EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO

THE EAST SUSSEX (ELECTORAL CHANGES) ORDER 2016

2016 No. 1225

1. Introduction

1.1 This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England and is laid before Parliament by Command of Her Majesty.

2. Purpose of the instrument

2.1 The Order provides for new county divisions and numbers of county councillors for the county of East Sussex at the county elections in 2017 and thereafter.

3. Matters of special interest to Parliament

Other matters of interest to the House of Commons

3.2 As this instrument is subject to the negative procedure and has not been prayed against, consideration as to whether there are other matters of interest to the House of Commons does not arise at this stage.

4. Legislative Context

4.1 The Commission has power under section 59 of the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009 (the 2009 Act) to make an order giving effect to recommendations contained in a report, prepared under section 58(4) of the 2009 Act, after conducting an electoral review under section 56(1) of that Act. This instrument is being made to give effect to the Commission's recommendations for new electoral arrangements set out in its report prepared following an electoral review of the county of East Sussex.

5. Extent and Territorial Application

- 5.1 The extent of this instrument is England.
- 5.2 The territorial application of this instrument is England.

6. European Convention on Human Rights

6.1 As the instrument is subject to negative resolution procedure and does not amend primary legislation, no statement is required.

7. Policy background

What is being done and why

7.1 The purpose of an electoral review is to decide on the appropriate electoral arrangements including the number of councillors and the names, number and boundaries of wards or divisions for a specific local authority. The Commission began

the electoral review of East Sussex in September 2015. The Commission decided to conduct the review as part of a combined review of East Sussex County and its constituent districts. Also, based on the December 2013 electorate figures, 34% of divisions had electoral variances of greater than 10% when compared to the average for the county.

- 7.2 An electoral review aims to ensure that the number of electors represented by each county or district councillor is as close to equal as possible, but the recommendations must also have regard to community identities and interests and the need for effective and convenient local government. To achieve these aims, the Commission tries to ensure that the number of electors per councillor in every division or ward is as close as possible to the average for the authority, but is happy to show flexibility in moving away from the average based on the evidence provided during the consultation stages of the review. Following a four-stage review process the Commission published its 'Final recommendations New electoral arrangements for East Sussex County Council'¹ on 27 September 2016.
- 7.3 The Order provides for changes to the electoral arrangements for the county of East Sussex at the county elections in 2017 as recommended by the Commission. The existing divisions of the county will be replaced by 50 new ones, all 50 divisions will each return one councillor. The Commission considered that the evidence received justified two divisions having variances predicted to vary by more than 10% from the authority average by 2021.
- 7.4 Under section 56 of the 2009 Act, whenever the Commission recommends changes to the electoral arrangements for a county council it must also recommend whether, in consequence of those changes, any changes should be made to the electoral arrangements for any parish council that is within that county. Among other things, under Schedule 2 to that Act recommendations must ensure that no parish ward is split between new county divisions and under section 56 of that Act recommendations must be made regarding the number of parish councillors for each parish ward.
- 7.5 Consequently, in addition to making changes to the electoral arrangements for the district the Order also, where necessary, makes provision with respect to the establishment of new parish wards and sets the number of parish councillors for each of those parish wards.
- 7.6 The map accompanying the Order shows the final divisions recommended for East Sussex. This map should be viewed in conjunction with the maps, reports and Orders that relate to the electoral review of each constituent district of East Sussex. Any parish ward arrangements shown on the East Sussex map may have been created as a result of changes to either electoral divisions and/or the ward patterns for the constituent districts. All parish warding arrangements are shown on all maps for the sake of completeness. The parish electoral arrangements will come into effect at the corresponding district election.

Consolidation

7.7 The Order does not amend or revoke any legislation.

8. Consultation outcome

- 8.1 The Order gives effect to recommendations that were consulted on during the review of electoral arrangements from September 2015 until July 2016. There was an initial ten-week consultation, during which the Commission asked for proposals on the most appropriate number of councillors and division boundaries for the county. Having considered the submissions received, the Commission published its 'Draft recommendations New electoral arrangements for East Sussex County Council'² on 15 March 2016. Following a 17-week consultation on the draft recommendations, the Commission considered the further evidence received and published its final recommendations.
- 8.2 During the course of the review, the Commission received approximately 102 representations. The consultations involved East Sussex Council, district, parish and town councils, local MPs and other interested parties. The Commission considered that a council size of 50 would ensure effective and convenient local government for the county. The Commission based its draft recommendations on a submission from East Sussex County Council. The Commission made some modifications in specific areas to better reflect the statutory criteria.
- 8.3 In response to the consultation on the draft recommendations, the Commission modified its recommendations in six divisions to reflect the localised comments received.
- 8.4 A detailed analysis of the outcome of the consultation is set out in the report 'Final recommendations New electoral arrangements for East Sussex County Council' which is available at <u>http://www.lgbce.org.uk/current-reviews/south-east/east-sussex/east-sussex-county-council</u>

9. Guidance

- 9.1 The Commission does not intend to issue any guidance alongside this instrument. This is not considered necessary as the Order is self-explanatory and gives effect to recommendations following consultation with interested parties as to the changes to electoral arrangements.
- 9.2 Once the Order has been made, the Commission will publish a press release and distribute to local media advising that new electoral arrangements will be implemented at the next local elections. The press release will also direct interested parties to the Commission's website where the final recommendations will be available in detail.

10. Impact

- 10.1 There is no impact on business, charities or voluntary bodies.
- 10.2 The impact on the public sector will be limited to the area for which the Order makes provision. The one-off cost of producing the map referred to in the instrument is to be funded by the Commission. The one-off cost of amending the electoral register to reflect the new county divisions and parish wards is to be funded by the constituent districts of East Sussex.
- 10.3 An Impact Assessment has not been prepared for this instrument.

12.1 The Commission will have no role in monitoring East Sussex County Council's implementation of the East Sussex (Electoral Changes) Order 2016. The Commission is not required to undertake such monitoring; that is a matter for the relevant officers of East Sussex Council. The Order will be reviewed insofar as the Commission continually monitors local authorities in England to identify any that meet its criteria for electoral reviews.
