An Act to alter and extend an Act passed in the First Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for regulating and improving the Borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.*

[21st June 1841.]

WHEREAS an Act was passed in the First Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for regulating and improving the Borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne*: And whereas it is expedient that the Tolls, Town and Quay Dues, and other Dues authorized to be levied and taken by the said recited Act, should be reduced, modified, and varied: And whereas it is also expedient that the said recited Act should in other respects be altered and extended; but the several Objects aforesaid cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That this Act shall be construed as One Act with the said recited Act; and that all Provisions of the said recited Act, except so far as is herein otherwise provided, shall extend to this Act and to all Things done in execution of this Act.

II. And

Dues, &c.

II. And be it enacted, That in lieu of the Tolls, Town and Quay Dues, and other Dues now payable to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, under or pursuant to the said recited Act, and mentioned and comprised in the First, Second, and Third Schedules thereunto subjoined respectively, the Tolls, Town and Quay Dues, and other Dues mentioned and specified in the First, Second, and Third Schedules subjoined to this Act respectively shall, after the Twenty-fifth Day of *March* One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, be payable to the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses; and that after the same Twenty-fifth Day of *March* the said recited Act shall be read and construed as if the First, Second, and Third Schedules subjoined to this Act had been subjoined to the said recited Act, instead of the First, Second, and Third Schedules thereunto subjoined.

III. And be it enacted, That in order to defray the Expence of providing and maintaining a Market Place and Erections for the Sale of Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and other live Animals, within the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, Tolls or Dues not exceeding the Tolls or Dues specified in the Fourth Schedule subjoined to this Act shall, after the Twenty-fifth Day of *March* One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, or such ulterior Day as the Council of the said Borough shall, by Notice inserted for Two successive Weeks in all the Newspapers published in the said Borough, appoint, be paid to the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, or their Lessees, or their or any of their Servants, in respect of Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and other Animals sold or offered for Sale in the said Market Place, which said Tolls or Dues shall be payable by the Persons selling or offering for Sale the said Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and other Animals.

Recovery of
Tolls.

IV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and their Lessees, or their or any of their Servants, to recover and compel Payment of the said last-mentioned Tolls or Dues by Distress and Sale of the Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and other Animals in respect of which the same shall be payable, or of any other Goods and Effects of the Person liable to pay such Tolls or Dues, together with the reasonable Costs and Charges of such Distress and Sale, and likewise to use and exercise all such Powers and Remedies for recovering the same Tolls and Dues as are provided by the said recited Act or any other Act with reference to the Tolls and Dues therein specified.

V. And be it enacted, That a Ground Plan of such Parts of the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne* as shall from Time to Time be within and circumscribed by a Line to be fixed by the Council of the said Borough, as mentioned in the said recited Act, as the Line on which the Tolls therein mentioned shall be taken and received, instead of on the Lines of the ancient Walls of the said Town of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, shall be drawn and prepared at the Costs and Charges of the said Council, and be deposited with the Clerk of the Peace of the said Borough.

VI. And

VI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Person to inspect the Plan so to be deposited at any seasonable Hour during the Day, without any Payment whatsoever. Plan may be inspected.

VII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Council from Time to Time to alter and vary the Plan so deposited, or to substitute a new Plan, so that the circumscribing Line on which the said Tolls shall be taken and received, as mentioned in the said recited Act, may be extended or contracted or otherwise varied: Provided always, that no such Alteration or Substitution shall take effect and be deemed valid until One Calendar Month's previous Notice thereof shall be given by Advertisement inserted in One or more of the Newspapers published and circulated in *Newcastle upon Tyne*. Plan may be altered by the Council.

VIII. And be it enacted, That every Plan so to be deposited or substituted shall be sealed with the Common Seal of the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses; and the same shall be conclusive Evidence that the circumscribing Line from Time to Time laid down thereon is the Line on or within which the said Tolls shall be taken and received. Plan to be sealed.

