EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO

THE ANIMAL HEALTH (MISCELLANEOUS FEES) REGULATIONS 2013

2013 No. 1240

1. This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) and is laid before Parliament by Command of Her Majesty.

This memorandum contains information for the Joint Committee on Statutory Instruments.

2. Purpose of the instrument

2.1 The purpose of this instrument is to provide for increases in the fees payable in relation to services delivered by the Animal Health Veterinary Laboratories Agency ("AHVLA", an executive agency of Defra), as part of a move towards full cost recovery of such fees. In doing so, Defra has brought together a number of miscellaneous animal health related fees within this single instrument.

3. Matters of special interest to the Joint Committee on Statutory Instruments

3.1 Many of the fees covered by this instrument have not increased for several years and therefore do not reflect the true cost to Government of providing the services. This instrument introduces the first stage of a phased, above inflation, increase towards fees which achieve full cost recovery for services provided by the AHVLA. However in the case of the salmonella national control programme fees (regulation 5), the increases in this instrument will already result in full cost recovery. The Annex to this Memorandum contains tables showing the comparison of old and new fees.

4. Legislative Context

- 4.1 It is efficient and easier for the recipients of AHVLA services to have all these miscellaneous fees set out in one instrument. This will have the added advantage of making it easier to amend these fees in future years as Defra moves towards full cost recovery.
- 4.2 The fees for services provided by the AHVLA deriving from the following existing instruments: the Zoonoses and Animal By-Product (Fees) (England) Regulations 2010, the Poultry Health Scheme (Fees) Regulations 2011, the Porcine Semen (Fees) (England) Regulations 2007, the Bovine Embryo (Collection, Production and Transfer) (Fees) Regulations 1995 and the Animals (Third Country Imports) (Charges) Regulations 1997 are combined within this single instrument.
- 4.3 The Control of Trade in Endangered Species (Fees) Regulations 2009 and the Bovine Semen (England) Regulations 2007 are both amended, with the Schedule of fees in the former being substituted by Schedule 1, and the fees for the latter now set out in Schedule 4 of this instrument.

- 4.4 This instrument provides for increases in fees payable for services delivered by the AHVLA in line with the principle that the costs of services should be borne by users who benefit directly from the service provided.
- 4.5 Ambulatory references have been included for three EU instruments as it is likely that technical details may be amended in those instruments that may have implications for cross references in this instrument.

5. Territorial Extent and Application

With the exception of regulation 4 these Regulations extend to England and Wales but apply in relation to England only. Regulation 4 extends to the United Kingdom.

6. European Convention on Human Rights

As the instrument is subject to negative resolution procedure and does not amend primary legislation no statement is required.

7. Policy background

- 7.1 The AHVLA is responsible in England, on behalf of Defra, for delivering a number of services aimed at facilitating trade, preventing the introduction and spread of animal diseases, safeguarding public health and protecting wild flora and fauna. It is Government policy to charge users the full cost of the services it provides.
- 7.1.1 **Control of Trade in Endangered Species.** Under Council Regulation (EC) No 338/97 on the protection of species of wild fauna and flora (known as "CITES"), the AHVLA issue licences to import, export or otherwise deal in certain listed species which may be endangered by trade. Regulation 4(3) introduces a fee of £1.50 payable by applicants for the issue of additional permits and certificates. Schedule 1 of this new instrument substitutes increased fees for plants and animals into the Schedule of the Control of Trade in Endangered Species (Fees) Regulations 2009.
- 7.1.2 Salmonella national control programme (zoonoses). In line with Regulation (EC) No 2160/2003 of the European Parliament and the Council on the control of salmonella, as part of the Salmonella National Control Programmes the AHVLA collect and test official samples in order to verify progress in achieving agreed salmonella reduction targets. It also provides services to maintain an approved private laboratory network, and carries out proficiency tests for laboratories to ensure consistency in test results on salmonella samples.
- 7.1.3 **Poultry Health Scheme.** Any poultry establishments that wish to export live poultry or hatching eggs to EU member States or to countries outside the EU (known as 'third countries') must be members of the Poultry Health Scheme ("PHS"). The PHS is operated by the AHVLA under the Trade in Animals and Related Products Regulations 2011 as a mechanism to encourage the export of poultry and eggs. It offers a system of registration and approval enabling establishments to comply with PHS requirements set out in Council Directive 2009/158/EC.
- 7.1.4 **Bovine Semen.** The Bovine Semen (England) Regulations 2007 control the collection, processing and storage of bovine semen eligible for domestic trade and with other member States of the European Union. In addition to facilitating trade the 2007

Regulations ensure the health status of donor animals. The AHVLA provide a service of licensing artificial insemination centres and approval of donor animals.

- 7.1.5 **Porcine Semen**. The Artificial Insemination of Pigs (England and Wales) Regulations 1964 deal with domestic trade, and the Artificial Insemination of Pigs (EEC) Regulations 1992 deal with EU trade. Together these two instruments control the collection, processing and storage of porcine semen eligible for trade. In addition to facilitating trade, they also help guard against transmission of diseases that may be present in porcine semen. The AHVLA inspect and approve collection centres. Their staff also take samples from boars with a view to their approval for becoming donor animals.
- 7.1.6 **Bovine Embryos.** The Bovine Embryo (Collection, Production and Transfer)
 Regulations 1995 faciliate trade, control the health of donor animals and guard against diseases which could be transmitted via embryos. The AHVLA are responsible for approving and licensing bovine embryo teams and storage centres.
- 7.1.7 Checking consignments of live animals from third countries at border inspection posts. EU legislation requires all live animals (other than accompanied pets) arriving from countries outside the EU to be inspected and have documentary (and identification) checks by an official veterinarian on entry at a Border Inspection Post. This requirement is implemented by the Trade in Animals and Related Products Regulations 2011, and the veterinary checks are carried out by the AHVLA in order to prevent the introduction of diseases harmful to animal and public health.
- 7.2 Charging for all these services is consistent with the principle that businesses using and benefiting from the services should bear their cost.

8. Consultation outcome

- 8.1 A consultation on proposals to revise fees for the provision of all these statutory services ran from 16 July to 10 September 2012. Over 600 trade organisations, farming unions and businesses were invited to respond to the consultation along with the general public. 47 responses were received and the majority of respondents, although generally opposed to increases in fees, favoured a phased increase in fees to achieve full cost recovery over two or three years.

- 8.3 The Department responded by deciding to phase in fee increases over two years for services delivered under bovine semen, porcine semen, bovine embryos, veterinary checks at border inspection posts and the poultry health scheme, phase fee increases over three years for CITES services, and only move directly to full cost recovery levels for salmonella national control programme services.
- 8.4 Fees for activities in relation to bovine semen, bovine embryos, porcine semen and PHS services that require a site visit by an AHVLA officer will now be based on a specified (fixed) administration fee plus a variable fee for relevant officer time, based on actual time taken to provide the service.

9. Guidance

9.1 Details of the new fees will be included on the AHVLA website.

10. Impact

- 10.1 No impact on charities or voluntary bodies is foreseen other than for those that may have to pay increased fees in respect of permits or certificates under CITES.
- 10.2 No impact on the public sector is foreseen.
- 10.3 Impact assessments have been prepared for each of the seven services involved and can be viewed at www.gov.uk/defra.

11. Regulating small business

11.1 The legislation applies equally to all businesses, many of which are small businesses.

12 Monitoring & review

12.1 The levels of fees will be reviewed over the course of the next financial year with a view to making a further instrument in 2014 to implement the next phase of the move towards full cost recovery for the provision of the services covered by this instrument.
