An Act for improving several Roads, and making certain new Roads, in the Counties of Devon and Somerset, leading to and from the Town of Tiverton; and for amending an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing several Roads leading from and through the Town of Wiveliscombe.

[29th May 1830.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Fifty-first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for repairing and improving the Roads leading 51 G.3. c.48. to and from Tiverton in the County of Devon: And whereas another Act was passed in the Fifty-third Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty, intituled An Act for enlarging the Powers of an Act 53 G.3. c. 2. of His present Majesty, for repairing Roads leading to and from Tiverton in the County of Devon, and for making a new Road to communicate therewith: And whereas considerable Sums of Money are due and owing on the Credit of the Tolls by the said Acts authorized to be taken on the Roads comprised in the said Acts, which cannot be paid off, nor can the said Roads be sufficiently improved and maintained in repair, unless the Term and Powers of the said Acts are enlarged, and the Tolls increased or altered: And whereas it would be more convenient to the Trustees, and beneficial

to the said Roads and to the Public, if the said recited Acts were

repealed, and if further and other Powers were granted instead thereof: And whereas the making of certain Alterations or Diversions in the Line of certain Parts of the said Roads, and the making and maintaining in repair certain new Lines of Turnpike Road to communicate with other Parts of the said Roads, will be of great Benefit and Convenience to the Inhabitants of the several Parishes through which such Alterations and new Roads will pass, and will also be of great public Utility, by opening a better Line of Communication between the Towns of Tiverton and Southmolton, by making a new Piece of Road from the present Turnpike Road at a certain Place near unto and West of Mr. James Edward Teale's Cottage, between the Sixth and Seventh Mile Stones on Gibbet Moor, to the present Highway at a Place called Two Gates, and by making Turnpike the said Highway from thence, with certain Diversions thereof, to a Field in the Occupation of John Mog ford, in the Parish of Knowstone, and by making a new Piece of Road from thence into the Wiveliscombe and Southmolton Turnpike Road, near the Eighteenth Mile Post; and by opening a better Line of Communication between the Towns of Tiverton and Chawleigh, by making a new Piece of Road from the present Turnpike Road leading from Tiverton to Southmolton, from or near the Five Mile Post, between Tiverton and Southmolton, into the Highway in the Parish of Templeton, and making Turnpike the said Highway, with certain Diversions thereof, to a Place called Noman's Land, in the Parish of Witheridge; and by opening a better Line of Communication from Tiverton towards the new Turnpike Road leading from Barnstaple to Exeter, by making a new Piece of Road commencing at or near Penny Park, in Tiverton aforesaid, to Quirkhill, and from thence to the present Highway near Lower Lugsland, and making Turnpike the said Highway, with certain Diversions thereof, to the said Place called Nomans Land, and by making Turnpike the Line of the present Highway from the said Place called Noman's Land, with certain Diversions thereof, to the Southmolton Turnpike Road at Labbots Cross, and by making Turnpike the present Highway leading from the Southmolton Turnpike Road at or near Chawleigh, with a Diversion thereof through Lands in the Parish of Chawleigh, to the Turnpike Road now being made, leading from Barnstaple to Exeter, and by making a new Piece of Road leading from near Labbots Cross, partly along certain existing Highways, to the present Turnpike Road leading from Barnstaple to Exeter, at or near Dinniford; and by opening a better Line of Communication between Tiverton and Cullompton, by making a new Turnpike Road commencing at or near the Bottom of the Hill called Newtes Hill, and leading into and through a certain Close called Culver Park, or other Lands, Part of the Glebe of the Portion of the Rectory of Tidcombe in Tiverton aforesaid, and through a certain Close in the Possession of John Skinner, and then partly along certain existing Highways through Warnicombe, Drizzlecombe, and Rawridge, to Crossland Cross, and from thence by the present Highway and certain Diversions to Sweaton, and from Sweaton to the Turnpike Road leading from Cullompton to Willand, at or near a Close in the Occupation of John Gale; also by opening a better Line of Communication from Tiverton towards Honiton, by making a new Turnpike Road commencing at or near the Eastern End of

