# VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

Cap. 34.

An Act for confirming certain Conveyances in Perpetuity, made by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland and the present Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, of Parts of the Mensal Lands of the See of Derry, and for confirming certain Leases made by the same Bishop and his immediate Predecessor in the See of Derry of other Parts of the Mensal Lands of the same See; also for enabling the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe for the Time being to grant Leases of the Parts last mentioned and certain other Parts of the Mensal Lands of the See of Derry; and for other Purposes.

[30th July 1842.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled An Act to enable Arch- 15 G. 2. c. 5. bishops and Bishops to demise Part of their Demesne Lands, and to (I.)

53 G.3. c.92. George the Third, intituled An Act for the Removal of Doubts respecting the Powers of Archbishops and Bishops in Ireland, as to demising the Mensal Lands, not being Demesne Lands, to their respective Sees belonging: And whereas an Act was passed in the Session

of Parliament held in the Third and Fourth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled An Act to alter and amend the Laws relating to the Temporalities of the Church in Ireland: And whereas an Act was passed in the Session of Parliament held in the Fourth and Fifth Years of the Reign of the same King, intituled An Act to amend an Act made in the Third and Fourth Year of His present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend ' the Laws relating to the Temporalities of the Church of Ireland:' And whereas an Act was passed in the Session of Parliament held in the Sixth and Seventh Years of the Reign of the same King, intituled An Act to amend Two Acts passed respectively in the Third and Fourth and in the Fourth and Fifth Years of His present Majesty, for altering and amending the Laws relating to the Temporalities of the Church of Ireland: And whereas under the Provisions of the Act first hereinbefore mentioned certain of the Mensal Lands belonging to the See of Derry were in the Year One thousand seven hundred and fiftythree set out as a proper Demesne for the Bishop of Derry: And whereas certain of the Lands so set out, principally called the Town Parks, and situate in the Townlands of Edenballymore and Creggan in the Parish of Templemore, within the Liberties of the City of Londonderry, (a Particular of which Lands is contained in the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Schedules to this Act annexed,) have not for many Years past been in fact used as Demesne Lands of the said See, but inadvertently have been treated as if they had been Mensal Lands of that See not so set out as aforesaid, and both to the Advantage of the same See and to the Improvement of the City and Liberties of Londonderry Portions thereof have been let by the present Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, and his immediate Predecessor in the said See of Derry, on Building or other Leases, and some of those Leases have been renewed by the said present Bishop, and in a few Instances Conveyances in Perpetuity of the Lands comprised in certain of those renewed Leases have, under the supposed Authority of the Acts thirdly and fourthly herein-before mentioned or one of them, been granted by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland and the said present Bishop of Derry and Raphoe: And whereas the Lands which now are and for many Years past have been actually used as the Demesne of the said See of Derry lie in a Ring Fence, and for the most Part separate from those herein-before mentioned not to be so used, and they contain Two hundred and forty-seven Acres and Two Roods Cunningham Measure, and are situate in the said Townlands of Edenballymore and Creggan and Suburbs of the City of Londonderry, in the Parish of Templemore aforesaid, and a Particular of them is contained in the Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed: And whereas Doubts have arisen as to the Validity of the Conveyances and Leases so granted as aforesaid by reason of the Lands therein respectively comprised having, under the Provisions of the first herein-before mentioned Act, been so set out as aforesaid:

And whereas, whilst the Lands so now actually used as the Demesnes of the See of Derry are amply sufficient for that Purpose under the diminished Revenues of that See, it would establish the Security of the Parties entitled to or under such Conveyances and Leases, would be advantageous to the See of Derry, and would tend to the Improvement of the City of Londonderry and its Vicinity, if the Conveyances in Perpetuity aforesaid, which are specified in the First Schedule to this Act, and the aforesaid subsisting Leases, which are specified in the Second Schedule to this Act, and all derivative Titles under such Conveyances and Leases, were established and confirmed, and if the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe for the Time being were empowered to grant Leases, in conformity with the Provisions of the first and secondly herein-before mentioned Acts or otherwise as herein after mentioned, and to accept Surrenders, according to the Provisions of the secondly herein-before mentioned Act or otherwise as herein-after mentioned, of as well the Messuages, Lands, and Hereditaments comprised in the said subsisting Leases as of the Messuages, Lands, and Hereditaments comprised in the Third and Fourth Schedules to this Act, and if such of the Provisions of the thirdly, fourthly, and fifthly herein-before mentioned Acts as relate in any Way to the Purchase in Perpetuity of Bishops' Lands by the therein-mentioned Tenants or Lessees and Under-tenants thereof were extended and applied to similar Tenants, Lessees, and Undertenants of the Lands Power to lease which is sought hereby, but the Objects aforesaid cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: Therefore Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subject, the Honourable and Right Reverend Father in God Richard Lord Bishop of the United Bishopricks of Derry and Raphoe, doth most humbly beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the several Conveyances in Perpetuity or Instruments Conveyances specified in the First Schedule to this Act annexed, and the Estates in Perpetuity thereby respectively expressed or intended to be granted and released, and the several Reservations, Covenants, Conditions, and dule and Clauses therein respectively contained, also the several Leases or Leases spe-Instruments specified in the Second Schedule to this Act annexed, cified in and the Terms of Years thereby respectively expressed or intended to Second Schedule declared be granted, and the several Reservations, Covenants, Conditions, valid. and Clauses therein respectively contained, shall be and the same are hereby declared to be (both to establish derivative Titles and to every other Intent) valid and effectual and binding, the said Conveyances upon the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland and their Successors, and the said Conveyances and Leases upon the said Richard Lord Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, and his Assigns and Successors in the See of Derry.

II. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passing of Power to this Act it shall be lawful for the said Richard Lord Bishop of Derry grant Leases and Raphoe, and his Successors in the said See of Derry, to make Surrenders such respective Demises or Leases as well of the Messuages, Lands, of Leases Tenements, and Hereditaments which are or in the said Second of Lands in Schedule

Second and Third Schedules.

Schedule to this Act annexed are mentioned to be comprised respectively in the said Leases specified in that Schedule, together with all Profits, Easements, and Appurtenances belonging to any such Premises or convenient to be held or enjoyed therewith, as also of the Messuages, Lands, and Hereditaments comprised in the said Third and Fourth Schedules to this Act annexed, together with all Profits, Easements, and Appurtenances belonging to any such Premises or convenient to be held or enjoyed therewith, and to accept such Surrenders both of the Leases hereby confirmed and of the Demises or Leases to be hereafter made under the Authority of this Act, as by the said Act passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second and the said Act passed in the Fifty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third respectively, or other the Laws now in force in Ireland, Bishops can lawfully make and accept respectively of their Mensal Lands left remaining after and over and above the Demesnes set out for them respectively, and their respective Successors, under the said Act passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and of the Leases thereof respectively: Provided nevertheless, that there be reserved by every such Lease as aforesaid which shall be made under the Authority of this Act the best yearly Rent there can be reasonably obtained for the Premises therein comprised, payable half-yearly or oftener, and so as every such Lease be made without taking any Fine, Premium, or Foregift, or any thing in the Nature thereof, for in respect of the making the same, other than the Surrender of any then existing Lease or Leases for the Time being of the same Premises or any Part thereof.

Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the Powers herein-before given, so far as they respect the Lands and Hereditaments comprised in the Fourth Schedule to this Act annexed, shall not impair or prejudicially affect the Powers which by an Act passed in the Forty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for vesting a Workhouse and Premises situate in the City of Londonderry in Trustees to be sold, certain Land. and for applying the Purchase Money in building another School-house, and for better regulating the same, are given to the Lord Bishop of Derry for the Time being and his Successors over such Part of the said Land and Hereditaments comprised in the Schedule last-mentioned as constitutes all or any Part of the Piece or Parcel of Ground particularly mentioned in the Second Schedule to that Act annexed, and entitled Schedule B, nor shall the Powers herein-before given impair or prejudicially affect any Estate or Interest already created. or agreed to be created in exercise of the Powers or any of them. given by the Act last mentioned.

Landlords therein mentioned Conveyances of perpetual Estates and Interests in the Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments mentioned in the same Act, shall extend and apply to Tenants or Lessees, Under-tenants, and inferior Tenants or Lessees, similarly circumstanced, of the Lands and Hereditaments by this Act authorized to be demised; and all and singular the Powers, Directions, and Duties by all, any, or either of the said Acts passed respectively in the Sessions of Parliament held respectively in the Third and Fourth, in the Fourth and Fifth, and in the Sixth and Seventh Years of the Reign of His said late Majesty King William the Fourth given to and devolved upon such Tenants, Lessees, Under-tenants, and inferior Tenants or Lessees, the Commissioners under those Acts, the Bishop under whom are holden the Lands and Hereditaments to be purchased, the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the Time being in Council, the Courts of Chancery and Exchequer, and others respectively for carrying into effect such Powers to purchase and the Purchases made thereunder shall extend and apply to the Powers to purchase hereby given and to the Purchases made under such Powers; and the several Provisions in the same Acts, any or either of them, contained and now in force relating to the Variation, Recovery, Division, and Apportionment of Rents payable in respect of such Purchases, and to the Effect and Consequences of such Purchases and of the Conveyances in execution thereof, upon the Rights and Obligations of Third Persons, shall extend and apply to the Rents payable in respect of Purchases made under the Authority of this Act and to such Purchases and the Conveyances in execution thereof respectively; and generally all and singular the Clauses contained in the said Acts passed respectively in the Sessions of Parliament held respectively in the Third and Fourth, in the Fourth and Fifth, and in the Sixth and Seventh Years of the Reign of His said late Majesty King William the Fourth, or in either of those Acts, having relation in any way to the Purchases and Conveyances therein mentioned, or to any Matter or Thing arising out of or consequent upon the same respectively, shall extend and apply to the Purchases and Conveyances authorized by this Act and to the similar [Private.]

Act not to enable any Lease or Conveyance to be made of the actual Demesnes of the See of Derry mentioned in Schedule 5.

V. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That nothing contained in this present Act shall extend to authorize the said Richard Lord Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, or his Successors in the said See of Derry, to make any Demise or Lease, or the same Bishop or such his Successors, or the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland or their Successors, to make any Conveyance in Perpetuity of all or any of the Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments comprised in the Fifth Schedule to this Act annexed, which it is hereby declared shall always henceforth be esteemed and taken to be the Demesne Lands belonging to the said Bishop and his Successors in Right of the See of Derry.

General Saving.

VI. Saving always to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, and to all and every other Person and Persons, Bodies Politic and Corporate, his, her, and their Heirs, Successors, Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, (other than and except the said Richard Lord Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, and his Successors in the said See of *Derry*, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland and their Successors,) all such Estate, Right, Title, Interest, Claim, and Demand whatsoever as they or any of them had, held, or enjoyed before the passing of this Act, or could or might have held or enjoyed in case this Act had not been made.

VII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be printed by Printers to be the several Printers to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty duly authorized to print the Statutes of the United Kingdom; and a Copy thereof so printed by any of them shall be admitted as Evidence thereof by all Judges, Justices, and others.