IX. Provided always, and be it enacted, That in case the circumscribing Line existing at the Time of the passing of this Act shall be afterwards varied or altered, the said Council shall, previous to the Expiration of the said One Calendar Month, transmit a Copy of the Alteration or Variation in the Plan of such circumscribing Line, or of the proposed substituted Plan, to Her Majesty's Board of Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations; and if any Person or Corporation shall think himself or themselves aggrieved by such Alteration, Variation, or Substitution made under the Powers of this Act given to the Council, he or they may apply at any Time after such Notice by Advertisement shall have been given, and within Two Calendar Months after such Alteration, Variation, or Substitution shall have taken effect, to the said Board of Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations, and upon such Application such Board may, as they shall see proper, either confirm such Line, or decide in what other Manner or Direction the same shall be carried; and such Line so confirmed or altered, as the Case may be, shall be the Line upon which the said Tolls shall for the Time being be taken and received. Altered Plans to be submitted to the Board of Trade.

X. And be it enacted, That in case of any Railway crossing the said circumscribing Line it shall be lawful for the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, or their Lessees, or their or any of their Servants, or for the Collector for the Time being of the Tolls or Dues mentioned and set forth in the First Schedule to this Act annexed, to demand and collect the Tolls or Dues payable for or in respect of any Goods or other Articles which shall be carried upon such Railway at the Station or Depôt of every such Railway in *Newcastle upon Tyne*, and for that Purpose to enter upon and into the said Stations or Depôts at all reasonable Hours, and to exercise and use all such Powers and Remedies for recovering and compelling Payment of the same Tolls and Dues as they or any of them are entitled Power to collect Tolls at the Railway Stations.

entitled to use and exercise by virtue of the said recited Act or otherwise for Recovery of the Tolls therein specified: Provided always, that in the Exercise of the Powers hereby given the Traffic on such Railways shall not be impeded or interrupted.

XI. And be it enacted, That the Broker or other Person appointed or authorized to receive the Freight, and the Master of every Ship or Vessel arriving from any Port or Place in *Great Britain* or *Ireland* in the Port of *Newcastle*, and containing any Goods or Articles mentioned and set forth in the Second Schedule to this Act annexed, shall, within Twenty-four Hours after Demand, deliver to the Collector for the Time being of the Dues mentioned and set forth in the Second Schedule to this Act a correct Copy of the Manifest of the Cargo of the said Ship or Vessel upon which the said Dues shall be payable, on the Payment or Tender of the Sum of One Penny *per Folio* of Seventy-two Words for such Copy; and every such Person who shall neglect or refuse to make and deliver such Copy shall forfeit any Sum not exceeding Five Pounds.

XII. And be it enacted, That the Person to whom any Goods or Articles, in respect of which the Dues mentioned and set forth in the Second Schedule to this Act annexed shall be payable, shall be consigned, as well as the Owners of such Goods or Articles respectively, shall be liable to pay, on Demand, to the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, or their Lessee, or to such Person as they or either of them shall appoint to receive the same, the Dues payable in respect of such Goods or Articles respectively.

XIII. And be it enacted, That every Person who shall wilfully make any false Statement or Misrepresentation in order to exempt any Goods or Articles from any of the Tolls or Dues payable under this Act, shall forfeit any Sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

make new

XIV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Council for the Time being to open and make, or cause to be opened and made, in the said Borough, the several new Streets next hereinafter mentioned, and also mentioned in the said recited Act, (that is to say,) a Street commencing at the Public Quay at a Place called the *Burn Bank*, crossing the Street called *Pandon* and the *Stock Bridge*, and terminating at the *Manor Chare*; and a Street from *Stowell Street* to the *Bath Lane*; and also the several new Streets next hereinafter mentioned, (that is to say,) a Street extending from the Quay Side, through *Sandgate*, across *Tyne Street* and the *Ouseburn*, and terminating at the Township of *Byker*; a Street from *Saint Nicholas Square* to *Castle Street* and *Hanover Street*; a Street from the *Forth Lane* to the *Forth Banks*; a Street from the East End of *Mosley Street*, crossing the *Manors* and *Pandon Dean* and the *New Road*, and terminating at the *Swirle* in *Sandgate*; also a Street from the last-mentioned Street to the *Causey Bank*; and also to procure and set out sufficient and convenient Sites for Houses and other Buildings, and Yards and Conveniences thereto, at the Sides of or adjoining the said several intended new Streets, and to erect and build any such Houses or other Buildings, and to make such Orders
and

and Regulations respecting the erecting or building of all such Houses and other Buildings, as the said Council shall think proper.