the Village of Halberton in the present Turnpike Road there, and leading partly along certain Highways through Spratford Green, and thence to the Highway leading from Burn Rew, and thence to the Village of Willand aforesaid, and thence on to Bradfield Factory, and thence to Lower Kentsford, and thence to Kentisbeer Moor, and thence into the Turnpike Road leading from Cullompton to Honiton, at or near a Field in the Occupation of Stephen Pyne; and also by opening a better Line of Communication from Tiverton towards Wellington in the County of Somerset, by making a new Piece of Road commencing near Putson Barn, on the present Turnpike Road leading from Tiverton to Halberton, through Part of Gornhay Farm in the Parish of Tiverton aforesaid, to a certain Highway there, and by making Turnpike the said Highway, with certain Diversions thereof, to Beam Bridge in the Parish of Sandford Arundell in the County of Somerset, where it will unite with the Turnpike Road leading from Tiverton to Wellington: And whereas an Act was passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled An Act for more effectually repairing several 6 G. 4. c. 93. Roads leading from and through the Town of Wiveliscombe in the County of Somerset, and the Roads adjoining thereto in the Counties of Somerset and Devon, and for making a new Line of Road to communicate therewith, whereby the Trustees for executing the said Act are empowered to continue or remove all and every or any of the Toll Gates or Turnpikes and Toll Houses standing and being in or upon or across the said Roads, or on the Sides thereof, and also to erect upon, in, or across the Roads by the said Act authorized to be repaired and amended or made, or any Part thereof, or on the Sides thereof, when, where, and as they shall judge necessary, any Gate or Gates, Turnpike or Turnpikes, Side Gate or Side Gates, Side Bar or Side Bars, Chain or Chains, and Toll Houses, and from Time to Time to take down and remove or alter or discontinue the same, or any of them, as the said Trustees shall think proper and direct or appoint; and to take Tolls in respect of the Passage of Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Beasts, and Carriages travelling on Part of the Roads under their Care and Management, subject nevertheless to a Limitation that no more than Three full Tolls shall be demanded or taken from any Person or Persons passing and repassing the same Day with or driving the same Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Beasts, or Carriages through all or any of the Toll Gates or Turnpikes which shall be continued or erected by virtue of the said Act upon the new Line of Road, from the Town Hall of Wiveliscombe, by Shilling ford, and through or near Bampton, to the Southmolton and Tiverton Turnpike Road at or near Bish Mills, near Southmolton aforesaid; and inasmuch as the intended new Piece of Road herein-before mentioned, from Gibbet Moor into the Wiveliscombe and Southmolton Turnpike Road, near the Eighteenth Mile Post thereon, will open a convenient Communication for the Public between the Towns of Tiverton and Southmolton, provided the Public be not subjected to excessive Toll under the Liability of being compelled to pay more than One full Toll on such Part of the Wiveliscombe Turnpike Road as is between the Junction of the said Roads and the Town of Southmolton, it is therefore expedient that the Trustees for executing the said Act should be restrained from taking more than One full Toll on any One Day on such Part of the Wiveliscombe

Wiveliscombe Turnpike Road as lies at and between the Point of the said Junction of the said Roads and the Town of Southmolton, for Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Beasts, or Carriages (except Coaches or other Carriages, and Horses or other Beasts, let on a second Hiring,) travelling between Tiverton and Southmolton aforesaid, and that for such Purpose the Powers of the said last-mentioned Act should be amended: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and Recited Acts by the Authority of the same, That from and after the Day of the Commencement of this Act the said recited Acts passed in the Fiftyfirst and Fifty-third Years of the Reign of His late Majesty shall be and the same are hereby declared to be repealed.

Purposes of this Act.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be put in execution, for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, for the Purpose of more effectually repairing, widening, altering, diverting, and from Time to Time amending, improving, and keeping in repair the Roads leading from Lowman Bridge in the Town of Tiverton, through the several Parishes of Tiverton, Halberton, Butterleigh, Bradninch, and Silverton, to a Place called the Workhouse, in the Town of Silverton; and from a Place called Hunt's House, in the said Parish of Tiverton, through the Parishes of Tiverton, Halberton, Sampford Peverell, Burlescombe, Culmstock, Holcombe Rogus, and Sandford Arundell, to a Place called the White Ball, in the said Parish of Sandford Arundell; and from the Way Post, in the Northeast End of Leonard Moor in the Parish of Burlescombe, in the Road between Tiverton and the White Ball aforesaid, through the several Parishes of Burlescombe, Halberton, Willand, and Cullompton, to a certain House known by the Sign of the White Hart, in Cullompton aforesaid; and from a certain Place called Exeter Hill Foot, through the several Parishes of Tiverton, Halberton, and Cullompton, to the White Hart in Cullompton aforesaid; and from a Place called Burrough Corner, in the Parish of Halberton, through the Parishes of Halberton, Butterleigh, and Cullompton, to a Place called Burnaford otherwise Bunnival's Cross, in the Parishes of Cullompton and Bradninch; and from the Eastern End of Broad Lane, in a Street called Westexe, in the said Town of Tiverton, through the several Parishes of Tiverton, Bickleigh, Thorverton Cadbury, Cheriton Fitzpaine, Stockley Pomeroy, Shobrooke, Upton Hellions, and Crediton, to a Place called Crediton Forches, in the said Parish of Crediton; and from Wellbrooke Bridge in the said Town of Tiverton, through the several Parishes of Tiverton, Calverleigh, Loxbear, Stoodleigh, and Rackenford, to a Place called Cruwyshay House, in the said Parish of Rackenford; and from a Public House known by the Sign of the Blue Bottle, in the Parish of Calverleigh, in the said Road to Cruwyshay House, to the Smith's Shop at the West End of Templeton Hill, beyond the Brook of Water in the Road from Tiverton to Witheridge; and from a Place called Penny Park, in the said Parish of Tiverton, in the Way leading to Rackenford aforesaid, to a Place called Grubeare Bridge, in the said Parish of Tiverton; and from a Place called Cottey House, in the said Parish of Tiverton, in the Way

