## Cap. xlix.

An Act for establishing a Market and Market Place in the Town and Borough of Wakefield. [21st June 1847.]

HEREAS the Establishment of a Market, with One or more convenient Market Place or Market Places, together with One or more Slaughter-house or Slaughter-houses and Weighing Machines, with all proper Conveniences and Approaches thereto, within the Town and Borough of Wakefield, would be of great Benefit and Advantage to the Inhabitants of the said Town and Borough and Neighbourhood thereof: And whereas the several Persons herein-after named, with others, have formed themselves into a Company for the Purposes aforesaid; but the same cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the 8 & 9 Vict. several Acts of Parliament following, (that is to say,) "The Com-cc. 16. & 18. panies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," "The Lands Clauses Con- and 10 & 11 Vict. c. 14. solidation Act, 1845," and "The Markets and Fairs Clauses Consoli-incorporated dation Act, 1847," shall be incorporated with and form Part of this with this Act, except so far as the same may be hereby altered or varied.

Quarter Sessions. II. And be it enacted, That the Expression "Quarter Sessions" in this and the said incorporated Acts shall be construed to mean the Quarter Sessions for the West Riding of the County of York.

Short Title.

III. And be it enacted, That in citing this Act in other Acts of Parliament, and in legal Instruments, it shall be sufficient to use the Expression "The Wakefield Borough Market Act, 1847."

Subscribers incorpo-rated.

IV. And be it enacted, That Joseph Holdsworth, William Teall, John Marsden, Charles Dunbar Atkinson, Henry Illingworth, William Wood, James Micklethwaite, William Brooke Naylor, John Wood, Joseph Sykes, and William Wood Glover, and all other Persons and Corporations who have already subscribed or shall hereafter subscribe to the Undertaking, and their Executors, Administrators, Successors, or Assigns respectively, shall be united into a Company for the Purpose of making and maintaining One or more Market Place or Market Places, and also One or more Slaughter-house or Slaughterhouses, within the Town and Borough of Wakefield aforesaid, with proper Conveniences belonging thereto, according to the Provisions of the said recited Acts and of this Act, and for other the Purposes herein and in the said recited Acts contained; and for the Purposes aforesaid such Company shall be incorporated by the Name of "The Wakefield Borough Market Company," and by that Name shall be a Body Corporate, with perpetual Succession, and shall have Power to purchase and hold Land for the Purposes of the Undertaking, within the Restrictions herein and in the recited Acts contained.

Capital.

V. And be it enacted, That the Capital of the Company shall be Twelve thousand Pounds.

Number and Amount of Shares.

VI. And be it enacted, That the Number of Shares into which the Capital shall be divided shall be One thousand two hundred, and the Amount of each Share shall be Ten Pounds.

Calls.

VII. And be it enacted, That Two Pounds Ten Shillings per Share shall be the greatest Amount of any One Call which the Company may make on the Shareholders, and Five Pounds of the Amount of a Share shall be the utmost aggregate Amount of Calls that may be made in any One Year upon any Share, and Three Months at the least shall be the Interval between successive Calls.

Power to borrow Money on Mortgage or Bond.

VIII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company to borrow on Mortgage or Bond any Sums not exceeding Four thousand Pounds; but no Part of such Sum shall be borrowed until the whole of the said Capital or Sum of Twelve thousand Pounds shall have been subscribed for, and One Half thereof shall have been actually paid up.

As to the Appointment of a Receiver.

IX. And be it enacted, That the Amount of Debt necessary to enable any Mortgagee of the said Company to require the Appointment of a Receiver shall not be less than Five hundred Pounds.

- X. And be it enacted, That the Number of Directors shall not be Number and less than Five nor more than Twelve; and the Qualification of a Director Qualification shall be the Possession in his own Right of not less than Five Shares of Directors. in the Undertaking.
- XI. And be it enacted, That Joseph Holdsworth, William Teall, First Direc-Henry Illingworth, Charles Dunbar Atkinson, William Wood, and tors. William Brooke Naylor shall be the first Directors of the Company, and shall remain in Office until the first Ordinary Meeting to be held in the Year next after the passing of this Act.
- XII. And be it enacted, That the Quorum of a Meeting of Directors Quorum of shall be Three. Directors.
- XIII. And be it enacted, That the Number of Directors of which Committees Committees appointed by the Directors shall consist shall not be less of Directors. than Three, and the Quorum of such Committees shall be Three: Provided always, that no such Committee shall make any Call.
- XIV. And be it enacted, That the Directors shall make and produce Directors to the Shareholders at every Ordinary Meeting a general Report in to make Writing of the State and Prospects of the Company; and such a general Report to Report, in addition to any other Particulars which the Directors may Shareholdthink desirable, shall contain all such Particulars as may be required ers. for the complete Explanation of the Balance Sheet to be produced at such Meeting.
- XV. And be it enacted, That the Limits within which this and the Limits of the said incorporated Act shall be put in force shall be as follows; Act. that is to say, within the Parliamentary Borough of Wakefield.
- XVI. And be it enacted, That the Newspapers in which Advertise- Newspapers ments relating to the Affairs of the Company are to be inserted shall for Insertion be some Newspaper published and circulating in the West Riding of tisements. the County of York.
- XVII. And be it enacted, That, subject to the Provisions in this Power to make the and the said incorporated Acts contained, the said Company, upon the Lands described in Schedule (A.) to this Act annexed, and any other Lands which they may purchase, by Agreement or otherwise, may construct a Market Place, with all necessary Buildings and Works, for the Sale of such Commodities as are usually sold in Markets or Fairs, and also a Market Place for the Sale of Horses and Cattle, and enter upon and take and use such of the said Lands as shall be necessary for such Purpose.