XV. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Council for the Time being, by Order under the Common Seal of the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses made for such Purpose, to divert, alter, or wholly stop any of the Lanes or Passages at present existing, extending from the said Street called *Sandgate* on the North to or towards the River *Tyne* on the South, and likewise so much of the Footway leading from the Quay Side to the North Shore, commonly called the *Low Street* of *Sandgate*, and so much of a Lane or Passage called the *Forth Lane* as shall be needed for the Sites of Houses or other Buildings, or for other Purposes.

Power to divert Lanes and Passages.

XVI. And be it enacted, That all Pieces or Parcels of Ground which shall become unnecessary for the Use of the Public by reason of the Exercise of the last preceding Power, and the Fee Simple thereof, shall vest in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses as their absolute Property, but subject to the same Clauses, Conditions, and Powers as are applicable to Property purchased under this Act.

Ground unnecessary for Use of Public to vest in the Mayor, &c.

XVII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Council for the Time being to widen or otherwise improve the Streets within the said Borough next herein-after mentioned, (that is to say,) *Saint James's Street, Strawberry Place, Albion Street, Percy Street, and Gallowgate, the Bigg Market, the Nuns Gate, the Close, and the Public Quay.*

Power to widen certain Streets.

XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That nothing in the said recited Act or in this Act shall authorize the said Council for the Time being, or any Person or Persons acting by their Authority, to take or use for the Purposes of the said new Streets or Improvements herein-before particularly mentioned, or for any of the Purposes aforesaid, any Tenements other than such as are specified in the Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed, without the Consent in Writing of the Owner thereof or Person empowered to sell the same by virtue of the said recited Act or this Act or otherwise.

Property specified in the Fifth Schedule may be used.

XIX. Provided also, and be it enacted, That the said Council for the Time being may make the said new Streets and Improvements upon, into, through, across, or over the Tenements of any Person or Corporation whatsoever, whose Name or the Name of whose Tenant shall appear to the Satisfaction of any One of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting in and for the said Borough, and shall be by him certified in Writing under his Hand, to be by Mistake omitted in the said Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed, or that instead thereof the Name of some other Person or Corporation to whom such Tenements do not belong hath been by Mistake inserted therein, or that the Owner or Occupier thereof hath been incorrectly or insufficiently described; or if it shall appear to the Satisfaction of any such Justice, to be certified as aforesaid, that such Tenements, or any Part thereof, have

or hath been by Mistake omitted or misnamed; or otherwise incorrectly or insufficiently described in such Schedule, but were by this Act intended to be taken and used for the Purposes thereof; and the same Tenements, notwithstanding any such Omission or Misdescription, may be valued, sold, purchased, conveyed, disposed of, and applied in the same Manner, and under the same or the like Powers, as are given by this Act in other Cases, as fully and effectually to all Intents and Purposes as if the same were inserted and accurately named in the said Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed:

XX. Provided also, and be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Council, or any Person acting by and under their Authority, to take and use the Tenements specified in the Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed at any Time during the Period of Seven Years next after the passing of this Act, but not at any Time thereafter without the Consent in Writing of the Owner thereof, or other Person empowered to sell the same by virtue of the said recited Act or this Act or otherwise.

XXI. Whereas *Peregrine George Ellison* Esquire, is possessed of or interested in certain vacant Ground described in the Fifth Schedule of this Act, which is at present unproductive, and he will be prevented applying the same for Building Purposes, or otherwise rendering the same productive, so long as the compulsory Powers of taking Property given by this Act shall affect the same; and it is therefore reasonable that the Duration of the said compulsory Powers in respect of the said vacant Ground should be limited; be it therefore enacted, That it shall not be lawful, and nothing in this Act contained shall authorize or empower the said Council, or any Person or Persons acting by or under their Authority, to take, use, injure, or damage the vacant Ground and Hereditaments mentioned in the Fifth Schedule to this Act as the Property of *Peregrine George Ellison*, beyond the Period of Three Years next after the passing of this Act, without the previous Consent in Writing of the said *Peregrine George Ellison*, his Heirs or Assigns.

XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That previous to the Sale of such of the Tenements mentioned in the Fifth Schedule subjoined to this Act, which shall be purchased of the Society of Friends or their Trustees by virtue of this Act, as shall remain after forming the Street from the East End of *Mosley Street* to the *Swirle* hereby authorized to be made, and which said Street, so far as the same shall bounder on the said Tenements of the Society of Friends or their Trustees, shall be of the Width of Fifty Feet, and no more, and previous to the Appropriation of any Part of the said Tenements, so as aforesaid to be purchased of the said Society of Friends and their Trustees, as and for Houses, Shops, and other Erections and Buildings, and Yards and Conveniences attached thereto, the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses shall offer the said Tenements so remaining to the said Society of Friends or their Trustees, save and except a Stripe or Parcel of Ground Nine Inches in Breadth, extending the whole Length of the said Tenements along the South Front thereof, towards the said intended Street, which the said Mayor, Aldermen,
and

and Burgesses shall be at liberty to retain, notwithstanding any thing in this Act contained, and to build and maintain a Wall thereon; and in case such Society or the Trustees shall, within Ten Days next after such Offer, signify in Writing their Desire to purchase the same Tenements for the Purpose of a Burial Ground, School Room, or Meeting Houses, and the said Society and their Trustees, and the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, cannot agree on the Price to be paid for the same Tenements, then such Price shall be ascertained and fixed by a Jury, in like Manner as the Value of Tenements to be taken under this Act is directed to be fixed and ascertained, but such Value shall in such Case be fixed and ascertained with reference to the present State and Value of the said Tenements.

XXIII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses as well to sell and convey as to surrender and appropriate any Part of the Tenements which shall be purchased or acquired under the Authority of the said recited Act or this Act, and any of the Tenements now belonging to them the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and any Part of any Street, Road, Way, Lane, Passage, Quay, or public Place within the said Borough, which has been or shall be altered, used, or stopped for the Improvements authorized by the said recited Act or this Act, for the Purpose of forming or making any new Street, Road, Way, Quay, Market House, Police Office, Station House, or public Place within the said Borough, or of widening or improving any Street, Road, Way, Quay, or public Place for the Time being within the said Borough, or of forming a Site for any House or other Building, or Yard or Garden, to adjoin any such Street, Road, Way, Quay, or public Place.

Power to sell Lands, &c. not required for the Purposes of the Act.

XXIV. Provided always, and be it enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall enable the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses to sell, demise, mortgage, or alienate for the Purposes of this Act any Lands already vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, which immediately before the passing of this Act they could not have sold, demised, mortgaged, or alienated without the Approbation of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury or any Three of them, any thing in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding.

Restriction as to Sale of Property already belonging to the Corporation.

XXV. Provided always, and be it enacted, That every Receipt which shall be given by the Treasurer of the said Borough for Monies to be paid for the Purchase of Tenements to be sold by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses under the Authority of the said recited Act or this Act, shall be a good and effectual Discharge for the Monies therein expressed to be received; and that the Purchaser or Purchasers paying such Monies and taking such Receipt for the same shall not be bound to see to the Application thereof, nor answerable for the Loss, Misapplication, or Nonapplication thereof, nor bound to ascertain or inquire that such Offer of the Premises sold shall have been made to the Person or Persons of whom the same shall have been originally purchased, as mentioned and required in and by the said recited Act: Provided always nevertheless, that nothing herein

herein contained shall exonerate the said Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses from their Liability to make such Offer as lastly mentioned; and this Act shall be read and construed as if the Provision contained in the said recited Act requiring such Offer had been inserted herein.

Council empowered to borrow Money for the Purposes of this Act.

This Act not to affect the Liabilities of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses as Conservators of the River Tyne.

Alteration of the Act 7 W. 4. & 1 Vict. c. 72. as to cleansing of Footpaths.

Power to reduce Penalties for impounding Cattle.