Way to Rackenford aforesaid, to a Place called Worthy Bridge, in the said Parish of Tiverton; and from a Place called the Bampton Inn, in the said Town of Tiverton, through the Parishes of Tiverton and Bampton, over Bampton Down, to the Foot of the Bridge now building in Bampton Town; and from a Place called Bickleigh Bridge Cross, in the Road between Tiverton and Crediton Forches, over Bickleigh Bridge, through the Parishes of Tiverton, Bickleigh, and Silverton, to a certain House formerly called or known by the Sign of the Swan, in the Town of Silverton; and from the Town of Tiverton aforesaid to Bampton, by way of Bolham and Cove; and from Chapman's Bridge in the Parish of Bampton aforesaid, by way of Duval, Westbrooke, and Wonham, into the Road near Exe Bridge Turnpike Gate, leading towards Dulverton, and which Road passes through or into the Parishes of Tiverton and Bampton aforesaid; and from the Toll House near Bickleigh Bridge into the present Road from Tiverton to Exeter, between the Fourth and Fifth Mile Stones; and from the Bottom of Cobland Cross Hill, in the Parish of Bickleigh, into the said Road from Tiverton to Exeter, near the Sixth Mile Stone; and from the Corner of the said Road near Moony Banks Lane, through the said Lane, into the Exeter Turnpike Road, near the Fifth Mile Stone; and from the Point of Junction of the new Exeter Road with the Tiverton Road, near Swafford Lake in the Parish of Stoke Canon, to Mary Pole Head, and from thence to the One Mile Post from the City of Exeter near Mary Pole Head; and for keeping in repair the Bridge called Bickleigh Bridge, in the Parish of Tiverton aforesaid, and other Bridges on the Line of the said Roads, now liable to be maintained as Part of the said Roads; and for making the Alterations or Diversions in the Line of the said Roads, and making and maintaining in repair the new Lines of Turnpike Road, herein-before mentioned or described.

III. IV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, from Time to be appointed. Time, at any of their Meetings, to elect and appoint any Number of Persons being duly qualified to act as Trustees of Turnpike Roads in England, not exceeding Five in the whole, in addition to the Number of Trustees herein named and appointed, to be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act; and such Persons so elected and appointed, and being duly qualified to act as Trustees of Turnpike Roads in England, shall be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, and are hereby invested with the same Powers and Authorities for executing this Act as if they had been herein named.

Meetings of Trustees.

V. And be it further enacted, That the Trustees for executing this Act shall meet at the Town Hall or Guildhall of the said Town and Parish of Tiverton on the Day of the Commencement of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be, and shall and may also, yearly and every Year, assemble at the same Place on the first Monday after each of the respective Days herein-after mentioned, that is to say, the Twenty-fifth Day of March, the Twenty-fourth Day of June, the Twenty-ninth Day of September, and the Twentyfifth Day of December, and shall and may at any such Meeting adjourn to the same or such other Place as the said Trustees shall think proper; and if it shall happen that there shall not appear at

any such Meeting a sufficient Number of Trustees to act at such Meeting, then and so often as the Case shall happen such Meeting shall stand over and be deemed to be adjourned to the same Day in the following Week.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the several Tolls granted by Tolls granted the said recited Acts of the Fifty-first and Fifty-third Years of the Reign of His late Majesty, or either of them, shall be continued to be demanded and taken at the several Toll Gates or Turnpikes erected 1st Jan. 1831, on the said several Roads, until Twelve of the Clock at Night on when those the First Day of January next after the Commencement of this Act hereafter (when the Term of the several existing Leases or Agreements for shall be taken, letting of the said Tolls will expire), and then and from thenceforth except at the the respective Sums herein-after mentioned shall or may be demanded Gates herein and taken for Tolls at the several Toll Gates or Turnpikes erected or to be erected upon the said several Roads already made or to be made by virtue of this Act respectively, except at any Toll Gate or Turnpike erected or to be erected between Tiverton and Bampton by way of Bolham and Cove, and between Chapman's Bridge aforesaid, by way of Duvale, Westbrook, and Wonham, into the Road near the Exe Bridge Turnpike Gate, leading towards Dulverton; that is to say,

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One, drawing any Cart or other such Carriage (except Timber Carriages) with Two Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Four-pence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Five-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches,

the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One, drawing any Timber Carriage upon Three or Four Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Eight-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One, drawing any Timber Carriage with Two Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Eight-pence:

For

For every Horse or other Beast, when drawing singly any Waggon, Cart, or other such Carriage, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse, Mule, or Ass, laden or unladen, and not drawing, the Sum of Three Halfpence:

For every Ox, Cow, or Head of Neat Cattle, the Sum of Three Farthings:

For every Calf, Sheep, Swine, or Lamb, the Sum of One Halfpenny: For every Carriage or Vehicle of any Description passing along the said Roads, or any of them, propelled by Steam, or otherwise without Horses or other Beasts, the Sum of Sixpence for every Wheel on which the same shall run, if weighing, with the Loading (if any), not exceeding One Ton; and if weighing more than One Ton the further Sum of Sixpence per Wheel, and the further Sum of Sixpence per Wheel for every Excess of any further Ton Weight.

