An Act for the Worksop and Attercliffe Turnpike Road in the County of Nottingham and the West Riding of the County of York.

[27th July 1857.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Sixth Year of George the Fourth, intituled An Act for amending, repairing, and 6 G. 4. maintaining the Road from Worksop in the County of c. exlvi. Nottingham to the North-east End of Attercliffe in the County of York: And whereas the Term granted by that Act, and from Time to Time continued by divers Acts for continuing Turnpike Acts for limited Periods, will expire on the First Day of November One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven: And whereas the several Sums specified in the Schedule to this Act annexed, amounting together to Eleven thousand Pounds, are now secured by Mortgages of the Tolls by the recited Act granted, and the Principal Money and Interest on the same as herein-after provided so secured cannot be paid, and the Road cannot be maintained, repaired, and improved, unless the Term by the recited Act granted be extended, and further Provisions be made: And whereas it is expedient that the recited Act be repealed, and that other Provisions be made in lieu thereof: And whereas the Objects of this Act cannot be attained without the 16 P [Local.] Authority

Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

Short Title.

I. This Act may be cited for all Purposes as "Worksop and Attercliffe Road Act, 1857."

Interpretation of Terms.

II. In this Act the following Words and Expressions have the following Meanings, unless excluded by the Context or Subject Matter; (that is to say,)

The Expression "the Road" means the Road to be maintained under this Act:

The Expression "the Trustees" means the Trustees from Time to Time acting in the Execution of this Act:

The Word "Toll-gate" means and includes all Toll-gates, Turnpikes, Bars, and Chains from Time to Time set up upon, across, or by the Side of the Road, or across any Highway or other Carriageway or Bridleway communicating therewith:

The Expression "flat Wheel" means a Wheel with a Tire the Measure of which taken across the Middle of the Axle at the Inside next to the Cart is equal to or not more than One Twelfth of the Breadth of the Tire greater or less than the Measure of the Tire taken across the Middle of the Axle at the Outside, and the Tire Nails, if any, countersunk, and no Tire Nail Head standing above the Face of the Tire, and which Wheel when rolling on a flat Surface bears equally thereon throughout the whole Breadth of the Tire.

Commencement and Term of Act.

III. This Act shall commence with the First Day of November One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and shall continue for the Term of Twenty-one Years from that Day inclusive, and thenceforth to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

Act to be executed for Discharge Maintenance of the Worksop and Attercliffe Turnpike Road.

IV. This Act shall be put into execution for the Purpose of discharging the Debts specified in the Schedule hereto and the Interest of Debts and thereon according to the Provisions of this Act, and for maintaining, repairing, and improving the Road from Worksop in the County of Nottingham through the Towns of Gateford, Anston, Todwick, Aston, Handsworth, and Darnall to the North-eastern End of Attercliffe in the County of York, where it joins the Turnpike Road from Tinsley to Sheffield, and the Road shall be called "The Worksop and Attercliffe Turnpike Road."

The Trustees may at any Meeting elect any Number of Persons, duly qualified to act as Trustees of Turnpike Roads in England, tional Trusnot exceeding Three in the whole, to be Trustees for executing this tees. Act, in addition to the Trustees hereby appointed, and such Trustees so elected shall have the same Powers and Authorities for executing this Act as if they had been hereby appointed.

Power to appoint addi-

VII. On the Commencement of this Act the recited Act of the Sixth Year of *George* the Fourth shall be repealed.

Recited Act repealed.

VIII. All Lands, Buildings, Toll Gates, Materials, Tools, Apparatus, Books, Accounts, Deeds, Papers, Writings, and other Things, and all Choses in Action respectively vested in or belonging to the Trustees under the recited Act, and all Moneys due and to become due to them,

them, shall immediately on the Commencement of this Act be vested in and belong to the Trustees.

General

IX. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, and except only as is by this Act otherwise expressly provided, everything before the Commencement of this Act done, suffered, and confirmed respectively under or by the recited Act shall be as valid as if this Act were not passed, and the Repeal of the recited Act and this Act respectively shall accordingly be subject and without Prejudice to everything so done, suffered, and confirmed respectively, and to all Rights, Liabilities, Claims, and Demands, both present and future, which, if such Repeal had not happened and this Act were not passed, would be incident to and consequent on any and everything so done, suffered, and confirmed respectively; and with respect to all such Things so done, suffered, and confirmed respectively, and all such Rights, Liabilities, Claims, and Demands, the Trustees shall to all Intents represent the Trustees under the recited Act.

