

No Part of the Tolls to be applied in repairing Streets.

XII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That no Part of the Money arising or to be received by virtue of this Act shall be laid out in repairing, improving, or maintaining any Street, Highway, or Place in any Part of the Town of Warwick; any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

Power to make new Cuts.

XIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees and they are hereby authorized and empowered to make and carry the several proposed Variations of the present Turnpike Road in, upon, over, or through any private Lands or Grounds described in the Maps or Plans and Books of Reference herein-after mentioned, and to make the same Road of such Width as they shall think proper, not exceeding Forty Feet, together with such Footpaths, Causeways, Bridges, Culverts, Fences, Ditches, and Drains as they shall think necessary or expedient.

Plans and Books of Reference deposited with the Peace to be open to Inspection.

XIV. And whereas Maps or Plans, describing the several Variations, and the Lands, Hereditaments, and Premises through or over which the same are to be made or carried, together with Books of Reference, containing Lists of the Names of the Owners and Occupiers or Clerks of the reputed Owners and Occupiers of such Lands, Hereditaments, and Premises, have been deposited at the Offices of the Clerks of the Peace for the said Counties of Warwick and Worcester; be it therefore enacted, That the said Maps or Plans and Books of Reference shall remain in the Custody of the said Clerks of the Peace, to the end that all Persons may at all seasonable Times have Liberty to inspect and peruse the same, and to take Copies or Extracts thereof, at their Will and Pleasure, paying to the Clerks of the Peace the Sum of One Shilling for every such Inspection, and at the Rate of Sixpence for every One hundred Words of such Copies or Extracts; and the said Trustees in making the said Variations or Alterations

XV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Lands said Trustees to make the said Variations and Alterations into, described through, across, or over the several Lands, Hereditaments, or in the Plans Premises of any Person or Persons who is or are or may be Owner taken, or Owners or reputed Owner or Owners of Land or Premises over although which the same is or are set out and described in the said Maps or Plans as aforesaid, although such Lands, Hereditaments, or Premises, described in the Book of or the Name or Names of such Person or Persons, may happen to be Reference. erroneously described or omitted or mis-stated in the said Maps or Plans or Books of Reference, in case it shall appear to any Two or more Justices of the Peace for the said Counties or either of them, and be certified by Writing under their Hands, that such Error or Omission proceeded from Mistake.

XVI. XVII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That if the said Limiting the Trustees shall not within the Space of Five Years after the passing Period for of this Act agree for or cause to be purchased and paid for the property. Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments mentioned in the Schedule to this Act annexed, then and from thenceforth the Powers by this Act granted to them for such Purpose shall cease, determine, and be utterly void and of no Effect, save and except with the Consent of the Owners and Occupiers of such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments; any thing herein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding.

XVIII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed Public Act. and taken to be a Public Act; and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

XIX. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence Term of Act. on the Third Wednesday next after the passing thereof, and from thence shall continue and be in force for the Term of Thirty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