Tolls at Gates between Tiverton and Bampton, and Chapman's Bridge and Wonham.

VII. And be it further enacted, That from and after the said Term of the Expiration of the said Leases or Agreements, the respective Sums herein-after mentioned shall or may be demanded and taken for Tolls at any Toll Gate or Turnpike erected or to be erected between Tiverton and Bampton, by way of Bolham and Cove, and between Chapman's Bridge aforesaid, by way of Duvale, Westbroke, and Wonham, into the said Road near the Exe Bridge Turnpike Gate, leading towards Dulverton aforesaid; (that is to say,)

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than Two, drawing any Coach, Stage Coach, Berlin, Landau, Barouche, Chariot, Chaise, Chaise Marine, Chair, Curricle, Phaeton, Calash, Sociable, Car, Gig, Caravan, Van, Hearse, or Litter, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One and not more than Two, drawing any Coach, Stage Coach, Berlin, Landau, Barouche, Chariot, Chaise, Chaise Marine, Chair, Curricle, Phaeton, Calash, Sociable, Car, Gig, Caravan, Van, Hearse, or Litter, the Sum of Sixpence Three Farthings:

For every Horse or other Beast, when drawing singly any Coach, Stage Coach, Berlin, Landau, Barouche, Chariot, Chaise, Chaise Marine, Chair, Curricle, Phaeton, Calash, Sociable, Car, Gig, Caravan, Van, Hearse, or Litter, the Sum of Seven-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than Three, drawing any Waggon or other such Carriage (except Timber Carriages) upon Three or Four Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence Halfpenny; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Nine-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One and not more than Three, drawing any Waggon or other such Carriage (except Timber Carriages) upon Three or Four Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Four-pence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Five-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than Three, drawing any Cart or other such Carriage (except Timber Carriages) with Two Wheels,

Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence Halfpenny; and of a less Breadth than Four and a

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One and not more than Three, drawing any Timber Carriage upon Three or Four Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Eight-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than Three, drawing any Timber Carriage with Two Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Eight-pence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Nine-pence Halfpenny; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Eleven-pence:

For every Horse or other Beast, if more than One and not more than Three, drawing any Timber Carriage with Two Wheels, of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottom or Soles thereof, the Sum of Sixpence; of a less Breadth than Six Inches, and not less than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Seven-pence; and of a less Breadth than Four and a Half Inches, the Sum of Eightpence:

For every Horse or other Beast, when drawing singly any Waggon,

Cart, or other such Carriage, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse, Mule, or Ass, laden or unladen, and not drawing, the Sum of Two-pence:

For every Ox, Cow, or Head of Neat Cattle, the Sum of One Penny

Farthing:

For every Calf, Sheep, Swine, or Lamb, the Sum of Three Farthings: For every Carriage or Vehicle of any Description passing along the said Roads, or any or either of them, propelled by Steam, or otherwise without Horses or other Beasts, the Sum of Sixpence for every Wheel on which the same shall run, if weighing, with the Loading (if any), not exceeding One Ton; and if weighing more than One Ton, the further Sum of Sixpence per Wheel, and the further Sum of Sixpence per Wheel for every Excess of any further Ton Weight: [Local.]

And 29 K

And that the Toll or Sum of One Shilling and Sixpence for every Waggon drawn by more than Four Horses, (except the fore and hind Wheels of such Waggons as shall roll a Surface of at least Sixteen Inches wide on each Side of the said Waggons,) over and above the Tolls directed to be received by this Act, shall be paid at any Gate or Gates erected or to be erected on the Road between Bickleigh Bridge aforesaid and Silverton aforesaid.

Fraction of a Farthing in Tolls.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That in all Cases where there shall be a fractional Part of a Farthing in the Calculation or Amount of the Tolls herein mentioned, or any of them, the Sum of One Farthing shall be demanded and taken in lieu of such fractional Part.

Lime to be subject but to One Toll for the whole Journey.