Provisions of other Acts continued.

X. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, all the Provisions of any and every Act of Parliament (other than the recited Act) relating to the Trustees acting under the recited Act, and on the Commencement of this Act in force, shall be of the like Force as if the Repeal of the recited Act had not happened, and may be exercised, enforced, and enjoyed by and against the Trustees in as full and beneficial a Manner to all Intents as the same respectively might be exercised and enforced and enjoyed by and against the Trustees under the recited Act, and their Officers and Servants respectively, if this Act were not passed.

Actions not to abate, &c.

XI. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, any Action, Suit, Prosecution, or other Proceeding, commenced either by or against the Trustees under the recited Act before the Commencement of this Act, shall not abate or be discontinued or prejudicially affected by this Act, but on the contrary shall continue and take effect, both in favour of and against the Trustees, in the same Manner to all Intents as if this Act were not passed, save only that the Trustees shall be substituted therein for the Trustees under the recited Act.

Contracts, &c. preserved. XII. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, and subject to the Provisions of this Act, all Purchases, Sales, Leases, Securities, and Contracts before the Commencement of this Act made under the recited Act, or with reference to the Purposes thereof, shall be as effectual to all Intents for, against, and with respect to the Trustees as if the same had been made by, to, or with respect to them instead of the Trustees under the recited Act, and may be proceeded on and enforced

enforced in like Manner to all Intents as if the Trustees had been Party or privy thereto or referred to therein instead of the Party actually Party or privy thereto or referred to therein.

XIII. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, and except Debts to be only as is by this Act otherwise expressly provided, all Persons who immediately before the Commencement of this Act owed any Money to the Trustees under the recited Act, or to any Person on their Behalf, shall pay the same, with all Interest (if any) due and payable or accruing for the same, to the Trustees, and all Moneys which immediately before the Commencement of this Act were owing by or recoverable from the Trustees under the recited Act, or for the Payment of which they were or but for this Act would be liable, shall be paid, with all Interest (if any) due and payable or accruing for the same, by or be recoverable from the Trustees.

XIV. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, all Bye- Byelaws, laws, Resolutions, Orders, and Proceedings of Meetings of the Resolutions, &c. con-Trustees under the recited Act which immediately before the Com-tinued. mencement of this Act were in force shall, but subject to the Provisions of this Act, continue in full Force and be available for the Purposes of this Act.

XV. Notwithstanding the Repeal of the recited Act, all Docu-Books, &c. ments, Books, and Writings by the recited Act directed or autho-continued Evidence. rized to be kept, and which if this Act were not passed would be receivable in Evidence, shall be admitted as Evidence in all Courts of Law and Equity and elsewhere accordingly.

XVI. The Trustees shall hold their First Meeting under this Act at the Lion Hotel at Worksop, or at some other convenient Place in ings of the Neighbourhood of the Road, on the Third Thursday after the Trustees. Commencement of this Act, and shall then and from Time to Time thereafter adjourn to and meet at such Place in the Neighbourhood of the Road and at such Times as they think proper.

First and other Meet-

XVII. The Quorum of every Meeting of the Trustees shall be Quorum of Three Trustees: Provided always, that the Trustees present at any Meeting, or the Majority of them, or the Trustee if but One, or if no Trustee be present the Clerk to the Trustees, may adjourn a Meeting.

XVIII. The Trustees from Time to Time may appoint Com- Committees mittees of their own Number to execute any of the Purposes of this of Trustees, Act, according to such Instructions and Regulations as the Trustees may at any Meeting from Time to Time determine, and may pre-Local. scribe

scribe the Quorum of every such Committee, and every such Committee may proceed and act according to their Appointment, but shall always be accountable to the Trustees according to the Instructions and Regulations so determined.

Existing Toll Gates.

XIX. The several Toll Gates, except the Chain Bar at the Aqueduct in Attercliffe, which on the Commencement of this Act are upon, across, or at the Side of the Road, or across any Highway or other Carriageway or Bridleway communicating therewith, shall be continued until removed by Order of the Trustees.