XXVI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Council from Time to Time to borrow and take up at Interest such Sum or Sums of Money as they shall see necessary for the Purposes of the said recited Act or this Act, not exceeding in the whole the Sum of Seventy thousand Pounds, in addition to the Sum of Thirty thousand Pounds authorized to be borrowed by the said recited Act; and after the passing of this Act the said recited Act shall be read and construed as if the Sum thereby authorized to be borrowed had been One hundred thousand Pounds instead of the said Sum of Thirty thousand Pounds: Provided always, that nothing in this Act contained, or to be done under the Powers thereof, shall alter to or otherwise affect the Charges and Liabilities to which the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, or any of their Funds or Revenues, are subject and liable, either in respect of any Dues and Duties to which the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses are, have been, or may be entitled as Conservators of the Port of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, or in respect of their Office as such Conservators.

XXVII. And whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that from and after the passing of the same Act the respective Occupiers of Tenements within such Parts of the said Borough as were then and should from Time to Time be liable to the Watch Rate should effectually cleanse, or cause to be effectually cleansed, the public Footways adjoining their respective Tenements, and the Channels or Watercourses opposite the same respectively, every *Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday* Mornings throughout the Year, between the Hours of Seven and Nine, and in the Afternoon of every *Saturday* throughout the Year, in addition to the cleansing in the Morning of that Day, between the Hour of Four in the Afternoon and Sunset: And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Times mentioned in the said recited Act should be altered; be it therefore enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act the Times for cleansing the said public Footways, Channels, or Watercourses shall be between the Hours of Seven and Ten of the Morning on every *Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday* throughout the Year, and between the Hour of Four in the Afternoon and Sunset on every *Saturday* during the Months of *May, June, July, August, September, and October*, and between the Hours of Three and Six in the Afternoon on every *Saturday* during the Months of *November, December, January, February, March, and April*.

XXVIII. And whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that the Sum of Five Shillings shall be paid to any Person impounding any Horse, Mule, Ass, Ox, Sheep, Goat, or any other Sort of Cattle found wandering about any of the Streets, Market Places, or other public Ways or Places within the said Borough: And whereas it is deemed expedient that the said Enactment should be altered; be it therefore

therefore enacted, That after the passing of this Act, instead of the Sum of Five Shillings, such Sum not exceeding the Sum of Five Shillings as any Justice of the Peace for the said Borough shall direct shall be paid to any Person impounding any Horse, Mule, Ass, Ox, Sheep, Goat, or any other Sort of Cattle as mentioned in the said recited Act.

XXIX. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Superintendent and Inspectors of Police within the said Borough, or any of them, to give or lay any Information, and to commence any Proceeding which the Town Surveyor of the said Borough is by the said recited Act authorized to give, lay, or commence.

XXX. And whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that no Action shall be commenced against any Person for any thing done or to be done in pursuance or under the Authority of the said Act, after the Expiration of Six Calendar Months next after the Act complained of shall have been committed or shall have ceased, which shall last happen, and all such Actions shall be laid and tried in the County of *Northumberland* and not elsewhere, and the Defendant in every such Action may plead the general Issue, and give the said Act and the special Matter in Evidence at any Trial which shall be had thereupon, and that the Matter or Thing for which such Action shall be brought or prosecuted was done in pursuance and by the Authority of the said Act; and if upon such Trial the said Matter or Thing shall appear to have been so done, or if any such Action shall have been brought before Ten Days Notice thereof shall have been given as aforesaid, or be laid in any other County or Place than as aforesaid, then and in any of such Cases respectively the Jury shall find a Verdict for the Defendant, and upon such Verdict being given, or if the Plaintiff shall become nonsuited, or suffer a Discontinuance of such Action after the Defendant shall have appeared thereto, or if upon Demurrer or Verdict or otherwise Judgment shall be given for or shall be obtained by the Defendant in any such Action, then and in every such Case the Plaintiff shall be liable or subject to the Payment to the Defendant of Costs, and such Defendant shall have all such Remedies for recovering the same as any Defendant may have by Law for the Recovery of Costs in any other Case: And whereas it is expedient that the said Provision should be repealed; be it therefore enacted, That the said Provision in the said recited Act be repealed.