IX. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That in all Cases where the Toll shall have been paid in respect of any Horse, Beast, or Cattle drawing any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage employed in drawing or fetching any One Load of Lime, at either of the Gates erected or to be erected on any Part of the Line of the present Turnpike Roads and the intended new Roads comprised in this Act, (except at any Gate erected or to be erected between Tiverton and Bampton, by way of Bolham and Cove, and between Chapman's Bridge aforesaid, by way of Duvale, Westbrooke, and Wonham, into the Road near Exe Bridge Turnpike Gate, leading towards Dulverton,) the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle so drawing the same Load of Lime shall be exempt from such Toll at all the other Gates for and in respect of drawing or fetching the same Load of Lime, passing through the same or any other Gate on the said present Turnpike Roads and intended new Roads, except as aforesaid, on the same Day or the Day after such Toll or Duty in respect thereof shall have been paid as aforesaid.

Toll to be taken but once a Day.

X. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That in case the Toll hereby authorized to be taken shall have been paid for the passing of any Horse, Beast, or Cattle (except Horses drawing any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, or Caravan, or other Stage Carriage,) through any One of such Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Gates, such Horse, Beast, or Cattle shall, upon a Ticket denoting the Payment thereof on that Day being produced, be permitted to pass Toll-free through the same Toll Gate, Turnpike, or Side Gate, and also through such other Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Gates (if any) as the Ticket for such Payment shall free, at any Time or Times during the same Day, any thing in this Act, or in any Law or Statute relating to Turnpike Roads in England, contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

Limiting the Number of Payments on the whole Line of Roads.

XI. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That no more than One full Toll shall be demanded or taken for or in respect of the same Horse, Reast, or Carriage, for passing or repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the several Roads next herein-after mentioned; that is to say, the present Road from Lowman Bridge in Tiverton to the Workhouse in Silverton; the present Road from Hunt's House in Tiverton to the Way Post in the North-east End of Leonard Moor; the present Road from the said Way Post in the North-east End of Leonard Moor to the White

Hart in Cullompton; the present Road from Exeter Hill Foot in Tiverton to the White Hart in Cullompton; the present Road from Burrough Corner in Halberton to Burnaford otherwise Bunnival's Cross, in the Parishes of Cullompton and Bradninch; the present Road from the Eastern End of Broad Lane in Tiverton to the Ninth Mile Post on the Road to Crediton; the present Road from Welbrook Bridge in Tiverton to Cruwyshay House in Rackenford; the present Road from the Blue Bottle in the Parish of Calverleigh, in the said Road to Cruwyshay House, to the Smith's Shop at the West End of Templeton Hill in the Road from Tiverton to Witheridge; the present Road from Penny Park in Tiverton to Grubeare Bridge in the Parish of Tiverton; the present Road from Cottey House in Tiverton to Worthy Bridge in Tiverton; the present Road from the Bampton Inn in Tiverton, over Bampton Down, to the Foot of the Bridge now building in Bampton; and the present Road from Bickleigh Bridge Cross, in the Road from Tiverton to Crediton, to the Swan in Silverton; and that no more than One full Toll shall be demanded or taken for or in respect of the same Horse, Beast, or Carriage, for passing and repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the present Road from the said Way Post in the North-east End of Leonard Moor to the White Ball in Sandford Arundell; and that no more than One full Toll shall be demanded or taken for or in respect of the same Horse, Beast, or Carriage, for passing and repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the present Road from the Ninth Mile Post on the Road to Crediton to Crediton Forches; and that no more than One full Toll shall be demanded or taken for or in respect of the same Horse, Beast, or Carriage, for passing and repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the present Road from Tiverton, through Bolham and Cove, to Bampton. and the present Road from the said Tiverton and Bampton Road, at Chapman's Bridge, into the Bampton and Dulverton Road; and that no more than Two full Tolls shall be demanded or taken for or in respect of the same Horse, Beast, or Carriage, for passing and repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates erected or to be erected on the present Roads from Tiverton to the said One Mile Post from the City of Exeter, near Mary Pole Head.

XII. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That Payment of Payment of Toll at any Gate or Gates on the present Road from Tiverton, by Toll on cer-Bolham and Cove, to Bampton, or on the present Road from the said clear certain Tiverton and Bampton Road at Chapman's Bridge into the Bampton other Roads. and Dulverton Road, shall clear any Gate or Gates erected or to be erected on the present Road from the Bampton Inn in Tiverton, over Bampton Down, to the Foot of the Bridge now building in Bampton.

XIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall not be lawful for Limiting the the said Trustees, or any Person appointed or continued Collector of Number of the Tolls mentioned in this Act, to demand and take the respective the new Sums or Tolls aforesaid at more than One Gate on the intended Roads. new Piece of Road from the present Turnpike Road at a certain Place near unto and West of Mr. James Edward Teale's Cottage to the Junction of the Wiveliscombe and Southmolton Turnpike Road,