Additional Toll Gates.

XX. The Trustees from Time to Time, in manner prescribed by the General Turnpike Act of the Ninth Year of George the Fourth, Chapter Seventy-seven, and by the Order of any Meeting, whether annual, general, special, or adjourned, but not without such Notice in that Behalf as is prescribed by that Act, may, except as is herein otherwise expressly provided, set up any new Toll Gates upon, across, or at the Side of the Road, or across any Highway or other Carriageway or Bridleway communicating therewith.

No Bar to be maintained nearer Sheffield than Bar.

XXI. It shall not be lawful for the Trustees to erect or maintain any Toll, Side, or Chain Bar after the Second Day of September One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight nearer to Sheffield than the the existing existing Toll Bar across the Road at Darnall Hill.

Tolls.

XXII. On and after the Commencement of this Act, the Trustees may demand and take, at their several Toll Gates, Turnpikes, Bars, and Chains from Time to Time continued or provided under the Act upon, across, or by the Side of the Road, or across any Highway or other Carriageway or Bridleway communicating with the Road, such Tolls as the Trustees at their Meetings from Time to Time determine, not exceeding the Sums following; to wit,

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Barouche, Sociable, Berlin, Chariot, Landau, Chaise, Calash, Gig, Chair, Phaeton, Caravan, Whiskey, Hearse, Litter, Curricle, or any Carriage on Springs drawn by more than One Horse, or for any Taxed Cart, the Sum of Fourpence Halfpenny:

For any single Horse drawing any such Coach, Barouche, Sociable, Berlin, Chariot, Landau, Chaise, Calash, Gig, Chair, Phaeton, Caravan, Whiskey, Hearse, Litter, Curricle, or any Carriage on Springs, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage, not being a Timber Carriage or Timber Drag, having the Sole or Bottom of the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of less Breadth than Four Inches and a Half, the Sum of Sevenpence:

For

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage, not being a Timber Carriage or Timber Drag, having the Sole or Bottom of the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Four Inches and a Half, and under Five Inches and a Half, the Sum of Sixpence:

But if the Axletree, Bushes, and Wheels of any such lastmentioned Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage are made perfectly cylindrical, the Sum of Fivepence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage, not being a Timber Carriage or Timber Drag, having the Sole or Bottom of the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of the Breadth of Five Inches and a Half and upwards, and so as the Tire or the Surface of such Wheels shall not deviate more than Half an Inch from a flat and level Surface, and the Nails of the Tire of such Wheels shall be countersunk, so as not to project beyond One Quarter of an Inch above the Surface of such Tire, the Sum of Fourpence Halfpenny:

But if the Axletree, Bushes, and Wheels of any such last-mentioned Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage are made perfectly cylindrical, the Sum of Threepence Halfpenny:

And for every Horse or other Beast drawing any such lastmentioned Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage, the Wheels whereof shall not be constructed on either of the Two Modes last above mentioned, the Sum of Sixpence:

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or Carriage, not being a Timber Carriage or Timber Drag, having the Sole or Bottom of the Fellies of the Wheels thereof of a Breadth of not less than Four and a Half Inches, and so constructed that the Wheels run in a Track the Breadth of which shall be either under Four Feet Five Inches, or above Five Feet Eight Inches, and having the Axletree, Bushes, and Wheels made perfectly cylindrical, the Sum of Twopence Halfpenny:

For every Horse, Mule, or Ass, laden or unladen, and not drawing, the Sum of One Penny Halfpenny:

For every Drove of Oxen or other Neat Cattle, the Sum of Fifteenpence per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

For every Drove of Calves, Swine, Hogs, Sheep, or Lambs, the Sum of Sevenpence Halfpenny per Score, and so in proportion for any less Number:

For every Horse, Mule, or other Beast drawing any Timber Carriage or Timber Drag, if all the Wheels are flat Wheels:

If the Tire of any Wheel is in any Part of less Breadth than Four Inches and a Half, One Shilling;

If the Tire of every Wheel is throughout of the Breadth of Four Inches and a Half, or upwards, Ninepence;

If all or any of the Wheels be of any other Sort, One Shilling and Sixpence:

For every Carriage or Cart not drawn by any Beast, but propelled by Steam Power, or by any other Means, the Sum of One Shilling for each Wheel thereof.