XXXI. And be it enacted, That no Constable belonging to the Police Force of the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne* shall be at liberty to resign his Office, or to withdraw himself from the Duties thereof, unless expressly allowed so to do by Writing under the Hand of the Superintendent of Police, or unless he shall give to such Superintendent One Calendar Month's Notice of his Intention; and every Constable who shall so resign or withdraw himself without such Leave or Notice shall be liable to a Penalty not exceeding Forty Shillings.

XXXII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Borough, or the Superintendent of Police within the said

ing Obstructions in the Streets.

Borough, from Time to Time and as Occasion shall require, to make Regulations for the Route to be observed by all Carts, Carriages, Horses, and Persons, and for preventing Obstruction of the Streets and Thoroughfares within the said Borough in any Case, and whensoever it is expected the said Streets or Thoroughfares may be thronged or liable to be obstructed.

XXXIII. And be it enacted, That Notice of such Regulations shall be given by printed Copies of the same being affixed in or near the Street or Thoroughfare expected to be thronged or obstructed, and that every Person who shall act contrary to or shall refuse or neglect to obey or observe any such Regulations shall forfeit a Sum not exceeding Twenty Shillings.

Mad Dogs.

XXXIV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Constable belonging to the Police Force of the said Borough to destroy any Dog or other Animal reasonably suspected to be in a rabid State, or which has been bitten by any Dog or Animal reasonably suspected to be in a rabid State; and the Owner of any such Dog or Animal who shall permit the same to go at large after having Information on reasonable Ground for believing it to be in a rabid State, or to have been bitten by any Dog or other Animal in a rabid State, shall be liable to a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

Constables may apprehend any Offender whose Name and Residence is not known;

XXXV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Constable belonging to the Police Force of the said Borough to take into Custody, without a Warrant, any Person who, within View of any such Constable, shall offend in any Manner against this Act or the said recited Act, or any Bye Law in force within the said Borough, and whose Name and Residence shall be unknown to such Constable, and cannot be ascertained by such Constable.

and without Warrant in certain Cases.

XXXVI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Constable belonging to the Police Force of the said Borough to take into Custody, without a Warrant, all loose, idle, and disorderly Persons whom he shall find disturbing the Public Peace, or whom he shall have good Cause to suspect of having committed or being about to commit any Felony, Misdemeanor, or Breach of the Peace, and all Persons whom he shall find between Sunset and the Hour of Eight in the Morning lying or loitering in any Highway, Yard, or other Place, and not giving a satisfactory Account of themselves.

Persons charged with recent Assaults may be apprehended without Warrant.

XXXVII. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Constable belonging to the Police Force of the said Borough to take into Custody, without a Warrant, any Person who, within the Limits of the said Borough, shall be charged by any other Person with committing any aggravated Assault, in every Case in which such Constable shall have good Reason to believe that such Assault has been committed, although not within View of such Constable, and that by reason of the recent Commission of the Offence a Warrant could not have been obtained for the Apprehension of the Offenders.

Persons taken into Custody to

XXXVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That every Person who shall be so as aforesaid taken into Custody shall be taken, as soon
as

as conveniently may be, before some Justice of the Peace, to be dealt with according to Law; and that no such Person shall be detained under the Authority of this Act by the Constable taking him into Custody for more than Twelve Hours.

be taken before a Justice of the Peace.

XXXIX. And be it enacted, That any Person found committing any Offence, punishable either upon Indictment or as a Misdemeanor upon summary Conviction by virtue of this Act, may be taken into Custody without a Warrant by any Constable, or may be apprehended by the Owner of the Property on or with respect to which the Offence shall be committed, or by his Servant, or any Person authorized by him, and may be detained until he can be delivered into the Custody of a Constable to be dealt with according to Law; and every such Constable may also stop, search, and detain any Vessel, Boat, Cart, or Carriage in or upon which there shall be Reason to suspect any thing stolen or unlawfully obtained may be found, and also any Person who may be reasonably suspected of having or conveying in any Manner any thing stolen or unlawfully obtained; and any Person to whom any Property shall be offered to be sold, pawned, or delivered, if he shall have reasonable Cause to suspect that any such Offence has been committed with respect to such Property, or that the same, or any Part thereof, has been stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained, is hereby authorized, and if in his Power is required, to apprehend and detain, and as soon as may be to deliver such Offender into the Custody of a Constable, together with such Property, to be dealt with according to Law.