near the Eighteenth Mile Post, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than One Gate on the intended new Piece of Road from near the Five Mile Post between Tiverton and Southmolton to a Place called Noman's Land, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than Two Gates on the Road from the Town of Tiverton, by Penny Park in Tiverton, to Noman's Land, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said last-mentioned Line of Road; nor at more than Two Gates from Noman's Land, by way of Labbots Cross, to the present Turnpike Road leading from Barnstaple to Exeter, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing on the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than Two Gates on the intended new Road from or near Labbots Cross to Dinniford, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than One Gate on the intended new Road from, at, or near the Bottom of the Hill called Newte's Hill to the Turnpike Road leading from Cullompton to Willand, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than One Gate on the intended new Piece of Road from the Eastern End of the Village of Halberton, in the present Turnpike Road there, to the Turnpike Road leading from Cullompton to Honiton, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Piece of Road; nor at more than Two Gates on the intended new Road from near Putson Barn, on the present Turnpike Road leading from Tiverton to Halberton, to the Junction of the Tiverton and Wellington Turnpike Road at Beam Bridge, in any One Day, in respect of the same Horses, Beasts, or Cattle passing and repassing in the same Day through all the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, and Side Gates on the said intended new Road.

When the Money borrowed for new Lines is paid off, the mit the Tolls thereon.

XIV. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That when and as soon as the Monies borrowed for the Purpose of making the Improvements hereby authorized to be made on any or either of the respective Lines of Road by this Act authorized to be diverted, widened, Trustees may improved, or made, together with the Interest due and to grow reduce or reduce or reduce thereon, and the Amount of all other Costs, Charges, and Expences incurred thereby or incident thereto, shall be paid off and discharged, then and from thenceforth it shall be lawful for the said Trustees to reduce or wholly cease to take the respective Sums or Tolls aforesaid thereon, or on any or either of them.

XV. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls Stage payable for or in respect of Horses or Beasts drawing any Stage Coaches, &c. Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, or Stage Waggon, or other Stage Time of Carriage or Cart, conveying Passengers or Goods for Pay, Hire, or passing. Reward, shall be payable and paid every Time of passing or repassing along the said Roads, or any of them: Provided also nevertheless, that no further or additional Toll shall be payable in respect of any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, or other Stage Carriage or Cart, on account only of the Horses or Beasts drawing the same having been changed.

XVI. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls Post Chaises, payable for or in respect of Horses or Beasts let out to Hire and employed in drawing any Post Chaise or other Carriage, or let out to Hire, and used for riding or any other Purpose, shall be payable and paid every Time of passing or repassing along the said Roads, or any of them, wherever any new Hiring thereof shall take place.

&c. on every new Hiring.

XVII. And be it further enacted, That out of the Monies already Application received for the Purposes of the said Roads, and now in the Treasurer's of Monies. Hands, or out of the first Money which shall arise or be received from the Tolls in this Act mentioned, or otherwise, the said Trustees shall in the first place pay and discharge all the Costs and Expences relative to the obtaining and passing of this Act; and the Remainder of all such Monies arising on the Turnpike Roads already made shall (after Payment of the necessary Expences of erecting or repairing Toll Gates, Toll Houses, Milestones, and Fences thereon, and the necessary Expences (or a due proportionate Share thereof) for Books, Advertisements, Salaries of Officers, and other such Expences incidental to the Execution of this Act,) from Time to Time be applied in keeping down the Interest of the Principal Monies advanced or borrowed for the Purposes of the Roads comprised in the said recited Acts hereby repealed, and in repairing and maintaining the said Roads, and in amending, making, altering, turning, widening, improving, and keeping in repair the said Bridge called Bickleigh Bridge, and all other Bridges on the Line of the said Roads now liable to be repaired by the said Trustees, and in otherwise putting this Act into execution with respect to the said Turnpike Roads already made, and lastly in repaying the Principal Monies already borrowed or to be borrowed for the Purposes of the said Turnpike Roads already made; and that the Tolls to arise on the respective new Roads to be made by virtue of this Act shall (after Payment of the necessary Expences of erecting or repairing Toll Gates, Toll Houses, Milestones, and Fences thereon respectively, and a due proportionate Share of the necessary Expences for Books, Advertisements, Salaries of Officers, and other such Expences incidental to the Execution of this Act,) from Time to Time be applied in paying the Amount of Two Pounds per Centum per Annum of the Interest of any Money which may be borrowed for making the same respectively, and then in repairing such new Roads respectively, and afterwards in the Payment of the Residue of the Interest of the Money so borrowed, and all Arrears thereof, and lastly in repaying the Principal Monies which may be so borrowed. Separate Accounts to be kept.

XVIII. And be it further enacted, That a separate and distinct Account shall be kept by the Clerk to the said Trustees, in a Book or Books to be provided for that Purpose, of all Monies laid out and expended on each respective Line of Road by this Act authorized to be diverted, widened, improved, or made, and also separate and distinct Accounts of the Tolls collected or received at the several Gates erected and set up upon or across each of such respective Lines of Road.

Expence of Repairs of Branch Roads.

