And whereas all advertisements and notices required by the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, having been previously published, served, and given, the said Board have caused a local inquiry to be made as to the propriety of assenting to the prayer of the said petition; and it appears to the said Board to be proper to assent thereto:

It is ordered by the Local Government Board for Ireland as follows:

Compulsory powerst o take lands, easements, and water.

1. From and after the time of the confirmation of this Order by Parliament, the urban sanitary authority of the sanitary district consisting or the town of Kinsale shall be empowered to put in force the powers of the Lands Clauses Acts, with respect to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement, with reference to the lands, easements, land covered with water, water, and rights to take and convey water, described and shown in the said deposited plan and schedule.

2. In this Order the expression "Lands Clauses Acts" means the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, as the same is amended by the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act, 1860, the Railways Act (Ireland), 1851, the Railways Act (Ireland), 1860, the Railways Act (Ireland), 1864, and the Railways Traverse Act; and the words "land" and "lands" in the said Act shall, for the purposes of this Order, extend to and include messuages, buildings, lands, easements, and hereditaments of any tenure, and also land covered with water, and water, and rights to take or convey water.

Duration of Order.

3. The powers of compulsory purchase granted by this Order shall not be exercised after the expiration of three years from the time of the confirmation of this Order by Parliament.

Whereas an application has been made to the Local Government Board for Ireland by the Guardians of the Poor of the Croom Union, and by the Guardians of the Poor of the Limerick Union, in pursuance of the Public 41 & 42 Vict. Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, section 12, to form a united district to consist of c. 52, sec. 12. the townlands herein-after mentioned, situated partly in the rural sanitary district consisting of the Croom Union, and partly in the rural sanitary district consisting of the Limerick Union, for the purposes herein-after mentioned:

And whereas all notices and advertisements required by the said Act having been duly served, given, and published, and due inquiry held, it appears to the Local Government Board for Ireland that it will be for the advantage of the rural sanitary districts, consisting respectively of the said Croom Union and the said Limerick Union, and of the proposed united district, to form the said united district, in the manner herein-after stated:

It is ordered by the Local Government Board for Ireland as follows:

1. From and after the confirmation of this Order by Parliament, a united Formation of district shall be formed, and thenceforth shall consist of the townlands united district, of Carnane, Cloghadoolarty North, Cloghadoolarty South, and Enaghroe c. 52. s. 12. (parts of the rural sanitary district consisting of the Croom Union), and of the townland of Arywee (part of the rural sanitary district consisting of the Limerick Union). Such united district shall be formed for the purposes herein-after mentioned.

2. The governing body of the said united district shall be a joint board, Governing consisting of four ex-officio members, and of four elective members. district, The ex-officio members shall be the elected Guardians of the Poor for the time being representing the electoral divisions of Fedamore, Rathmore, and Grange, in the Croom Poor Law Union, and the electoral division of Ballybricken, in the Limerick Poor Law Union. The joint board shall be a body corporate, having the name of "The Skule Bog Drainage District Board," and having perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to acquire and hold lands, for the purposes of its constitution, without any license in mortmain.

3. The purposes for which such united district shall be formed are as Purposes of follows:-making and maintaining main sewers, and carrying into effect and maintaining a system of sewerage and drainage for sanitary Powers, duties, purposes of the united district. The joint board shall, for the purposes aforesaid, and with respect to such united district, be authorised to exercise and perform, and shall be subject to all powers, rights, duties,

capacities, liabilities, and obligations, which any sanitary authority is (by the said Act) authorised to exercise or perform, or is subject to, with respect to the sanitary district of such sanitary authority.

Qualification and mode of election of elected members of joint board, 41 & 42 Vict. c. 52. sec. 14. 4. The elective members of the joint board shall be four persons, each of whom shall be a justice of the peace for the county of Limerick, and resident within one or more of the Poor Law Unions of Croom, or of Limerick, and acting as an ex-officio Guardian of one of the said Unions. Two of the elective members of the joint board shall be elected by the Guardians of the Poor of the Limerick Union, and two by the Guardians of the Poor of Croom Union.

First election of elected members. Annual elections of elected members.

The first election of elective members of the joint board by each of the said boards of guardians shall take place at a meeting of the board of guardians to be held within one month after the confirmation of this Order by Parliament. Subsequent elections of elective members of the joint board by each of the said boards of guardians respectively shall take place at the meeting of the board of guardians which shall occur on or after the 8th of April in each year.

Mode of election of elected members of joint board. Continuance in office of elected members of joint board. Filling casual

vacancies.

The mode of election of elective members of the joint board shall be in all respects that prescribed by the general regulations of the Poor Law Commissioners of the 19th January, 1852, for the appointment of officers.

Each elective member of the joint board shall continue in office until the next annual election of elective members of the joint board following his election, unless a casual vacancy in his office shall previously take place.

Casual vacancies in the office of elective members of the joint board shall be filled, as follows:-The board of guardians who shall have elected the member of the joint board whose office shall thus have become vacant, shall at some meeting to take place not later than twenty-one days after the occurrence of such vacancy, elect a person duly qualified to be an elective member of the board to fill such vacancy. Such election shall be conducted in all respects in the same manner as annual elections of elective members of the joint board.

Meetings of the joint board.

The first meeting of the joint board in each year shall take place on the first Saturday which shall take place next after the first elected members of the joint

Appointment of chairman and vicechairman.

or if no such day be fixed, then on the first Saturday in each month. The joint board shall at their first meeting, and at each meeting which shall in each year first occur next after the election of elective members of the joint board, appoint one of the members of the joint board to be chairman, and another member to be vice-chairman of the joint board. Such chairman and

board shall have been all elected. The joint board shall afterwards meet once

at least in every month on some day to be fixed at the last preceding meeting,

vice-chairman shall hold office after his appointment until he dies, or resigns, or ceases to be a member of the joint board, or until the time arrives for the next annual appointment of a chairman or vice-chairman, whichever time

shall first happen. In the event of a casual vacancy in the office of chairman or of vice-chairman, the joint board shall, at their next meeting after such vacancy shall have taken place, elect some member of the joint board to fill such vacancy. Business shall be transacted at meetings of the joint board in