Number of ordinary Tolls limited.

XXIII. Except as is by this Act otherwise expressly provided, not more than Three full ordinary Tolls shall be demanded or taken for the Passage on the same Day of the same Beast, Carriage, or Cart along the whole or any Portion of the Line of Road.

One-horse Carts to be weighed.

XXIV. All Carts passing on the Road drawn by One Horse only may and shall be weighed at any Weighing Machine on the Road, and all the Powers, Regulations, and Penalties from Time to Time in force with respect to the weighing of any Carts drawn by more than One Horse shall apply to Carts passing on the Road drawn by One Horse only, and to the Drivers, Masters, and Owners thereof.

Tolls payable only once a Day.

XXV. Where any Person pays the Toll for the passing of any Beast, Carriage, or Cart through any Toll Gate, the same Beast drawing the same Carriage or Cart, or as the Case may be, the same Carriage or Cart shall (except as is by this Act otherwise provided), on the Ticket denoting the Payment of such Toll being produced, be permitted at all Times during the same Day to pass Toll-free through the same Toll Gate, and also through every other Toll Gate (if any) which the Ticket frees.

Tolls payable more than once a Day.

XXVI. Provided always, That in the following Cases the Toll shall be payable for every Time of passing during the same Day:

When the same Beast draws a different Carriage or Cart from the Carriage or Cart which it drew when the Toll was paid before on the same Day:

Where the Carriage or Cart is a Stage Coach, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, or other Stage Carriage or Stage Cart carrying Passengers or Articles for Hire or Pay:

And in the following Case the Toll shall be payable for every Time of passing during the same Day under a new Hiring:

Where the Carriage is a Postchaise, Gig, or other Carriage let out for Hire or Pay.

Persons residing in Darnall to pay Half Toll only at Darnall Bar.

XXVII. The Trustees shall not demand or take from any Person or Persons residing in that Part of Attercliffe-cum-Darnall which lies between the Toll Gate at present existing near Darnall Hill and the Boundary of the Township of Handsworth more than One Half of the Tolls from Time to Time taken at the several Toll Gates upon the Road in respect of their passing through such Toll Gate with Carriages,

Carriages, Carts, Horses, or Cattle; and such Payment of One Half Toll only shall exempt such Person or Persons from Payment of any Toll at any other Toll Gate erected or to be hereafter erected upon the Road in the Township of Attercliffe-cum-Darnall: Provided nevertheless, that such Payment of Half Toll at Darnall Toll Gate shall not entitle such Person or Persons to pass through Handsworth Toll Gate, except on Payment of an additional Half Toll at such last-mentioned Toll Gate.

XXVIII. All Moneys which come to the Hands of the Trustees Application of Moneys. by virtue of this Act shall be applied as follows:

First, in paying the Expenses of and incident to the preparing for, obtaining, and passing of this Act:

Secondly, in paying the Salaries of Officers, and in defraying the necessary Expenses of repairing, altering, and lighting Toll Gates, and the necessary Expenses of Management of the Road, but such Expenses together not to exceed Eighty Pounds a Year, exclusive of the Salaries of Toll Collectors and Expenses with respect to Actions at Law, Suits, Indictments, or Proceedings before Magistrates:

Thirdly, in paying every Year Interest at the Rate of Three Pounds per Centum per Annum upon the several Principal Sums, ... amounting together to Eleven thousand Pounds, respectively specified in the Schedule to this Act, or upon so much thereof as is from Time to Time owing on the Credit of the Tolls:

Fourthly, in paying the Expenses of maintaining and repairing the Road, but such Expenses not to exceed Three hundred Pounds a Year:

Fifthly, in paying off, as by this Act provided, the Principal Sums specified in the Schedule to this Act:

Sixthly, in paying without Interest the Sum of Nine hundred and seventy-eight Pounds Twelve Shillings in full Discharge of all Arrears of Interest owing at the Commencement of this Act on the several Principal Sums in the Schedule to this Act mentioned, such Arrears of Interest having been computed at the Rate of Three Pounds per Centum per Annum on such Principal Sums:

Seventhly, in paying the Expenses of further repairing, maintaining, and improving the Road.