XIX. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That no Money arising from any of the Tolls mentioned in this Act shall be applied in or towards the Repair of any Branch Road comprised in this Act, unless some Toll Gate, Toll Bar, or Turnpike shall be erected and continued upon such Branch Road, nor unless the said Tolls shall be demanded and taken thereat pursuant to the Powers and Provisions of this Act: Provided also, that no more Money shall be expended by the said Trustees in or towards the Repair of any such Branch Road than shall be collected thereon, or borrowed on the Credit of the Tolls collected thereon.

Money may be borrowed at a lower Interest to pay off existing Mortgages.

XX. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees at any Time or Times hereafter to borrow or take up any Sum or Sums of Money at a lower Rate of Interest than shall happen to be payable upon any of the original or other Mortgages which may have been granted by the Trustees of the said Roads, or any of them, and which may happen to be then existing, for the special Purpose of paying off the Monies due upon such original or other Mortgages at a higher Rate of Interest; and the Monies so borrowed for such special Purpose, at such lower Rate as aforesaid, shall be applied by the said Trustees in paying off and discharging any of the said original or other Mortgages bearing a higher Rate of Interest, according to the Directions and Regulations of the General Turnpike Acts for paying off Mortgages; but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the said Trustees from borrowing any other Monies for any other Purposes under the Powers and Provisions of the General Turnpike Acts.

XXI. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That nothing in to be repaired this Act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to empower by Trustees. the said Trustees to lay out or apply any of the Money received or borrowed by virtue of this Act in paving, repairing, or cleansing any Highway or Street in the Towns of Tiverton, Exeter, Cullompton, or Bampton, or any of them, or to collect any Tolls by virtue of this Act therein; nor to lay out or apply any of such Monies in paving, repairing, or cleansing any Highway or Street in the County of the City and County of Exeter, on both Sides whereof Houses now are or hereafter shall be erected or built, or to collect any Tolls by virtue of this Act on any Part of such Highway or Street, on both Sides whereof Houses are or shall be so erected or built.

Mortgages may be granted for Arrears.

XXII. And be it further enacted, That in case any Person or Persons entitled to any Arrears of Interest which may hereafter become due on the Mortgages granted or to be granted of the Tolls arising arising on the said Roads shall be desirous of receiving a Mortgage of the Tolls hereby granted, as for Principal Money advanced in lieu of such Arrears, it shall be lawful for the said Trustees, in case they shall think it expedient for the Purposes of this Act, or advantageous to the said Roads, to grant to any such Person or Persons whose Arrears shall amount to the Sum of Fifty Pounds or upwards, in lieu and discharge of such Arrears, any Mortgages or Assignments of the Tolls hereby granted, in the Manner and Form and under the Regulations mentioned or prescribed in any Law or Statute relating to Turnpike Roads, respecting original Mortgages, as a Security for the Money so due, with lawful Interest for the same, subject to such Priority as aforesaid; and such Mortgages or Assignments may be transferred in the Manner and Form and under the Regulations mentioned or prescribed in any such Law or Statute respecting the Transfer of original Mortgages.

XXIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall not be lawful for Trustees of the Trustees acting in execution of the said recited Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or any Person appointed or continued Collector of the Tolls mentioned in the said Act, to demand or take more than One full Toll in any One Day in respect of any Horses, Beasts, or Carriages passing or repassing to or from the Tiverton Road, along such Part of the Roads under the Tiverton and Care and Management of the Trustees for executing the said Act of Southmolton. the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty as lies at or between a Place called Bish Mills, near Southmolton, and the Junction of the intended new Road from Gibbett Moor, by this Act authorized to be made, with the said Wiveliscombe and Southmolton Road, at or near the Eighteenth Mile Post; any thing in the said recited Act of the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty contained to the contrary notwithstanding, except Coaches or other Carriages, Horses or other Beasts, let on a Second Hiring.

XXIV. And whereas the Commissioners for executing an Act Enabling passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty Trustees to King George the Third, intituled An Act for paving and otherwise Paving Comimproving the Town of Tiverton in the County of Dougn and Land Paving Comimproving the Town of Tiverton in the County of Devon, are by the missioners said Act empowered to take certain Tolls on certain Streets or Roads respecting in Tiverton under their Care and Management, being a Continuation of the Lines of Road comprised in this Act: And whereas it would be of great Convenience to the Public if the Toll Gates in Tiverton for collecting the same were discontinued, and the Expence of collecting the same might be saved, if the Trustees for executing this Act were authorized to agree with the said Commissioners for effecting such Purposes; be it therefore enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Trustees appointed under or by virtue of this Act (if they shall agree thereto at any General Meeting to be holden for that Purpose) to take to farm the Tolls granted or payable under the said Act of the Thirty-fourth Year of the Reign of King George the Third, of the said Commissioners; and the Trustees for executing this Act may collect and receive the same Tolls, together with the Tolls hereby granted.