XVIII. And be it enacted, That the Lands to be taken or appro- Lands for expriated by the Company for extraordinary Purposes shall not exceed traordinary Purposes. Twenty Acres.

XIX. And be it enacted, That the Market Place shall be com- Period for pleted within Five Years after the passing of the Act, and on the Completion Expiration of such Period the Powers by this Act, and the said Acts of Works. incorporated

incorporated herewith, given to the said Mayor for constructing the Market Place, shall cease to be exercised, except as to so much of the Market Place as shall be then completed.

Power to provide Slaughter-houses.

XX. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company to provide such Slaughter-houses as shall from Time to Time be sufficient for the slaughtering Cattle for the Supply of the said Borough and the Neighbourhood thereof.

Penalty for slaughtering elsewhere after Notice.

XXI. And whereas it has been the Practice to slaughter in the said Town of Wakefield in Sheds or Shops open to the public Streets, and such Practice has been productive of serious and offensive Nuisances; be it enacted, That after the Expiration of Twenty-one Days from the Publication and Posting of the Notice that the said Slaughterhouses are ready for public Use, by this or the said incorporated Acts required, no Person shall slaughter or dress any Cattle, Beast, Sheep, or Swine for Sale in any Place within the said Town and Borough of Wakefield, other than in One of the said Slaughter-houses provided by the Company; and if any Person shall, after such Time as aforesaid, and so long as the Company shall provide sufficient Slaughter-houses for the Accommodation of the said Town and Borough, slaughter or dress for Sale any such Animal as aforesaid in any Place within the said Town and Borough, other than One of such Slaughter-houses, he shall be liable to a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for every such Offence, any thing in this or the said incorporated Acts to the contrary notwithstanding.

Justices to decide whether sufficient Slaughter-houses.

XXII. And be it enacted, That if any Question shall arise as to whether a sufficient Number of Slaughter-houses had been or continued to be provided by the Company, such Question shall be determined by the Justices before whom any such Penalty as last aforesaid shall be sued for.

Tolls to be taken for the Market.

XXIII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company from Time to Time to demand, from any Person occupying or using any Stand, Stall, Shed, Pen, or Place in the Market Place, or Buildings or Ground connected therewith, or bringing into such Market Place or Buildings or Ground any marketable Commodities specified in the Schedule (B.) to this Act annexed, such Stallages, Rents, and Tolls as the Company shall from Time to Time appoint, not exceeding the several Stallages, Rents, and Tolls specified in the said Schedule (B.)

Tolls for the Cattle Mar-ket.

XXIV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company from Time to Time to demand, in the Cattle Market, from any Person bringing therein any Cattle or other Live Stock specified in the Schedule (C.) to this Act annexed, such Stallages, Rents, and Tolls as the Company shall from Time to Time appoint, not exceeding the several Stallages, Rents, and Tolls specified in the said Schedule.

Tolls for Slaughter-houses.

XXV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company to demand from any Person slaughtering Cattle in any Slaughterhouse belonging to them such Tolls as are in Schedule (D.) to this Act annexed.

XXVI. And be it enacted, That it shall and may lawful for the Person for the Time being appointed to attend the Weighing Houses or Places for weighing or measuring any Article sold in the Market Place by Weight or Measure, from Time to Time to demand such Tolls as the Company shall appoint, not exceeding in any Case the Amount set forth in the Schedule (D.) to this Act annexed.

Tolls for weighingand measuring.

XXVII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Person Tolls for for the Time being appointed to attend the Machines for weighing weighing Carts. Carts within the Borough to demand from the Person requiring the same to be weighed such Tolls as the Company may appoint, not exceeding in any Case the Amount set forth in the Schedule (E.) to this Act annexed, and such Tolls shall be paid before any Waggon, Cart, or Carriage in respect of which the same are payable shall be weighed.

XXVIII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Power to Company to purchase of Sackville Walter Lane Fox Esquire, or purchase other the Lord or Lords of the Manor of Wakefield, all Stallage, Weigh-house Market Tolls and Dues, and all other Rights and Privileges of a like of the Lord Nature, manorial or otherwise, within the said Town and Borough of of the Manor Wakefield, of him the said Sackville Walter Lane Fox, or other the of Wake-Lord or Lords of the said Manor, and also to purchase in like Manner field. from him and them the public Weigh-house and common Bakehouse belonging to the Lord of the said Manor of Wakefield, with all and every the Rights and Appurtenances; provided that the said Company shall under the Provisions herein contained purchase the whole of the said public Weigh-house or Bakehouse, with their Appurtenances, unless the said Sackville Walter Lane Fox Esquire, or other the Lord of the said Manor, shall agree to sell to sell to the said Company a Portion of the same.