Power to Constables and Persons aggrieved to apprehend certain Persons.

XL. And be it enacted, That whenever any Person having Charge of any Horse, Cart, Carriage, or Boat, or any other Animal or Thing, shall be taken into the Custody of any Constable under the Provisions of this Act, it shall be lawful for any Constable to take charge of such Horse, Cart, Carriage, or Boat, or such other Animal or Thing, and to deposit the same in some Place of safe Custody, as a Security for Payment of any Penalty to which the Person having had Charge thereof may become liable, and for Payment of any Expence which may have been necessarily incurred for taking charge of and keeping the same; and it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace before whom the Case shall have been heard to order such Horse, Cart, Carriage, or Boat, or such other Animal or Thing, to be sold, for the Purpose of satisfying such Penalty, and reasonable Expences in default of Payment thereof, in like Manner as if the same had been subject to be distrained, and had been distrained for the Payment of such Penalty and reasonable Expences.

Horses, &c. of Offender may be detained.

XLI. And whereas Doubts have arisen whether Goods unlawfully deposited, pledged, pawned, or exchanged may be restored to the Owner in Cases of summary Conviction, or where the Goods are produced without the Issue of any Search Warrant; be it declared and enacted, That it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace acting for the said Borough to order that any Goods unlawfully pawned, pledged, or exchanged, which shall be brought before him, and the Ownership of which shall be established to the Satisfaction of such Justice of the Peace, shall be delivered up to the Owner by the

For removing Doubts as to ordering the Restoration of Property unlawfully pawned, &c.

the Party with whom they were so unlawfully pawned, pledged, or exchanged, either without Compensation, or with such Compensation to the Party in question as such Justice may think fit.

Power to order Delivery of Goods charged to have been stolen or fraudulently obtained and in Custody of Constable.

XLII. And be it enacted, That if any Goods or Money charged to be stolen or fraudulently obtained shall be in the Custody of any Constable by virtue of any Warrant of a Justice of the Peace, or in prosecution of any Charge of Felony or Misdemeanor in regard to the obtaining thereof, and the Person charged with stealing or obtaining Possession as aforesaid shall not be found or shall have been summarily convicted or discharged, or shall have been tried and acquitted, or if such Person shall have been tried and found guilty, but the Property so in Custody shall not have been included in any Indictment upon which he shall have been found guilty, it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace acting for the said Borough to make an Order for the Delivery of such Goods or Money to the Party who shall appear to be the rightful Owner thereof, or in case the Owner cannot be ascertained, then to make such Order with respect to such Goods or Money as to such Justice shall seem meet: Provided always, that no such Order shall be any Bar to the Right of any Person or Persons to sue the Party to whom such Goods or Money shall be delivered, and to recover such Goods or Money from him by Action at Law, so that such Action shall be commenced within Six Calendar Months next after such Order shall be made.

Unclaimed stolen Goods delivered to the Superintendant of Police may be sold after Twelve Months.

XLIII. And be it enacted, That when any Goods or Money charged to be stolen or unlawfully obtained, and of which the Owner shall be unknown, shall be ordered by any Justice of the Peace to be delivered to the Superintendant of Police of the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, it shall be lawful for the Superintendant, after the Expiration of Twelve Calendar Months during which no Owner shall have appeared to claim the same, to sell or dispose of such Goods or Money, and to pay the Monies arising therefrom to the Treasurer of the said Borough of *Newcastle upon Tyne*, to be by him applied as Part of the Borough Fund.

Expences of Act.

XLIV. And be it enacted, That the Expences of obtaining and passing this Act shall be paid out of the Borough Fund, or out of the Monies to be raised by virtue thereof.

General Saving.

XLV. And be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend or alter, prejudice, lessen, defeat, or affect the Rights and Privileges of the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, or any other Person, Body or Bodies Politic, Corporate, or Collegiate whatsoever, Her, his, or their Heirs, Executors, Administrators, or Assigns, in any respect whatsoever, save and except as is by this Act enacted and declared.

Public Act.

XLVI. And be it enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others.
