



CHAPTER 30.

An Act to make further provision with respect to the A.D. 1897. Disposal of Property in the Possession of the Police. [6th August 1897.]

DE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and B with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1.—(1.) - (2.) An order under this section shall not affect the right of any person to take within six months from the date of the order legal proceedings against any person in possession of property delivered by virtue of the order for the recovery of the property, but on the expiration of those six months the right shall cease.
- (3.) In any part of the metropolitan police district for which a police court is established under the Metropolitan Police Courts Acts, 1839 and 1840, the powers of a court of summary jurisdiction under this section shall be exercised by a metropolitan police magistrate.
- 2.—(1.) A Secretary of State may make regulations for the Regulations disposal of property which has come into the possession of the with respect to unclaimed police under the circumstances mentioned in this Act in cases property in where the owner of the property has not been ascertained and no possession of order of a competent court has been made with respect thereto.
- (2.) The regulations may authorise the sale of any such property, and the application of the preceds of any such sale, and the

application of any money of which the owner cannot be ascertained. A.D. 1897. to all or any of the following purposes:—

(a) the expenses of executing the regulations;

(b) the payment of reasonable compensation to any person by whom the property has been delivered into the possession of the police;

(c) the making of payments for the benefit of discharged prisoners or of persons dependent on prisoners or discharged

prisoners; or

(d) such other purposes as the Secretary of State may consider

expedient.

(3.) Where the property is a perishable article or its custody involves unreasonable expense or inconvenience it may be sold at any time, but the proceeds of sale shall not be disposed of until they have remained in the possession of the police for a year. any other case the property shall not be sold until it has remained in the possession of the police for a year.

(4.) The regulations may also provide for the investment of

money and for the audit of accounts.

(5.) The regulations shall apply whether the property to which they relate has come into the possession of the police before or after the passing of this Act or the making of the regulations.

(6.) The regulations shall be laid before Parliament as soon as

may be after they are made.

3.—(1.) This Act shall not extend to Scotland.

(2.) In the application of this Act to Ireland, the Chief Secretary shall be substituted for the Secretary of State.

(3.) Sections twenty-nine and thirty of the Metropolitan Police

Courts Act, 1839, are hereby repealed.

(4.) This Act may be cited as the Police (Property) Act, 1897.
