## **1999 CHAPTER 22**

#### PART I

#### LEGAL SERVICES COMMISSION

#### Commission

# 1 Legal Services Commission.

- (1) There shall be a body known as the Legal Services Commission (in this Part referred to as "the Commission").
- (2) The Commission shall have the functions relating to—
  - (a) the Community Legal Service, and
  - (b) the Criminal Defence Service,

which are conferred or imposed on it by the provisions of this Act or any other enactment.

- (3) The Commission shall consist of—
  - (a) not fewer than seven members, and
  - (b) not more than twelve members;

but the [FI Secretary of State] may by order substitute for either or both of the numbers for the time being specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) such other number or numbers as he thinks appropriate.

- (4) The members of the Commission shall be appointed by the [FI Secretary of State]; and the [FI Secretary of State] shall appoint one of the members to chair the Commission.
- (5) In appointing persons to be members of the Commission the [F1 Secretary of State] shall have regard to the desirability of securing that the Commission includes members who (between them) have experience in or knowledge of—
  - (a) the provision of services which the Commission can fund as part of the Community Legal Service or Criminal Defence Service,

- (c) consumer affairs,