XXIX. That no Interest shall accrue due on the said Principal Interest not Sums owing on the Credit of the Tolls authorized to be taken on the to accrue until Exsaid Road until the Trustees shall have received sufficient Sums to penses of pay and discharge and shall have paid and discharged the Costs and Expenses of obtaining and passing this Act and incident thereto.

Act are paid,

Trustees not to borrow further Moneys.

Mortgagees not to take possession but for Arrears of Interest. XXX. It shall not be lawful for the Trustees to borrow hereafter any further Moneys on Security of the Tolls hereby granted.

XXXI. Whenever and so long as the Interest, at the Rate by this Act authorized, on the Mortgage Debts specified in the Schedule to this Act is duly paid within Six Calendar Months after it becomes due, no Mortgagee of the Tolls shall enter into possession of the Toll Gates, or into the Receipt of the Tolls or of the Rent payable upon any letting of the Tolls, or until Twenty-eight Days after Demand in Writing made by the Mortgagee on the Clerk for Payment of such Interest and Default made in Payment accordingly.

Duties of Mortgagee in possession.

XXXII. If any Mortgagee of the Tolls enters into such Possession or Receipt, he shall pay the Interest from Time to Time due and payable on all the Mortgages of the Tolls without any Preference, and may reimburse himself his lawful Costs, and the Mortgagee so in possession or receipt shall, within Twenty-one Days after every Thirty-first Day of *December*, render to the Clerk to the Trustees a full and true Account of his Receipts and Expenditure while in such Possession or Receipt, with proper Vouchers.

Delivery-up of Possession by Mort-gagee.

XXXIII. If it appear by any such Account that the Interest due on his Mortgage up to the then last Thirty-first Day of December, and all such Costs are fully paid, then the Mortgagee shall, when thereunto required by the Trustees, pay over to their Treasurer the Balance (if any) in his Hands, and deliver up such Possession and Receipt to the Trustees, or to any Person appointed by them to receive the same.

Mode of discharging Debt.

XXXIV. That whenever the Sum applicable towards the Discharge of the Mortgage Debt shall amount to Two hundred Pounds the Trustees shall, at any General Annual or other Meeting, apply such Sum in the Payment of a Part of the Mortgage Debt to some Person entitled thereto, and shall, Twenty-eight Days at least before such Meeting, cause Notice to be given of such Meeting, and of the Purposes thereof, so far as the same relate to the Application of such Sum, by Letter transmitted through the General Post Office to every Creditor, addressed to his usual Place of Residence, and at such Meeting the Trustees shall apply such Sum, or (as the Case may require) a Portion thereof, in or towards the Discharge of a Part of the Mortgage Debt to the Creditor who shall, by Proposal in Writing transmitted to the Clerk of the Trustees before such Meeting, have offered to accept the lowest Composition in respect of his Portion of the Mortgage Debt, and after Payment to such Creditor shall apply the Surplus, if any, of such Sum, or (as the Case may require) a Portion thereof, in or towards the Discharge of a further Part of the Mortgage Debt to

the Creditor who shall by like Proposal have offered to accept the next lowest Composition in respect of his Portion of the Mortgage Debt, and so on until such Sum be exhausted; and whenever Two or more Creditors shall by such Proposals have offered to accept an equal Rate of Composition, the Trustees may determine by Lot the Preference between such Creditors, or may pay such Composition rateably between such Creditors, as the Trustees think fit; and if there be not any such Proposal, or if there be any Surplus of such Sum, after applying the same so far as may be necessary in or towards Discharge of the Moneys to which any such Proposals relate, the Trustees may, as they think fit, apply such Sum (as the Case may be), or the Surplus thereof, rateably amongst the Creditors, or may pay the same to such of them as may be determined by Lot.

XXXV. Nothing in this Act contained shall exempt the Road from Road not the Provisions of any General Act, relating to the Consolidation or exempt from Provisions other improved Arrangement of Turnpike Roads, which may pass of General during the present or any future Session of Parliament, or from the Acts. Provisions of any such Act now in force, except so far as any Provisions thereof are expressly varied by this Act or are inconsistent therewith.