XXIX. And be it enacted, That the Purchase of the said Rights, Providing Dues, and Privileges, and of the said Weighing Machine and Buildings for the Manrespectively, shall be made in such Manner, and subject to such Pro- Purchase visions and Regulations as are in the said Lands Clauses Consolida- shall be tion Act, 1845, contained with respect to the Purchase of Land by made. Agreement; and that upon Payment of the Purchase Monies agreed or awarded to be paid in respect of the same all such Rights, Dues, and Privileges, and the said Weighing Machine and Buildings, respectively, shall absolutely vest in and belong to the said Company, and shall be held, used, occupied, and enjoyed by them respectively in full, ample, and beneficial a Manner as the same were held, used, occupied, and enjoyed respectively by the Lord of the said Manor of Wakefield previously to the Payment of such Purchase Monies; save and except that the Rights and Privileges of holding Fairs and Markets, and of having Stallages and Standings in the public Streets, Roads, Passages, and other Highways of and within the said Town and Borough of Wakefield, now used, exercised, and enjoyed by the Lord or Lords of the Manor of Wakefield, shall from and after such Purchase as aforesaid absolutely cease and be for ever determined.

Power to lease the Slaughterhouses, &c.

XXX. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company from Time to Time to demise and let the said Slaughter-houses, Weighing Houses, or Places and Machines, or any of them, or the said Stallages, Rents, or Tolls, or any of them, for any Period not exceeding Three Years, upon such Terms as shall be agreed upon between the Company and the Person to whom such Lease shall be made.

Power to lease Standings in the Markets.

XXXI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Company to let any of the Stalls, Standing Places, Benches, or other Conveniences in the said Market Places to any Person for any Term not exceeding Three Years.

Power to

XXXII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Lessee assign Lease of any such Stall, Standing Place, or other Convenience, his Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, with Consent of the Company, to assign the same for the Residue of his Term.

So much of Paving and Lighting Acts as are with this Act repealed.

XXXIII. And be it enacted, That such of the Powers and Provisions of Two several Acts of Parliament, of the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third and the Thirty-sixth inconsistent Year of the Reign of His said Majesty King George the Third respectively, for the better paving, repairing, cleansing, lighting, and watching the Streets and other public Passages within the Town of Wakefield, as are inconsistent with the Powers and Provisions herein contained, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Nothing to prohibit the Sale of Articles from in the Calder, &c.

XXXIV. Provided, and be it enacted, That nothing herein or in the said recited Act contained shall restrain or prohibit the Sale of any of the Articles aforesaid, or of any other Article or Thing what-Vesselslying soever, in, upon, or from any Boat, Barge, or Vessel lying in the River Calder, or in any Cut, Canal, or Basin belonging or to be made by the Undertakers of the Navigation of the Rivers Aire and Calder in the County of York, or in, upon, or from any of the Wharfs or Quays belonging to or made by or which may be hereafter made by the said Undertakers.

Power to the Aire and Calder Navigation Company, &c. to carry Articles, &c.

XXXV. Provided also, and be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Undertakers of the Navigation of the Rivers Aire and Calder in the County of York, and to and for all Persons occupying or using any of their Wharfs, Warehouses, and Premises within the said Town and Borough of Wakefield, to convey any Articles from the said Market Places to any Boat, Barge, or Vessel lying in the said River Calder, or in any of the Cuts, Canals, or Basins of the said Undertakers, or to any other Wharfs, Warehouses, or Premises of the said Undertakers, or from any such Boats, Barges, or Vessels, Wharfs, Warehouses, or Premises of the said Undertakers, to the said Market Places, by their own Waggons, Carts, Horses, and Servants, at their free Will and Pleasure, any thing herein, or in the said recited Act, or in any Bye Laws to be made in pursuance thereof, respectively contained or to be contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

Saving Rights of Aire and Calder Navigation;

XXXVI. And be it enacted, That nothing herein or in the said recited Act contained shall diminish, alter, prejudice, affect, or take away

away any of the Rights, Privileges, Powers, or Authorities vested in the said Undertakers of the Navigation of the said Rivers Aire and Calder.

XXXVII. And be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall and of the be construed to prevent the Governors of the Free Grammar School Governors of Queen Elizabeth at Wakefield in Yorkshire from using and Grammar occupying any of their Lands for the Sale of Cattle on every alternate School. Wednesday, as heretofore.

XXXVIII. And be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall Corn Market be construed to prevent the Sale of Corn, either by Sample or otherwise, in the Building called the Corn Exchange, and in the present fore. Corn Market, as heretofore.

XXXIX. And be it enacted, That this Act shall be a Public Act, Public Act. and shall be judicially taken notice of as such.