And whereas Parts of the Roads comprised in this Act communicate with Parts of the Roads comprised in an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled An Act for repairing, widening, and improving the several Roads leading to and from the City of Exeter, and for making certain new Lines of Road to communicate with the same, and for keeping in repair Exe Bridge and Countess Weir Bridge: And whereas such Roads might be more conveniently repaired, and it would be advantageous to the Public if the Trustees for executing this Act were empowered to agree with the Trustees of the said lastrecited Act for transferring to them the Care and Maintenance of such Parts of the said Roads as may be so more conveniently repaired by the said Trustees of the said last-recited Act; be it therefore enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Trustees acting in the Execution of this Act to contract and agree with the Trustees for executing the said recited Act of the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for the Transfer to them of the Care and Management of such Parts of the Roads comprised in this Act as may be so more conveniently maintained in repair, either for a Sum or Sums in gross, to be paid to them by such Trustees, or on such other Terms and Conditions as may be deemed expedient, with the Consents of Two Thirds in Value of the Creditors on the Tolls collected on such Roads; and any Monies which shall be so received by the said Trustees shall be applied by the said Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, subject to such Directions as are in this Act contained respecting the Application of Tolls or Monies arising under this Act.

XXVI. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, in the Manner by this Act directed, to make the said several Alterations or Diversions and new Pieces of Turnpike Road herein-before mentioned, and for such Purposes it shall be lawful for the said Trustees, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to take and use the Buildings, Gardens, Yards, Wood Lands, Coppice Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments mentioned in the Schedule hereunto annexed, any Law or Statute to the contrary notwithstanding, making or tendering Satisfaction to the Owners or Proprietors thereof and Persons interested therein for the same, or for any Damage they may sustain thereby.

Footpaths may be made.

XXVII. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Trustees to make Causeways or Footpaths, for the Space of One Mile from every Market Town through or to which any of the said Roads lead, by the Side of the said Roads, or such of them as shall be thought, at a General Meeting of the said Trustees to be held for the Purpose, necessary and proper; and the same Causeways and Footpaths shall be kept in repair out of the Tolls hereby directed to be taken or received, or Money to be raised on the Credit thereof.

Roads to be made according to Plan deposited.

XXVIII. And whereas a Map or Plan, describing the Lines of the said intended Diversions and new Pieces of Road, and the Lands, Hereditaments, and Premises through or over which the same are to be carried or made, together with a Book of Reference, containing Lists

XXX. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the Houses, Powers and Authorities given for making the said Alterations or Diversions and new Pieces of Road shall not extend or be construed out Consent, to extend to empower or authorize the said Trustees to take or except those pull down any Dwelling House or other Building, or to take in or in the Schemake use of any Curtilage, Garden, Yard, Park, Paddock, Lawn, dule. Shrubbery, planted Walk or Avenue to a House, or any enclosed Ground planted and set apart as a Nursery for Trees, or any Part thereof respectively, without the Consent in Writing of the Owner or Proprietor thereof or other Person interested therein first had and obtained, except such as are mentioned in the Schedule to this Act annexed.

XXXI. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That in case Limiting the the said Trustees shall not purchase the Buildings, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments mentioned in the Schedule to this Act annexed, Five Years. within the Space of Five Years from the passing of this Act, all the Powers granted by this Act to the said Trustees for purchasing, taking, or using the same, or such of them as shall not then have been purchased, shall cease and determine, save and except with the Consent of the Owners or Proprietors thereof for the Time being.

And be it further enacted, That Ditches, Drains, or Watercourses Watercourses of a sufficient Depth and Breadth for keeping the said may be made. intended new Roads dry, and conveying the Water from the same, shall be made by the said Trustees, or their Surveyor or other Officer, inside the Fences on the Sides of the said Roads, and also, where necessary, into or through any Fields, Lands, or Grounds adjoining, or lying near the said intended new Roads, (not being a Yard, Garden, Park, Paddock, planted Walk or Avenue to a House,) at the Expence of the said Trustees, out of the Monies to be received by virtue of this Act, and sufficient Bridges, Arches, Culverts, Trunks, Tunnels, or Plats shall be made by the said Trustees, or their Surveyor or other Officer, where any Carriageways or Footways lead into or out of or cross the said Roads, also at the Expence of the said Trustees, out of the Monies aforesaid (any Law or Statute to the contrary notwithstanding); and all such Ditches, Drains, and Watercourses, Bridges, Arches, Culverts, Trunks, Tunnels, or Plats, when made and completed by the said Trustees, shall for ever afterwards be scoured, cleansed, and kept open, repaired, and maintained by the Occupiers of the adjoining Fields, Lands, or Grounds; but all such new Bridges, Arches, Culverts, Trunks, Tunnels, and Plats; as shall cross or pass in or under the said Roads shall be scoured, cleansed, and kept open, repaired, and maintained by the said Trustees, subject to the Provisions of any Law or Statute relating to Turnpike Roads.

XXXV. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence upon the Third Monday next after the passing of this Act, and shall continue and be in force for Thirty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
