## POLICE

**The Police (Overseas Service) (Anguilla) Regulations 1969**

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by section 1 of the Police (Overseas Service) Act 1945(a), I, the Right Honourable Michael Stewart, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Police (Overseas Service) (Anguilla) Regulations 1969, and shall come into operation on 19th March 1969.

2. The Anguilla Police Unit (hereinafter referred to as "the Unit") shall consist of persons nominated by the Secretary of State to serve as members of the Unit for the purpose of performing police duties on behalf of Her Majesty's Commissioner in Anguilla.

3.—(1) A member of the Unit may be dismissed by the Secretary of State or required by the Secretary of State to resign, as an alternative to dismissal, if he is found guilty of serious misconduct or a serious offence against discipline: Provided that where some person authorised by the Secretary of State in that behalf exercises the powers conferred by this Regulation, an appeal against dismissal shall lie to the Secretary of State.

(2) An appeal under this Regulation shall be brought within one month of the date of dismissal and a successful appellant shall be re-instated as a member of the Unit as from the date of that dismissal.

4. A member of the Unit—

(a) may resign subject to his giving to the Secretary of State three months' notice or such shorter period of notice as may be agreed;

(b) may be discharged by the Secretary of State subject to his being given three months' notice or such shorter period of notice as may be agreed.

5. Any function conferred on the Secretary of State by these Regulations (other than the consideration of an appeal under Regulation 3 of these Regulations) may be performed by any other person or authority acting under his authorisation in that behalf.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE

*(This Note is not part of the Regulations.)*

The Police (Overseas Service) Act 1945 empowers the Secretary of State to make regulations for the government and discipline of persons engaged under his control in the performance of police duties in any territory outside the United Kingdom.

The Anguilla Police Unit has been established under the control of the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs for police duties in Anguilla.

These regulations provide for the appointment, discipline, resignation and discharge of members of the Unit.
